INTRODUCTION AND INSTRUCTIONS

INTRODUCTION: This application is for Hurricane Harvey CDBG-DR Infrastructure funding. It is created to be used for infrastructure activities needed to fulfill an unmet need resulting from the Hurricane Harvey disaster declaration.

To be eligible for funding, all activities must have documented proof of an impact by the DR-4332 disaster declarations of 2017 and allowed under the State of Texas Action Plan for Disaster Recovery. CDBG-DR funds must be used for disaster-related expenses in the most impacted and distressed areas. An activity underway prior to a Presidential disaster declaration will not qualify unless the disaster impacted the project.

Once disaster-related impact to infrastructure, housing, and economic revitalization in the HUD and State identified most impacted and distressed areas has been established and assessed, Applicants are required to provide sufficient detail about each proposed project to identify the National Objective, the population that will receive benefit, the estimated costs and materials needed, the projected schedule to completion, any potential environmental impact, and other details specific to the type of project involved. Please be thorough in completing this application to ensure prompt review.

Applicants are encouraged to develop these recovery projects in a manner that considers an integrated approach to housing, fair housing obligations, economic revitalization, and overall community recovery. 2. Describe the current condition of the facilities. Describe any actions taken on the proposed project(s) to address the damage.

"This event is unprecedented," the National Weather Service tweeted August 27. "All impacts are unknown and beyond anything experienced. Follow orders from officials to ensure safety." Hurricane Harvey dumped over 60 inches of rain in the Golden Triangle area. Streets, homes and businesses were flooded. Residents required rescue from rooftops in many areas.

In response to Harvey, the County has developed Recovery and Resiliency Plan. Data gathered during hydrological studies have been used to develop CDBG-DR, FEMA and HMGP grants. The County proposes to utilize CDBG-DR funds to repair infrastructure that failed to perform throughout the County. The projects will mitigate future damage and make the community more resilient in the future. See attached pictures.

1. Describe the specific disaster-related impact to infrastructure, housing, and economic revitalization in the HUD and State identified most impacted and distressed areas (include date and duration), the facilities involved, and the threat that was posed to public health and safety:

Hurricane Harvey ravaged Jefferson County. Billions of dollars of damage to homes, business and public infrastructure has been reported. The damage was widespread causing the economy to fail. During the period of August 25 through 30, 2019, the record breaking rainfall wreaked havoc on Jefferson County. The failure of public infrastructure and water systems posed danger to public health and safety. Today, many families and businesses are still not fully recovered.

Jefferson County does not operate a housing authority however the Beaumont Housing Authority serves almost 3,000 families with housing opportunities in and around the region. BHA owns and manages 642 affordable rental units and an additional 705 units of non-federally subsidized affordable units through LIHTC. BHA also administers the Housing Choice Voucher Program, which provides rental assistance to more than 1,600 families. The Port Arthur Housing Authority manages 92 units of public housing and 2692 units of Housing Choice Vouchers. There is still a shortage of affordable housing within the County due to losses in housing stock incurred in Hurricanes Ike and Harvey.

2. Describe past efforts to increase the supply of affordable housing.

LONG-TERM PLANNING

Disaster recovery presents communities with unique opportunities to examine a wide range of issues including (1) housing quality and availability, (2) road and rail networks, (3) environmental issues, (4) the adequacy of existing infrastructure, (5) opportunities for the modernization of public facilities and the built environment, (6) the development of regional and integrated systems, and (7) the stimulation of the local economy impacted by the disaster.

1. Considering the local post-disaster evaluation of hazard risks, responsible flood plain management, future extreme weather/natural disaster events, and long-term risks, describe how the proposed project promotes sustainable long-term recovery.

The County's primary overall goal is to provide communities to access to safe, improved infrastructure. This supports the availability and accessibility of a suitable living environment and helps to improve economic development. The improved infrastructure will also improve access for emergency services. The overall program will reduce damage and losses to real property and lives. The Mayhaw Drainage Study will promote sustainable long-term recovery by identifying cost-effective projects to improve the drainage system and reduce the flooding in the project area. The main purpose of the study is to identify and analyze the problems that are causing flooding issues and then design improvements to best improve drainage conditions. Enlarging and adding concrete lining to Ditch No. 107 will promote long-term recovery by putting in place a ditch that will meet future needs, as well as a ditch that will maintain its size and shape during future rain events. The new ditches will be easily maintainable and can be cleaned out using standard skid-steer equipment without access issues. Installing larger culverts and realigning the concrete slope paving on Ditch No. 110-B will promote sustainable long-term recovery by putting in place additional access for future maintenance and provide better flow conveyance for future flood flows.

2. Describe how the proposed project coordinates with local and regional planning efforts to ensure consistency with and promote community-level and/or regional post-disaster recovery and mitigation planning.

In response to Hurricane Harvey's 2017 impact on Jefferson County and our regional partners', Hardin and Orange Counties, our proposed Infrastructure project will also have an impact on our bordering counties. Jefferson County's 2017 Plan Update is a multi-jurisdictional Plan. The participating jurisdictions include Jefferson County, the City of Beaumont, the City of Bevil Oaks, the City of China, the City of Groves, the City of Nederland, the City of Nome, the City of Port Arthur, the City of Port Neches, and the South East Texas Regional Planning Commission (SETRPC). These jurisdictions provided valuable input into the planning process. The goal of the Plan Update is to minimize or eliminate long-term risks to human life and property from known hazards by identifying and implementing cost-effective hazard mitigation actions. The planning process is an opportunity for Jefferson County, the participating jurisdictions, stakeholders, and the general public to evaluate and develop successful hazard mitigation actions to reduce future risk of loss of life, and damage to property resulting from a disaster in the Jefferson County planning area.

3. Describe how the proposed project integrates mitigation measures into rebuilding activities and achieves objectives outlined in community-level and/or regional post-disaster recovery and mitigation planning to reduce future risk.

The Planning Team developed hazard mitigation actions for mitigating risk from potential flooding and hurricanes, including storm-hardening or retrofitting critical facilities, regional communication sites and infrastructure throughout the County to mitigate hazard damage from water and wind, and practicing hazard mitigation techniques. In order to reduce the damage resulting from county-wide flooding that occurs during heavy rain periods, the Plan Update also includes county-wide actions to elevate or upgrade bridges, culverts and other crossings throughout Jefferson County to reduce damages by incorporating hazard mitigation activities into long-range planning, development activities, infrastructure and reduce flooding caused by undersized crossing and culverts.

4. Describe the cost and benefit analysis used in the selection of the proposed project and how they inform community-level and/or regional post-disaster recovery and mitigation planning.

The investment of federal CDBG-DR funds is almost 1/3 of the total proposed budget. Over \$13 million dollars in HMGP and FMA funds will leverage the Counties \$5.9 million allocation of CDBG-DR funds. Communities throughout Jefferson County will benefit from the improved infrastructure. The Mayhaw Drainage Study was not chosen on a cost benefit approach, however a cost benefit approach will be

utilized within the study to help determine the most cost-effective improvements to implement upon completion of the study. The use of a study is in and of itself a cost benefit approach because the study determines the proper cost benefit improvements, as opposed to moving forward with improvements without the benefit of a detailed study with a cost benefit analysis. The DD7 Crane Bayou Pump Station generator project was estimated by choosing the most cost effective generators to adequately handle the backup power needs for the pump station. The concrete lining and enlarging of Ditch No. 107 were chosen to provide a cost benefit because of the greatly decreased maintenance costs and the cost savings that will be realized through reduced flood damages. The cost of installing precast concrete boxes in Ditch No. 110-B is the best alternative given the narrow right-of-way between homes and businesses. The improved flow coveyance will provide cost savings due to decreased flood damages in the area.

5. Describe how the proposed project will avoid disproportionate impact on vulnerable populations and create opportunities to address economic inequities facing the local community.

The proposed projects will primarily benefit low to moderate income communities. Improved infrastructure will assist in access to businesses and employment opportunities.

6. Describe how the proposed project aligns with investments from other state or local capital improvements and infrastructure development efforts. Identify sources and amounts of additional infrastructure funding (state and local capital improvements projects and/or private investments.) The investment of federal CDBG-DR funds is almost 1/3 of the total proposed budget. Over \$13 million dollars in HMGP and FMA funds will leverage the Counties \$5.9 million allocation of CDBG-DR funds. Communities throughout Jefferson County will benefit from the improved infrastructure.

7. Describe how the proposed project will employ adaptable and reliable technologies to guard against premature obsolescence.

The primary cause of premature obsolescence for a drainage project such as this is a project that is unmaintainable and becomes ineffective. The technologies employed ensure that this project will last and be maintainable into the distant future. The project will have erosion control measures at all points of anticipated high velocities. The project will have slope protection where the slopes exceed 3H to 1V and can't be easily maintained with mechanized equipment. The project is designed to be easily accessed for maintenance purposes with the use of wide driveways and multiple access points. All the materials used will be of high quality with excellent durability qualities. All structural elements of the project will be designed and built with significant safety factors to insure long life. The project will be located on easements or properties that are dedicated in perpetuity to the responsible maintenance party. Crane Bayou Pump Station generators will use reliable generator types that DD7 is used to working with on other pump stations. The Mayhaw Drainage Study will incorporate into it's design phase the analysis and selection of proper adaptable and reliable materials to best achieve the needed drainage improvements, whether through the use of concrete lining, articulate block mats, fabric formed lining, concrete culverts, etc. However, most of the improvements are likely to be simply earthen excavation which will require little to no materials. The use of cast-in-place concrete for the lining of Ditch No. 107 is an adaptable and reliable technology, because the concrete can conform to the shape needed for the ditch and the extremely long life span of Portland cement concrete. The Ditch No. 110-B project uses adaptable technology by utilizing pre-cast box culverts, which fit in the narrow right-of-way and yet still convey the flood flows. Due to the structural stability of the culverts, the project is reliable with regards to long-term life and supporting adjacent structures.

It should be noted that 18 USC § 1001 states that any person who (1) knowingly or willfully falsifies, conceals, or covers up by any trick, scheme, or device of material fact, (2) makes any materially false, fictitious, or fraudulent statement or representation; or (3) makes or uses any false writing or document knowing the same to contain any materially false fact, fictitious, or fraudulent statement or is a federal offense and punishable under the law. Title 18, Section 1001 of the U.S. code states that a person is guilty of a FELONY for knowingly and willingly makes false statements to any department of the United States Government.

Each application for CDBG Disaster Recovery funding must also be accompanied by a completed and signed Application for Federal Assistance Standard Form 424 (SF-424).

Each applicant must comply with the provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), the Council on Environmental Quality (CEQ) regulations, the requirements set forth in title 24 of the Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) part 58, and applicable GLO-CDR policy directives. All applicable federal and state laws, including environmental, labor (Davis-Bacon), procurement procedures and contract requirements of 2 CFR 200.318 -200.326, and civil rights requirements apply to the use of these funds. Each applicant certifies, in compliance with with the requirements presented in Volume 83, Number 28 of the Federal Register effective February 9, 2018, that:

- 1. It has in effect and is following a residential anti-displacement and relocation assistance plan in connection with any activity assisted with funding under the CDBG-DR program;.
- 2. It is in compliance with restrictions on lobbying required by 24 CFR part 87, together with disclosure forms, if required by part 87;.
- 3. It will comply with the acquisition and relocation requirements of the Uniform Act (URA), as amended, and implementing regulations at 49 CFR part 24, except where waivers or alternative requirements are provided for in the Federal Register notice.
- 4. It will comply with section 3 of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (12 U.S.C. 1701u), and implementing regulations at 24 CFR part 135.
- 5. It is following a detailed citizen participation plan that satisfies the requirements of 24 CFR 91.105 Public Participation Plan as it pertains to local government administration of CDBG-DR funds., as applicable (except as provided for in notices providing waivers and alternative requirements for this grant). Also, each Unit of General Local Government (UGLG) receiving assistance from a state grantee must follow a detailed citizen participation plan that satisfies the requirements of 24 CFR 570.486 (except as provided for in notices providing waivers and alternative requirements for this grant).
 - a) Funds will be used solely for necessary expenses related to disaster relief, long-term recovery, restoration of infrastructure and housing, and economic revitalization in the most impacted and distressed areas for which the President declared a major disaster, DR 4332, pursuant to the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.) related to the consequences of Hurricane Harvey.
- 6. The grant will be conducted and administered in conformity with title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. 2000d) and the Fair Housing Act (42 U.S.C. 3601 -3619) and implementing regulations, and that it will affirmatively further fair housing.
- 7. It has adopted the following policies:
 - a) A policy prohibiting the use of excessive force by law enforcement agencies within its jurisdiction against any individuals engaged in non-violent civil rights demonstrations; and
 - b) A policy of enforcing applicable state and local laws against physically barring entrance to or exit from a facility or location that is the subject of such nonviolent civil rights demonstrations within its jurisdiction.
- 8. It will not use CDBG-DR funds for any activity in an area identified as flood prone for land use or hazard mitigation planning purposes by the state, local, or tribal government, or delineated as a Special Flood Hazard Area in FEMA's most current flood advisory maps, unless it also ensures that the action is designed or modified to minimize harm to or within the floodplain, in accordance with Executive Order 11988 and 24 CFR part 55. The relevant data source for this provision is the state, local, and tribal government land use regulations and hazard mitigation plans and the latest issued FEMA data or guidance, which includes advisory data (such as Advisory Base Flood Elevations) or preliminary and final Flood Insurance Rate Maps.
- 9. Its activities concerning lead-based paint will comply with the requirements of 24 CFR part 35, subparts A, B, J, K, and R.
- 10. It will comply with applicable laws.
- 11. It will comply with the environmental requirements presented in 24 CFR Part 58.

Citizen Participation Plan for Hurricane Harvey Disaster Recovery

A. Introduction

The purpose of the Citizen Participation Plan for Community Development Block Grant – Disaster Recovery funding for Hurricane Harvey, is to establish means by which residents of Jefferson County, public agencies, and other interested parties can actively participate in the development of and substantial changes to the County's funded programs.

Jefferson County has developed this Citizen Participation Plan to meet the federal and state requirements.

B. Public Meetings

Public meetings will be held in locations that are accessible to persons with disabilities, consistent with accessibility and reasonable accommodation requirements. Arrangements will be made for persons who require auxiliary aids or services, if requested at least two (2) days in advance of the meeting(s). Interpretation for persons with limited English proficiency will also be provided, if requested, at least two (2) days in advance of the meeting(s). In addition, the County will provide interpreters, without request, if a public meeting is held where a significant number of non-English speaking residents are expected to participate.

C. Public Notice

Public notice(s) shall be published with a minimum of a fourteen (14) day notice before a public meeting in at least one newspaper of general circulation and include the date, time, location, and topics to be discussed. Public notice(s) will be available in English and may also be available in Spanish and other languages, as feasible. In addition, public hearings are posted on the bulletin board at the Courthouse, readily accessible to the public at least three (3) days (72 hours) prior to the meeting date, in accordance with the Texas Open Meetings Act.

The County will provide citizens with reasonable advance notice of, and opportunity to comment on proposed disaster recovery programs or proposed changes to programs.

Jefferson County will publish the application and program guidelines on the County's website. All guidelines will initially be published for a thirty (30) day public comment period. Any substantial changes to the guidelines will be posted for a minimum of seven (7) days for public comment, and after approval by the GLO, the latest versions will be available on the County's website. Substantial changes to programs include changes to purpose, scope, location, or beneficiaries.

This shall be accomplished through one or more of the following methods:

- (a) Publication of notice in a local newspaper
- (b) Notices prominently posted in public buildings and distributed to local Public Housing Authorities and other interested community groups
- (c) Posting of notice on the County's website (if available)
- (d) Public Hearing; or
- (e) Individual notice to eligible cities and other entities as applicable using one or more of the following methods:
 - Certified mail
 - Electronic mail or fax
 - First-class (regular) mail

Personal delivery (e.g., at a Council of Governments meeting)

D. Access to Records

The County is committed to providing access to information about the Hurricane Harvey Disaster Recovery Program. During the term of the grant, the County will provide the public with reasonable and timely access to information and records related to DR Program and the use of the County's CDBG-DR funds.

E. Technical Assistance

When requested, the County shall provide technical assistance to groups representative of low- and moderate-income persons in developing proposals for the use of CDBG-DR funds, as applicable. The level and type of assistance shall be determined based upon the specific needs of the community's residents.

F. Citizen Complaints

Complaints and grievances from the public related to the Hurricane Harvey Disaster Recovery Program will be answered in writing, within fifteen (15) business days of the receipt of the complaint, according to the Hurricane Harvey Disaster Recovery Program citizen complaint procedures. Citizens may file a complaint in person or in writing at:

Documentation for complaint will be maintained. Each file will include contact information for the complainant, the initial complaint, the property address, any communications to and from the complainant, results of the investigation, together with any notes, letters or other investigative documentation, the date of the complaint or appeal was closed, and any other actions taken.
