JEFFERSON COUNTY FAST FACTS

1/26/1918

Date Commissioner's Court discontinued paying monthly rental fee of \$35 for building used as an armory in Port Arthur. Troops had been moved to a training camp in Fort Worth. The armory in Beaumont was also closed.

\$200

Amount county paid in 1918 to settle claim of damages for a mule belonging to George A. Baird that was killed after falling from a county bridge in Precinct No. 2.

\$25

Amount of monthly salary paid in April, 1918, to Mrs. Joe Babin for services performed at county jail annex or hospital. This is equivalent to \$435 in 2018.

TEXAS STATE LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES COMMISSION NEWS

World War 1 Records Available Through Texas Digital Archive

In observance of the 100th Anniversary of the United States' entrance into World War 1, the Texas State Library and Archives Commission has digitized a series of collections featuring archival holdings from the First World War through the Texas Digital Archive.

The Frank S. Tillman Collection: Major Frank S. Tillman was a veteran of the Thirty-Sixth Division, items contained in this collection include printed material, diaries, rosters, lists of wartime deaths, and assorted material produced between 1915 and 1939, documenting and describing the participation of Texas soldiers in World War I.

General John A. Hulen Papers: Records from this series include papers documenting the military career and life of Brigadier General John A. Hulen, who commanded the 72nd Infantry Brigade (1917-1919) and the 36th Infantry Division of the Texas National Guard (1922-1935). Highlights include correspondence, photographs, and scrapbooks, dating 1887-1960.

36th Division Association Papers: The Thirty-Sixth Division Association was founded in January 1946 at a meeting in Brownwood of veterans who served with the Thirty-sixth Infantry Division during World War II. The papers include correspondence, reports, military records and scrapbooks, dating 1857-1954. Records relate to Texans' experience during World War I, railroads in Texas, and the San Jacinto Monument.

Through the assembly of this collection of photographs, correspondence, and other documents the Texas State Library and Archives Commission invites researchers, scholars and other interested parties to learn the stories of the brave men and women who answered the call to serve their country and honor those who gave their lives through the ultimate sacrifice. - THC is now accepting applications for the 2018 Preservation Scholars Program, a paid internship opportunity. The goal of the program is to build interest in, and awareness of, careers in historic preservation, specifically among underrepresented cultural, ethnic, and socioeconomic groups. More information, along with the eligibility requirements and application, can be found online on the Friends of the Texas Historical Commission website.
- Disaster Response Workshops for Historic Cemeteries are being conducted by the National Center for Preservation Technology and Training

What Will We Learn?

The workshop consists of two full days of instruction, combining classroom lectures with hands-on demonstrations and field work at local cemeteries. Instructional topics include: preparing for disaster; post-disaster safety and re-entry; vegetation hazards and removal; marker stabilization; stone monument cleaning; monument resetting; and adhesive stone repairs.

Who's Leading the Workshop?

The National Center for Preservation Technology and Training (NCPTT), widely considered one of nation's leaders in historic preservation technology and cemetery preservation, led the curriculum development. On-site instructors include NCPTT staff conservator Jason Church; Rusty Brenner of Texas Cemetery Restorations LLC; Joe Ferrannini of Grave Stone Matters; and Joseph Keefe of Bartlett Tree Experts.

What Does It Cost?

Because of generous grant funding and other support from many partner organizations, registration for the two-day workshop is only \$35 per person and includes lunch on both days. Many thanks goes to the Texas Cultural Emergency Response Alliance (TX-CERA), the Department of the Interior's National Park Service, NCPTT, Friends of NCPTT, the National Endowment for Humanities, and the Museum of Fine Arts, Houston.

Where and When?

The two-day workshop will be offered twice – once in Houston (February 5 & 6) and again in Corpus Christi (February 8 & 9).

Projects: Langham House

In 1898, the Langham family built their home at 1561 Park Street. Their daughter, Ellen, married William French (son of David French, son of John Jay French) and they lived there for a time.

The house has been designated a Historical Cultural Landmark and is eligible to be on the National Register of Historic Places. The house was facing demolition, but was donated by the owner, Ms. Brenda Wilridge, to the Beaumont Heritage Society.

The Heritage Society partnered with Beaumont Main Street's Save and Secure program to move it temporarily to the corner of Royal and Park. It has been purchased and placed just one block away and restored.



JCHC MINI-MUSEUM SOUTH PARK ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

An exhibit featuring memorabilia from the South Park Alumni Association is scheduled to be installed this month.

The text for the historical marker installed in 1988 at the now demolished building states:

"Built by the South Park Independent School District in 1922-1923, this structure also housed classes of South Park Junior College for ten years. Renamed Lamar Junior College in 1932 and Lamar University in 1971, the college institution moved to its own campus in 1942. South Park High School remained at this location until 1986, when it was merged with West Brook High School and this facility became a junior high school. South Park High School represents both the past and future of education in Beaumont."
