



RALPH A. WOOSTER (1928-2018) IN MEMORIAM

Born to Cleo and John Wooster in 1928, Ralph Wooster grew up in the small town communities of Wooster and Baytown. He married Edna Jones soon after graduating from high school in 1947. Their son Robert was born in 1956. Paying for college by working at his father's service station, and with Edna's help and support, Ralph earned his BA (1949) and MA (1950) from the University of Houston, and his Ph.D. in History from the University of Texas in 1953. Following his graduate studies, Ralph was drafted and eventually assigned to the U.S. Army Historical Division and given Top Secret and Cosmic (NATO) clearance. He was stationed in Heidelberg, Germany. In a letter of commendation, his commander praised Ralph for his "superior work" in research, writing, and editing, and for "pitching in and carrying" major responsibilities." The letter also perfectly captured Ralph's character: "very courteous, cooperative and friendly," with "a pleasing personality, characterized by a quiet, dignified manner." Returning from Europe in 1955, the couple settled in Beaumont,

Texas, where Ralph joined the history faculty at Lamar University. Dr. Wooster was an outstanding teacher and received several teaching awards, taking pride never to refer to notes in his lectures. He authored or edited eleven books, including Secession Conventions of the South; The People in Power: Courthouse and Statehouse in the Lower South; Politicians, Planters and Plain Folk; Texas and Texans in the Civil War; Lone Star Generals in Gray; Lone Star Regiments in Gray; Civil War Texas; Lone Star Blue and Gray (2 editions); Texas Vistas (3 editions); Texas and Texans in World War II; and Texas and Texans in the Great War. He also co-authored Texas & Texans (1972, 1978, 1987, 1993, 2003). Texas History (2016), the work's latest edition, is the most widely adopted seventh grade Texas history text for public schools. Ralph held numerous administrative roles at Lamar University, lending his services to the institution whenever needed. In 1976, Dr. Wooster became Dean of Graduate Studies, and later served as Dean of Faculty and Associate Vice President for Academic Affairs. Ralph also served his profession with distinction. He was president of the Texas State Historical Association, the East Texas historical Association, and the Texas Association of College Teachers. Upon his retirement, Ralph was named Distinguished Professor of History Emeritus by the Board of Regents in 2006. With Edna's health declining in 2014, the couple moved to Corpus Christi, Texas to be close to their son and daughter-in-law, Catherine Cox. Although Ralph was a distinguished scholar and teacher, those who knew, loved, and respected him remember him most as a gracious and kind man, a loving and devoted husband, a wonderful father, and a good friend. He was a lifelong patriot and Democrat, a gentleman and a gentle man. An avid reader until his last days, Ralph died at the age of 90. He is survived by his son and daughter-in-law, his brother Richard Wooster, his sister Nell Teer, and his nieces Regina and Annette. "Hail and Farewell," dearest Ralph! As cemetery chair for the JCHC, I try to visit most of Jefferson County's hallowed ground quarterly. My recent journey began on a clear, sunny Sunday at Oak Bluff Cemetery in Port Neches. I was not the only one there; the crisp cool air had brought out several others. Some cleaned and placed flowers on their loved ones' graves, and soft laughter could be heard from small group reminiscing about past times with their beloved. It was certainly a beautiful day for remembrance.



My next stop was Brewer Cemetery, just off Amoco Road. The lone grave has been well protected behind a concrete barrier for the past six months because Enterprise Products had been working on their new pipeline. Next, I headed south to visit Greenlawn, Calvery, and then on to Sabine Pass. All seem to be well maintained, and the feral hog damage to the grounds of the Sabine Pass Cemetery that I noticed in 2016 no longer seems to be a major problem. Unfortunately, however, I cannot say the same about my venture north to Beaumont's Magnolia Cemetery. Feral hog damage is quite considerable on the hill (near the Ogden plots) and along the road. The cemetery is taking steps to evict the unwanted guests, but it is a work in progress.

The last stop on my journey was Lincoln Rest Cemetery on LaBelle Road. Nearly four years ago, the county cleared three acres of the eleven-acre cemetery and, I assume, tries to mow it quarterly. The cemetery was abandoned in 1950 after 20 years of providing low-income families with a final resting place for their beloved. I am unsure when or if the county will continue to clear the rest of the cemetery.

Did You Know?

In the 1920s Port Arthur boasted "The Fabulous Port Arthur Pirates", a "Semi-Pro" team of high school graduates and coaches who still wanted to play. The Pirates famously lost only one game to a team brought to Beaumont by Jim Thorpe—one of the greatest athletes of the 20th century according to *Sports Illustrated* (#7) - and the first commissioner of the NFL. The collection of Port Arthur High School football coach Tom Dennis was donated recently to the Museum of the Gulf Coast by his granddaughter Cindy Dennis Wylie. Tom Dennis played as a "Pirate" and coached Port Arthur/TJ to 1929 and 1944 State Championship victories.

JCHC Mini-Museum - Two New Exhibits

The Jefferson County Historical Commission is proud to announce a collection of 22 postcards of the 1893 and 1931 Jefferson County Courthouse is on display in the Mini Museum located on the first floor of the courthouse.

Fourteen of the cards are of the 1893 building and eight are of the current structure. The items on display are photographic scans of the postcards, printed larger than actual size. Some of the cards have been posted while most have not. The ages of the postcards are from the early 1900s to the mid-1950s. A guide for aging postcards is included.

The second exhibit consists of 22 photographs of the exterior of the current courthouse showing architectural details of the art deco building. Most of the photos were taken with a telephoto lens to get a better view of features high above ground level, including eagles, ram's heads, cattle skulls, laughing faces, windows, and friezes.

Two additional items are an 1899 photograph of the 1893 courthouse and a $\,$

representation of the current courthouse as a line drawing.

The exhibits will be on display through January 2019.
