Value of 20,000 tons of sulphur held by Union Sulphur Co. at Sabine, Texas, for the years of 1907-1920, which the Tax Assessor had failed to assess personal property taxes for fourteen years, until 9/12/1921.

11/5/1921

Date of endorsement letter to Commissioner's Court from Lodge #55 Knights of Pythias of Beaumont in favor of a new bond issue to build a permanent bridge over the Neches River and for good roads.

12/04/1939

Date of acceptance by Commissioner's Court of Award of Special Commissioners in several Eminent Domain cases in the County Court involving land taken for right-of-way for U.S. Highway 90.



VOLUNTEER HOURS AND MEMBERSHIP



In this talk, Dr. Krochmal and Dr. Moye, with moderator Dr. Wes Phelps, discuss the book's revelation that not one but two civil rights movements flourished in mid-twentieth-century Texas and they did so in intimate conversation with one another.
