THE GILBERT BUILDING

1902-2024

As most people have heard by now, the Gilbert Building in downtown Beaumont, a contributing building to the downtown National Register District, caught fire on June 6, 2024. The building has a long history in Beaumont, so we thought it would be worthy of a trip down memory lane.

Built in 1902, the current Gilbert Building was actually the second Gilbert Building to grace downtown Beaumont. The first Gilbert Building burned in a fire on October 15, 1901. John N. Gilbert immediately set about the task of rebuilding, hiring Galveston architect, George B. Stowe to design the new building. In addition to the Gilbert Building in Beaumont, George B. Stowe's work can still be seen

NEW BANK OPENS TUESDAY.

Gulf National Will Begin Business ... Immediately After Labor Day.

The Gulf National Bank, which will occupy the Pearl and Bowie street corner of the new Gilbert building, has received its fixtures and furniture, and expects to open for business Tuesday morning.

The fixtures are unusually handaome, and the arrangement is one that promises to give the greatest convenience to the officers, employes and customers of the bank.

Cashier Williams has been busy for several days superintending the pre-parations for the opening, and today there is a large force of men employed in putting the finishing touches to the interior of the building.

The Gulf National is officered by some of the strongest men, financially, in Beaumont, and the executive department will be in charge of gentlemen well known in banking circles as careful and conservative business men who, however, are anxious to extend to their customers every accommodation consistent with sound banking.

The Gilbert building went on to house over 400 businesses, with notable names such as Marrs McLean, Hightower, Orgain & Butler Attorneys at Law, William D. Gordon, Walter J. Crawford, the Beaumont Baseball Company, Majestic Photo Finisher, Sun Pipeline Co., Stanolind Oil & Gas and many others.

In 1914, the Gilbert Building was a "victim of flames" yet again. On Christmas night, a suspected firecracker thrown in the elevator shaft caused the building to go up in flames. Damages at that time were expected to total \$65,000, though future reports conclude that Mr. Gilbert was able to rebuild for about \$35,000. An article from the Beaumont Enterprise on January 28, 1915 describes the rebuilding of the Gulf National Bank and the "repairs and changes made, which will make the place one of the handsomest in this section of the state." The same article states that the bank expected to be "completed and ready for reopening about February 15." An ad, seen below, from the Beaumont Enterprise, March 10, 1915 announced that the Gulf National Bank would reopen on March 15th.



John Nathan Gilbert and the Gilbert family were involved in the business and civic circles of Jefferson County for decades. A short list of companies or organizations that the Gilberts participated in includes the Nona Mills Lumber, Gilbert Oil, Magnolia Cemetery, Gilbert Ranch and the Gilbert Ranch Rodea, Yount-Lee Oil, Beaumont Lumber Company, The Masonic Lodge and Beaumont-Port Arthur Ship Channel.

As the county commission for historic preservation, the JCHC remains hopeful that the building's owner will be able to safely stabilize the structure and save the façade, while restoring or renovating the interior to be a functional space in downtown Beaumont once again. Though the building is 122 years old, the connections to our community remain. With over 400 tenants through the life of the building, the people who's livelihoods were contained within its walls touch all corners of our city and we hope not to lose that link to our shared past.



MARKER SPOTLIGHT

Beauxart Gardens 8900 Block of Central Drive Nederland



Named for its location between Beaumont and Port Arthur, Beauxart Gardens was developed during the Great Depression by the U.S. Government as a federal subsistence homestead colony under the National Industrial Recovery Act of 1933. The act encouraged urban and rural workers to supplement their incomes through agriculture. Residents worked part-time at area refineries and kept gardens and livestock. One of five such colonies in Texas, Beauxart Gardens was located on fertile rice land and provided a total of 50 families with a house and acreage. In 1934, the U.S. Government bought 205 acres of land from Frank D. and Lillian Mabry and Ed and Mary Mittie for the creation of Beauxart Gardens. Plans included homesteads of approximately 2.5 to 4.5 acres, two dedicated parks, two shelled public roads and a community center, all protected by fence and cattle guards. Residents purchased homesteads for an average of \$3000, payable over a period of forty years. In addition to a modest frame home, each homestead included a combination garage and cow barn and a chicken house. The federal government transferred title to the Beauxart Homestead Association in 1936 but continued to provide agricultural and related instruction during the Depression. The Beauxart Homestead Association maintained its oversight of the community's development, and the community center was the location of frequent civic and social activities. In 1942 it became the polling place for a new voting precinct at Beauxart Gardens. Today, Beauxart Gardens retains its identity as a successful New Deal program.

The Ice House Museum is located at 818 Earnest Avenue, Silsbee, Texas 77656.



July 1, 1882– The first traffic law was passed for Jefferson July 11, 1879- The Post Office opened in Nome. County.

July 1, 1897– The summer of 1897, Port Arthur Land Co. began construction of the Orange Hotel in Nederland for the purpose of housing immigrants brought to the area.

July 1, 1903 – The Beaumont Light Guard became known as Co. M, Third Infantry, Texas National Guard, following passage of Texas Senate Bill 165

July 4, 1976 – Dedication of 20 acres of land for the William Doornbos Park, located in the 2300 block of Avenue H in Nederland.

July 5, 1932 – Billywalker soft drink introduced by Beaumont soda manufacturer of the same name, Billy Walker.

July 6, 1931 – Beaumont Exporters set a Texas League record with 6 triples.

July 9, 1980 – John Paul Davis took an oath of office, becoming Beaumont's first African-American Judge.

July 11, 1881 – The city of Beaumont was incorporated under a general statute.

July 15, 1902 – Rosenthal Dry Goods opened.

July 17, 1897 – The first land in Nederland purchased by George Reinstra. He purchased 80 acres for \$800.00 cash from KCS Railroad, which became Lots 1,2 and 3 on Boston Avenue.

July 22, 1904 – G.W. Carroll accepted National Prohibition Party's nomination as U.S. Vice President.

July 23, 1919 – Cleveland Nisby, local civil rights activist and community leader, was born.

July 24, 1963 - Canvass of election was held to incorporate the Town of Bevil Oaks. The measure passed.

July 25, 1948– The Melody Maids, on tour in New York to sing at Lions International convention, make their television debut on the Dumont Ward Show.

July 31, 1925- "Free Beer Day" sponsored by XXX Root Beer was celebrated at ballparks in Beaumont, Nederland & Port Arthur.
