Master Services Agreement

This Master Services Agreement (this “Agreement”) is by and between Jefferson County, Texas, hereinafter referred to as “Customer,” and Smart Communications Holding, Inc. and/or its designated subsidiary or assignee, with principal offices located at 10491 72nd Street, Seminole, FL 33777, hereinafter referred to as “Provider.”

This Agreement supersedes any and all other agreements made between the Parties, written, oral or otherwise.

Whereas, Customer desires that Provider install an inmate communications system(s) and provide inmate communications and maintenance services according to the terms and conditions in this Agreement, and according to the Schedules, which are incorporated by reference into this Agreement, and;

Whereas, Provider agrees to install the inmate communications system(s) and provide inmate communications and maintenance services according to the terms and conditions in this Agreement, and according to the Schedules, which are incorporated by reference into this Agreement.

Now therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth, the Parties, intending to be legally bound, agree as follows:

1. Systems. This Agreement specifies the general terms and conditions under which Provider will perform certain inmate related services and systems (the “System(s)”) for the Customer. Additional terms and conditions with respect to the Systems will be specified in the Schedules entered into by the Parties and attached (the “Schedules”). The Schedules are incorporated into this Agreement and are subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement. In the event of any conflict between this Agreement and a Schedule, the terms of the Schedule shall govern.

2. Use of Systems and Exclusivity. In exchange for Provider installing, providing, and supporting its System and inmate communication services throughout Customer’s Facility at no cost to Customer, Customer acknowledges, agrees, and grants to Provider the exclusive right to provide such services in Customer’s Facility. Provider shall have the exclusive right to install, maintain, and derive revenue from and through Provider’s inmate communication services and Systems including, without limitation, the related hardware and software, located in the Customer Facility as identified on the Schedules. Customer agrees that it will not resell, grant, or provide access to Provider’s services or System, directly or indirectly, to any third party unless agreed to by Provider in a separate written agreement. During and subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, Provider shall be the sole and exclusive provider of inmate telephone services (ITS) and all inmate communication services available on or provided by a tablet or kiosk system as set forth in the accompanying Schedule(s), including but not limited to video and data services (e.g., electronic video visitation, electronic messaging and email, texting, photo delivery, and electronic entertainment) and inmate software applications (e.g., electronic delivery of routine postal mail, electronic medical or general requests, electronic grievances, electronic law library, and electronic education).

3. Hardware and Software License. For the term of this Agreement, Provider grants Customer a non-exclusive, non-transferable license to access and use certain proprietary computer software and hardware products and materials in connection with our inmate services and Systems. Provider will provide free of charge all Software upgrades, modifications, and updates. All hardware upgrades, modifications and updates will be done at Provider’s sole discretion.

Provider makes no representation or warranty as to the legality of monitoring or archiving such communications and activities.

4. Ownership. Smart Communications is and shall remain the owner of the equipment provided by Smart Communications whether or not physically attached to real estate.

5. License Restrictions: The Software is to be used solely in connection with Provider’s Services by Customer and inmates housed at Customer’s Facility in connection with Provider’s services and Systems. The Hardware is to be used solely by inmates housed at Customer’s Facility to access Provider’s services and Systems. Unless and only to



the extent that this Agreement expressly permits, Customer must not:

- i. permit any parent, subsidiary, affiliated entity or third party to use the Hardware or Software;
- ii. rent, lease, lend, assign, sublicense, encumber or otherwise transfer or attempt to transfer the Hardware or Software or any portion thereof;
- iii. alter, create derivatives of, or modify the Hardware or Software in any way, or allow a third party to do so;
- iv. connect the Software or Hardware to any third-party products or services that were not approved of in writing by Provider;
- v. distribute or otherwise make the Hardware or Software or any password, key, or other access code for the Software available to any third party;
- vi. reverse engineer, decompile, or disassemble the Hardware or Software, or allow a third party to do so;
- vii. defeat or work around any access restrictions or encryption in the Software, or allow a third party to do so;
- viii. remove, minimize, block, or modify any titles, logos, trademarks, copyright and patent notices, digital watermarks, disclaimers, or other legal notices that are included in the Software, whether or not they are Provider's or a third party's;

6. **Title.** Provider shall have and retain all rights, title, and interest in the products and services provided to Customer. The Hardware, Software, Systems, networking, and cabling, including all modifications and updates of Software, shall at all times remain the sole and exclusive property of the Provider. Any trade secrets, methodology and processes of our services and Systems constitute proprietary information of Provider, regardless of any part or portion thereof is the subject of a valid copyright or patent. During the term of this agreement and for the time period(s) as stated in the Schedule for Systems, we will provide you access to the records.

7. **Term.** This Agreement shall commence on the effective date and shall continue for a period of three (3) years from the date of system going live. After the original three (3) year term, this Agreement shall have two (2) optional one (1) year renewals annually, unless either party provides notice of non-renewal at least ninety (90) days prior to the end of the then current term. The terms and conditions herein shall govern for so long as Provider continues to provide its system and services.

8. **Limitation of Liability.** To the maximum extent permitted by applicable law, Provider shall indemnify and hold harmless Customer, his agents, servants and employees from any and all claims, actions, lawsuits, judgments or liabilities of any kind whatsoever deriving from negligent acts or omissions of the Provider, its agents or sub-contractors. Each Party agrees that it shall be solely responsible for the negligent or wrongful acts of its own employees. However, nothing contained herein shall constitute a waiver by Customer of its sovereign immunity or other applicable State Statutes. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Agreement or Schedules, in no event will Provider's liabilities under this agreement, whether under contract law, tort law, warranty, or otherwise, exceed the total amount of revenue received by Provider pursuant to this agreement, during the twelve (12) month period before the date the claim arose.

9. **Confidential Information and Non-Disclosure.** The parties acknowledge that in their performance of their duties hereunder either party may communicate to the other (or its designees) certain confidential and proprietary information, including without limitation information concerning the party's services and know-how, technology, techniques, or business or marketing plans related thereto (collectively, the "Confidential Information") all of which are confidential and proprietary to, and trade secrets of, the disclosing party (the "Disclosing Party"). As a condition to the receipt of the Confidential Information from the Disclosing Party, the receiving party (the "Receiving Party") shall, at all times during and after the term of this Agreement (i) not disclose in any manner, directly or indirectly, to any third party any portion of the Confidential Information; (ii) not use the Confidential Information in any fashion except to perform its duties hereunder or with the Disclosing Party's express prior written consent; (iii) disclose the Confidential Information, in whole or in part, only to employees and agents who need to have access thereto for the Receiving Party's internal business purposes; (iv) take all necessary steps to ensure that its employees and agents are informed of and comply with the confidentiality restrictions contained in this Agreement; and (v) take all necessary precautions to protect the confidentiality of the Confidential Information received hereunder and exercise at least the



same degree of care in safeguarding the Confidential Information as it would with its own confidential information, and in no event shall apply less than a reasonable standard of care to prevent disclosure. The Receiving Party shall promptly notify the Disclosing Party of any unauthorized disclosure or use of the Confidential Information. The Receiving Party shall cooperate and assist the Disclosing Party in preventing or remedying any such unauthorized use or disclosure. The term "Confidential Information" does not include, and the obligations and undertakings set out in this section do not apply to: (a) Information which now is in the public domain or publicly known at the time of disclosure or hereafter comes into the public domain or generally known through no fault of the Receiving Party, otherwise than by reason of breach of this Agreement; (b) Information the disclosure of which is requested or required by law, regulation, court order or a regulatory agency, provided that, prompt notice of such requested disclosure shall be given to the Disclosing Party, if legally permitted, so that Disclosing Party may seek appropriate remedy to prevent such disclosure or waive compliance with the provisions of this Agreement and the Receiving Party, its directors, officers, employees, agents and advisers shall reasonably co-operate with the Disclosing Party, at the Disclosing Party's sole cost and expense, if the Disclosing Party elects to challenge the validity of such requirement and/or take such steps as the Disclosing Party may reasonably require to avoid or limit such disclosure; (c) Information that was previously known to the Receiving Party free of any obligation of confidentiality; (d) Information that is independently developed by the Receiving Party without reference to or use of the Confidential Information; or (e) Information that is disclosed to the Receiving Party by a third party not under or in violation of, as the case may be, any confidentiality undertaking to the Disclosing Party. Subsections (a) through (e) of this paragraph notwithstanding, the parties agree that the technology behind the Providers Services and Systems is Confidential Information and is a trade secret of Provider.

10. Default and Termination. If either party defaults in the performance of any obligation under this agreement, then the non-defaulting Party must give written notice to the defaulting Party specifically describing the nature of default and clearly notifying the defaulting party that the written notice is being provided pursuant to this provision. The defaulting Party shall have ninety (90) days after receipt of notice of default to cure. If it is not reasonable to cure the default within 90 days, then the right to cure period shall be extended to a reasonable cure period as long as the defaulting Party has made good faith attempts to cure the default. Upon termination of this Agreement, Provider shall remove all hardware and software Systems except for the cabling and conduit which shall become the property of the Customer. Provider shall have the right to immediately terminate this Agreement if Customer breaches the Confidentiality or Non-Disclosure provisions of this Agreement.

11. Insurance. Provider shall maintain General Liability Insurance including but not limited to bodily injury, property damage and personal injury with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit covering all work performed under this contract. Provider shall maintain automobile insurance including bodily injury and property damage including all vehicles owned, leased, hired and non-owned vehicles with limits of not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit covering all work performed under this contract. Provider shall provide Worker's Compensation Insurance, on behalf of all employees who are to provide a service under this contract and Employers Liability with limits of not less than \$100,000 per employee per accident. Customer agrees to furnish to Provider timely written notice of any claim, demand, or cause of action made or brought against Customer or where Provider is listed as a Co-Defendant arising out of or relating to the Systems and Services we provide to you.

12. Employees. Provider represents that it has, or will secure at its own expense, all personnel required in performing its obligations under this Agreement. All of the services required hereunder will be performed by the Provider or under its supervision and all personnel engaged in the work shall be fully qualified to perform such services. Provider and any subcontractors used in the performance of the responsibilities listed herein must maintain a drug-free workplace policy. Customer acknowledges that Provider is an independent contractor and nothing in this Agreement is intended nor shall be construed to create an agency relationship, and employer/employee relationship, a joint venture relationship or any other relationship allowing Customer to exercise control or discretion over the manner by which Provider performs hereunder. Provider expressly agrees that it shall be solely responsible for supervising its employees, that it shall comply with all rules, regulations, orders, standards and interpretations promulgated pursuant to the OSHA Act of 1970, including but not limited to training, recordkeeping, providing personal protective equipment, lock/tag out procedures, material safety data sheets and labeling. Provider certifies that neither it nor any subcontractors used to accomplish its obligations hereunder, shall employ unauthorized aliens. Provider certifies that in accordance with the provisions of Title VII of the 1968 Civil Rights Act as amended by the Equal Employment



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Opportunity Act of 1972 and Executive Order 11914, that neither it nor any subcontractors used to accomplish its obligations hereunder discriminate on the basis of race, color, sex, religion, age, national origin or disability in their employment practices.

Miscellaneous

13. Warranty Against Contingent Fees. Provider warrants that no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit this contract upon an agreement of understanding for commission, percentage, brokerage or contingency, except bona fide employees or selling agents maintained by the Provider for the purpose of securing business.

14. Subcontracts. Provider shall be allowed to use subcontractors for the purpose of completing the provisions of electrical work upon installation or repair of equipment of this Agreement.

15. Provider Personnel. All Provider personnel being permitted to work in the Customer Jail Facility will be subject to a security/background check by the Office of the Sheriff.

16. Provider Cooperation. Provider shall, at all times observe and comply with all Federal, State, and local municipal laws, ordinances, rules and regulations in any way affecting the Agreement. The Provider shall maintain regular communications with Customer, or its designees, and shall actively cooperate in all matters pertaining to this Agreement. Provider shall answer all subpoenas within thirty (30) days of issuance of subpoena.

17. Public Information. Neither the Provider nor the Customer shall publish any findings based on data obtained from the operation of this agreement without the prior consent of the other party, whose written consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

18. Permits and Licenses. All permits and licenses required by Federal, State, local laws, rules, and regulations necessary for the implementation of the work undertaken by the Provider pursuant to the Agreement shall be served and paid for by the Provider. It is the responsibility of the Provider to have and maintain the appropriate certificate(s) valid for work to be performed and valid for the jurisdiction in which the work is to be performed for all persons working on the job for whom a certificate is required.

19. Third-party Rights. The rights, obligations and duties contained in this Agreement shall exist exclusively between the Parties. The Parties expressly agree and intend that they alone shall have the exclusive rights to seek legal or equitable enforcement, remedy, injunctive relief or to bring a breach of Agreement action. The Parties do not intend to create, nor shall this Agreement be construed to create in any other individual or entity the status of a third-party beneficiary.

20. Waiver of Breach. The waiver by either party of a breach or violation of any provision of this Agreement shall not operate as, or be construed to be, a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or other provision hereof.

21. Compliance with Laws. Provider shall comply with all Federal, State and local laws, rules, and regulations applicable to the services or payments for services under this Agreement.

22. Governing Law. The parties mutually consent to the jurisdiction of and agree that any litigation arising hereunder shall be brought in Jefferson County, Texas and governed by the laws of the state of Texas.

23. Attorney Fees. In the event of litigation concerning this Agreement, the Parties shall each be responsible for their own attorney's fees and costs.

24. Completeness of Agreement. This Agreement, together with any additional or supplementary Schedules or documents incorporated herein by specific reference contain all the terms and conditions agreed upon by the parties hereto, and no other agreements, oral or otherwise, regarding the subject matter of this Agreement or any part thereof shall have any validity or bind any of the Parties hereto. This Agreement may be amended or revised only in writing



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and signed by all the parties.

25. Force Majeure. Provider will not be deemed in violation of this Agreement if it is prevented from performing any of its obligations hereunder for any reason beyond its control, including without limitations, strikes, inmate disturbances, failure of Customer to provide proper security services, acts of God, civil or military authority, acts of public enemy, war, terrorism, accidents, fires, explosions, earthquakes, floods, or any similar cause beyond the reasonable control of either Party.

26. Assignment. Provider may assign this Agreement or any interest herein at any time to any parent, successor, or subsidiary with prior written notice to Customer.

27. Severability. In the event any provision of this Agreement is held to be unenforceable for any reason, the unenforceability thereof shall not affect the remainder of the Agreement which shall remain in full force and effect and enforceable in accordance with its terms.

28. Matters to be Disregarded. The titles of the several sections, subsections and paragraphs set for in this Agreement are inserted for convenience of reference only and shall be disregarded in construing or interpreting any of the provisions of this Agreement.

29. Interpretation. The language in this Agreement is to be construed according to its plain meaning and not strictly for or against either party. The parties have reviewed this Agreement and no ambiguities are known to exist; however, to the extent any ambiguity is later discovered, any rule that such ambiguity is to be resolved for or against either party does not apply.

30. Notices. Any notices, demands, payments or reports required by this Agreement shall be in writing and sufficient if sent by the parties hereto via registered or certified United States mail, postage prepaid, to the notice addresses noted below the Parties signatures on the signature page.

31. Counterparts. This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed to be an original, but all of which together shall constitute the same Agreement. Any signature page of any such counterpart, or any telecopy or other electronic facsimile thereof, may be attached or appended to any other counterpart to complete a fully executed counterpart of this Agreement, and any telecopy or other electronic transmission of a signature shall be deemed an original and shall bind the party who made such signature.

32. Authority. Each Party represents and warrants that it has the authority to enter into this Agreement, and that the individual signing on its behalf likewise has authority to do so.

1. Customer grants to Provider the exclusive right to install and maintain Inmate Telephone Services within and throughout Facility, including for any future expansion of telephone service to buildings or locations under control of Facility, during the term of this Agreement.
2. All calls from the Minnie Rogers Juvenile Justice Center shall be free of charge. Provider shall otherwise establish rates for telephone services as set forth below.

3. This Agreement includes all other premises, whether now existing (e.g., if a different vendor has a contract and equipment at such premises, this clause applies at the earliest termination opportunity) or subsequently acquired, under the control of Customer within Provider's service areas. Customer will advise Provider in writing, of newly



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opened, acquired, or available premises, promptly, and Provider can evaluate installation of its telephone services at these premises.

4. In consideration of the compensation paid to Customer under this Agreement, Customer expressly waives carrier selection rights, where applicable, and Provider expressly reserves the right to select and/or contract for the local, intraLATA and interLATA carrier selections for the telephones subject to this Agreement and intended for placement at Customer locations.

Smart Communications' Responsibilities (Inmate Telephone System)

5. Provider's telephone services and system are provided by way of Provider's Smart-EVO™ ITS terminals, which will be installed in quantities and at locations that are mutually agreed upon by both parties.

6. Provider shall service and maintain its telephone system and Smart-EVO™ ITS terminals at Provider's expense, except as otherwise agreed upon herein.

7. Provider shall comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) for all equipment it provides.

8. Provider shall provide the Customer an annual review of revenue performance, facility service needs, and expansion requirements and will discuss with the Customer the appropriate action to be taken by Provider at the Customer's request.

Commissions and Payments

9. Provider agrees to pay Customer certain commissions collected from its inmate phone system. Said commission is based upon Customer's grant to Provider exclusivity for the services described herein, including secure two-way electronic messaging, video visitation, and entertainment.

10. Provider shall make monthly commission payments to Customer in the amount of Eighty-Five percent (85%) of revenues generated from all phone calls made on its Inmate Telephone System, regardless of call type or call rate. Provider shall additionally pay Customer 100% of revenue generated from inbound voicemail messages, which are provided at a fixed rate of \$1.00 per voicemail.

11. Starting the first month after Provider's system and services are installed and live, Provider will pay Customer said commission payments on or before the 30th day of the month.

12. Commission schedule is based on rate caps as of the time Provider's proposal was made. To the extent the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) or other governing body changes allowable rates, Provider shall have the right to renegotiate commissions, which the parties agree to do in good faith.

Customer's Responsibilities (Inmate Phone System)

13. Customer agrees to provide adequate space for installation of Provider's Smart-EVO™ ITS terminals, and easy accessibility for inmate use during the normal operating hours. In the event Customer is not the owner of the premises, Customer shall, where necessary, obtain permission from the building owner or owner's agent for the placement of the ITS terminals, and shall be responsible for any fees for use of required riser cable and electric power.

14. Customer agrees to maintain the area around the ITS terminals and ensure safe and ready access by inmates.

15. Customer agrees to allow Provider access to perform maintenance during the established hours of accessibility as jointly agreed by the parties, except when access must be denied to ensure the safety of Provider service personnel and/or to maintain institutional control.



16. Customer agrees to allow Provider, with prior written approval of Customer, access to and use of house cable and inside wire at no cost, in order to install and provide telephone service. Any new house cable or inside wire required during the contract term will be at the sole expense of the Provider, unless otherwise negotiated with Customer.
17. Customer agrees that any relocation, expansion, addition, or removal of ITS hardware, equipment, or terminals, which would result in extraordinary expenses must be agreed to by Provider in advance of the cost being incurred or alternately, the cost be paid by Customer.
18. Customer agrees to exercise reasonable and ordinary care to prevent the loss through theft or damage to the ITS terminals and equipment from any source.
19. Customer agrees to, at its option, purchase and provide enclosures at its own expense for Telephones. In the event Customer elects to provide its own enclosures, Customer shall be responsible for installation and maintenance of said enclosures.
20. Customer represents and warrants that Provider's ITS system will be installed on property owned by the Customer, or if Customer is not the owner of the premises, Customer has obtained permission from the Facility's owner or owner's agent.

SmartTablet™ and Secure Network

21. The SmartTablet™ system and its entire supporting infrastructure are provided at no cost to Customer or inmates.
22. The SmartTablet™ is a custom, wireless, ruggedized and correctional grade tablet of our custom specifications that will connect to our secure network.
23. Provider will furnish its proprietary SmartTablet™ devices on an initial 1:4 inmate to tablet ratio based on the average daily population ("ADP") with the option to change ratio based on usage (greater than forty percent (40%)) as requested by Customer. Sufficient reserve tablets shall also be provided. Customer shall determine which inmates have access to the SmartTablets™.
24. The SmartTablet™ software operating system and applications are all custom-compiled for a corrections environment to ensure that only the minimum operating system components and applications are present. The inmate only has access to applications that are approved for their use, and the operating system is only allowed to connect to our own secure wireless network within the facility.
25. The network itself is designed to facilitate applications within a corrections environment. We utilize a deny-by-default policy on all traffic, so nothing may traverse the network unless specifically allowed and enabled. We utilize a defense-in-depth strategy which employs many layers of security. If any one layer of security is breached, there are many others to provide continuing protection.

Distribution and Refurbishment Plan (SmartTablets™)

26. We will provide a tablet charging station and "home base" within each housing unit within the facility. These home bases will be permanently installed into a housing area (e.g. wall mounted). Each home base provides the necessary connections for charging the tablets, as well as a convenient storage location to ensure all tablets are accounted for during non-usage times.
27. Each tablet is assigned to a specific housing area and will only allow inmates within that housing area to sign in and use a tablet. Individual tablets are not assigned to specific inmates. Any inmate in a given housing unit may use any tablet that is assigned to that housing unit. If a tablet that an inmate is using stops working, they can return it to



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a deputy for maintenance, and then take a different tablet and sign on and gain full access to their account and content. Provider will provide to the Customer a sufficient number of extra SmartTablets™ so that the available number of SmartTablets™ will always meet the approved ratio. In the event a tablet stops working, no longer holds a charge, is damaged, or is otherwise in need of service, facility staff can replace the malfunctioning tablet with a new working SmartTablet™. We will provide pickup and delivery of malfunctioning and replacement SmartTablets™ at no charge to Customer.

Damage (SmartTablets™)

28. The tablets provided are ruggedized for use in a correctional setting. They have been drop tested from two stories high to a concrete floor without damage; however, if an inmate is determined, they can be damaged enough to require repair. Should this occur, the facility will be required to fill out a damage report form. We will seek restitution from the inmate with the assistance of your agency.

SmartInmate™ Electronic Messaging

29. Provider will provide a fully functional electronic messaging system for the inmates of the Customer's Facility (SmartInmate™). Provider is responsible for providing and installing all of the hardware, the software to include the operating systems and application software, and all networking requirements needed for operation of the system. Provider shall be exclusively entitled to all revenue derived from electronic messaging and photo delivery.
30. Provider will provide at no cost to Customer the labor for the installation of the SmartInmate™ electronic messaging system.
31. Provider will provide at no cost to Customer the labor, hardware, and software needed for the continued operating, maintaining, and networking of the electronic messaging system.
32. Provider is responsible for all the costs and future costs associated with any modification, reconfiguration, or upgrade of the electronic messaging system at the Customer's Facility. These costs do not include the costs of the actual electrical power.
33. Provider will provide each inmate at Customer's Facility with credits for two (2) messages per week at no charge, to satisfy the needs of indigent inmates.
34. Customer shall have the capability of monitoring and reviewing all electronic messages and attachments sent through the electronic messaging system, except those messages deemed to be privileged under law between attorney and client. Further, Provider will maintain a record of all electronic messages sent through the electronic messaging system for a period of seven (7) years from the time the message is sent.
35. Friends and Family can access the electronic messaging and photo delivery system via the SmartInmate.com website.
36. Electronic Messaging. Each email message is billed at fifty cents (\$0.50), which corresponds to 50 credits.
37. Photo Delivery Service. Each approved photo is billed at one dollar (\$1.00), which corresponds to 100 credits.
38. Provider shall pay Customer a commission in the amount of ten percent (10%) of revenues collected from electronic messaging credits used. For clarity, this shall not include the use of unpaid credits that are provided at no charge for weekly free messages or in connection with other promotions.
39. Provider shall pay commissions to Customer on a monthly basis, no later than thirty (30) calendar days from the end of each calendar month for which the messaging services are provided.



Customer's Responsibilities (SmartInmate™ Electronic Messaging)

40. Customer will provide access to the Customer Jail Facilities and space within the Facilities, subject to operational security requirements, for Provider to install, network, and maintain the electronic messaging system. Emergency access to the system will be granted as needed Monday through Friday 8:00 am to 4:00 pm. Non-emergency access will be granted within twenty-four (24) hour notice by Provider.
41. Customer will include information regarding the SmartInmate™ messaging system in Facility's Inmate Handbook and in all other areas where information on the Inmate Telephone System is located.
42. Customer will provide information regarding the SmartInmate™ messaging system in at least one location next to the inmate mailing address on Customer's website, with a link to the SmartInmate.com website.
43. Upon completion of installation and appropriate system testing, Customer will allow the electronic messaging to go live within forty-eight (48) hours' notice of system availability.
44. Customer will provide a list electronically twice each day of all inmates residing in the Customer Jail Facilities and their current housing assignments. Provider will use this listing to ensure that each inmate is authorized to use only those kiosks and tablets appropriate to their housing assignment.
45. Customer will give prompt notice, in writing, to Provider of any trouble or irregularity in the functioning of the electronic messaging system, as a whole.

Patented MailGuard Postal Mail Elimination® System

46. Provider is the exclusive licensee of MailGuard®, the patented postal mail elimination system covered by U.S. Patent Nos. 1,0291,617, 1,145,013, and multiple pending patent applications.
47. Provider shall provide its patented MailGuard Postal Mail Elimination® system at no cost to Customer. Provider's MailGuard® service converts regular (non-legal) incoming postal mail into an electronic document that is delivered to the inmate recipient via the SmartTablets™ devices within the Customer's Facility.
48. Provider shall provide all the equipment and support services to operate the MailGuard® system and transmit incoming routine postal mail into an electronic document to be delivered to the inmate on the SmartTablets™ devices at no cost to Customer.
49. For purposes of this agreement, "routine mail" means all regular incoming correspondence between inmates, family and friends and excludes all legal mail, packages, books, magazines, periodicals and religious mail. All legal mail, packages, books, magazines, or other non-routine inmate mail will still be sent to Customer's Facility for delivery.
50. MailGuard® will only integrate with and transmit incoming routine mail to the SmartTablets™.
51. Provider is responsible for all the future costs associated with any modification, reconfiguration, or upgrade of the MailGuard® system at the Customer Jail Facilities. These costs do not include the costs of the actual electrical power.
52. MailGuard® shall become the Inmates' designated Agent to process and electronically deliver incoming routine inmate mail pursuant to Customer's mail policy which shall promote the intent of this Agreement.
53. Customer will instruct and publish on its website that all incoming routine mail must be sent to the designated Post Office Box for electronic delivery via the MailGuard® system.



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54. Provider shall be solely responsible for the cost of maintaining the Post Office Box designated by the Customer for incoming routine mail to be sent.
55. Provider will retrieve incoming routine mail from the designated Post Office Box and process and transmit that mail in an expeditious manner.
56. The MailGuard[®] public website will allow inmates to log into their account and retrieve electronic copies of their processed incoming routine mail for thirty (30) days from the date of their release from the Customer's Facility.
57. Provider will maintain electronic records for a period of seven (7) years from the date of the inmate's release from the Customer's Facility. During the term of this Agreement and upon request, we will provide Customer with electronic copies of the requested record for the purpose of inspecting, examining, and auditing the Provider's records directly relevant to Customer's Facility.
58. MailGuard[®] will provide Customer with the capability of monitoring and reviewing all electronic mail sent through the MailGuard[®] system. All "Legal" mail received by Provider (intentionally or inadvertently) will be rejected, marked "Return to Sender," and not processed by Provider.

Customer's Responsibilities (MailGuard[®])

59. Customer shall be responsible for informing inmates and inmates' friends and family that all routine, non-legal correspondence must be sent to the designated MailGuard[®] Post Office Box. Customer will include information regarding the MailGuard[®] system in the Inmate Handbook and in all other areas where information regarding the Inmate Mail Policy and Procedures are located.
60. Customer will provide information regarding Customer's incoming postal mail policy, the MailGuard[®] system and the MailGuard[®] procedure for processing and/or disposing of all incoming mail and pictures in at least one location next to the inmate mailing address on the Customer's website and very clearly state that all incoming routine mail MUST be mailed to the MailGuard[®] designated Post Office Box.
61. Customer will instruct on its website that all incoming routine mail must be sent to the designated Post Office Box for electronic delivery via the MailGuard[®] system and display information regarding the Customer's incoming postal mail policy, the MailGuard[®] system and the MailGuard[®] procedure for processing and/or disposing of all incoming mail and pictures.
62. Should the Customer receive incoming routine mail instead of the designated Post Office Box, the Customer shall mark such mail "Return to Sender" and reject it, or it may optionally forward said mail to Provider for processing by MailGuard[®].
63. Upon completion of installation and appropriate system testing, Customer will allow the MailGuard[®] system to go live within forty-eight (48) hours' notice of system availability.
64. Customer will provide a list electronically twice each day of all inmates residing in the Customer Jail Facilities and their current housing assignments.
65. Customer will give prompt notice in writing to Provider of any trouble or irregularity in the functioning of the MailGuard[®] system.

Patented MailGuard Legal[™] System

66. Provider is the exclusive licensee of MailGuard Legal[™], the patented postal mail elimination system for legal mail covered by U.S. Patent No. 10,659,630 and other pending patent applications.



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67. Provider will provide, install, and maintain its patented MailGuard Legal™ Mail system, which will include a sufficient number of MailGuard Legal™ Mail Scanning Carts to handle the volume of legally privileged mail or other mail deemed to be legal mail (the "Legal Mail") to be processed by the Facility.
68. Customer acknowledges and agrees that Legal Mail must be opened in the presence of the inmate.
69. Provider will install and maintain its proprietary software and the additional infrastructure necessary to operate its patented MailGuard Legal™ system, at no cost to Customer.
70. The Legal Mail may be scanned in the presence of the inmate for electronic delivery to the inmate or printed to hard copy for physical delivery to the inmate, in accordance with Provider's patented MailGuard Legal™ system.
71. Customer understands and agrees that the MailGuard Legal™ system does not allow for any electronic copies of Legal Mail to be monitored, reviewed, or investigated.
72. Customer agrees to adhere to all applicable laws in order to maintain the privileged nature of privileged communications while using or supervising the inmates' use of Provider's patented MailGuard Legal™ Mail system.

Digital MailGuard Legal™

73. Provider will provide at no cost to Customer its Digital MailGuard Legal™ system for use by the inmates of the Customer's jail facility and their attorneys. Provider is exclusively responsible for providing all hardware, software, and all networking requirements needed for operation of the system.
74. Provider shall facilitate the electronic delivery of digital copies of legal mail sent from attorneys who have been pre-approved by Customer directly to inmates through Provider's proprietary digitally encrypted process.
75. The encrypted digital files can only be opened by inmates using Provider's system with Provider's proprietary authentication protocols. Once authenticated, inmates can view digitally transmitted legal mail and legal documents via Provider's SmartTablet™ devices using a separate login process.
76. Customer acknowledges and understands that Provider's MailGuard Legal™ system does not allow for any digital copies of legal mail to be monitored, reviewed, accessed, or investigated.
77. Customer agrees to adhere to all applicable laws in order to maintain the privileged nature of privileged communications while supervising the inmates' use of Provider's Digital MailGuard Legal™ system.

Video Visitation

78. Provider will provide at no cost to Customer a fully functional video visitation system for the inmates of Customer's Facility. Provider is responsible for providing all hardware (i.e. tablets and kiosks), the software (including the operating systems and application software), and all networking requirements needed for operation of the system. Provider shall have the exclusive right over any other vendor to provide the services of and to derive revenue from remote video visitation.
79. Provider's video visitation system will be accessible to inmates via the SmartTablets™ devices.
80. Provider will provide at no cost to Customer onsite video visitation (public) kiosks and/or lobby kiosks in the quantity and at the locations as agreed by the Parties.



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81. Provider will provide at no cost to Customer the labor, hardware, and software needed for the continued operating, maintaining, and networking of the video visitation system, including any public or lobby kiosks.
82. Provider is responsible for all the costs and future costs associated with any modification, reconfiguration, or upgrade of the video visitation system at Customer's Facility. These costs do not include the costs of the actual electrical power.
83. Provider will provide Customer with the capability of monitoring the video visitations, except those visitations deemed to be privileged under law between attorney and client. Provider will maintain a record of all parties of the video visitation system for a period of seven (7) years from the time of the visitation.
84. Friends and Family can access and purchase and schedule the video visitation sessions via the Smartjailmail.com website.
85. Remote video visitation will be made available to inmates 7 days a week, in keeping with the same hours and time availability of the inmate phone system.
86. Remote video visitation will be billed at \$0.20 per minute, subject to change by mutual agreement of the parties.
87. Provider shall pay Customer a commission in the amount of fifty percent (50%) of the revenue collected from use of its remote video visitation system. Provider shall pay commissions to Customer on a monthly basis, no later than thirty (30) calendar days from the end of each calendar month for which the remote video visitation services are provided.

Grievances, General and Medical Requests

88. We shall provide at no cost to the Customer and Inmate electronic general and medical requests as well as well as electronic grievance forms via the SmartTablet™ devices.
89. Our System presents Inmates with a list of available forms, and once a form has been selected and submitted, it is automatically routed to the appropriate person or department for processing.

Law Library

90. Provider shall provide access to a law library via its SmartTablet™ devices at no cost. The law library provides access to Federal and State statutes and case law, as well as a legal dictionary, practice manual, and other legal aides to assist inmates with researching material appropriate for their case.

Electronic Education, Reentry, and Entertainment

91. Provider will provide access to its extensive SmartEd™ educational platform and Reentry programs via its SmartTablet™ devices, where a customizable suite of programs can be made available.
92. Provider shall provide access to its SmartEntertainment™ platform via the SmartTablet™ for streaming basic content (free) and premium content (at a rate of one cent (\$.01) per minute).
93. Learn to Earn. Provider shall give inmates the ability to earn entertainment credits based on their time spent utilizing the educational platform, in an amount to be determined by the parties upon implementation. Inmate time spent making use of the educational platform and corresponding credits earned will be maintained and reviewable. Free credits earned shall be deducted from commissions owed to Customer, up to a maximum of \$1,000 in value per month.
94. Provider shall pay Customer a commission in the amount of fifty percent (50%) of revenue collected from the streaming of premium entertainment content (not including from the use of any free or earned credits spent).



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Provider shall pay commissions to Customer on a monthly basis, no later than thirty (30) calendar days from the end of each calendar month for which the entertainment services are provided.

Commissary Hosting and Integration

95. At Customer’s request, Provider will host Customer’s commissary vendor’s menu on Provider’s system, at no cost to Customer.

96. At Customer’s request, Provider will integrate with Customer’s jail management system (JMS) at no cost to Customer.

Customer Training

97. Upon the installation of Provider’s system, Provider shall provide Customer staff with extensive training for all services and features available to Customer pursuant to this Agreement. In addition, Provider will provide refresher or new training sessions to Customer staff as necessary, including as new staff is hired by Customer.

Section 1. Introduction to Offerors

(RFP 22-021/YS), Comprehensive Inmate Technology Services Package for Jefferson County Correctional Facility, Downtown Jail, and Minnie Rogers Juvenile Justice Center

This Request for Proposal (RFP) is to receive proposals from qualified firms regarding services for Inmate Technology Services Package.

The following items are provided as general information and specifications as required by the Jefferson County Purchasing Department.

1.1 Vendor Instructions

Read the document carefully. Follow all instructions. You are responsible for fulfilling all requirements and specifications. Be sure you have a clear understanding of the proposal.

General Requirements apply to all advertised requests for proposals; however, these may be superseded, whole or in part, by the **Scope of Services, Guidelines and Specifications, Requested Responses and Information, or other data contained herein.** Be sure your proposal package is complete.

1.2 Governing Law

Offeror is advised that these requirements shall be fully governed by the laws of the State of Texas and that Jefferson County may request and rely on advice, decisions, and opinions of the Attorney General of Texas and the County Attorney concerning any portion of these requirements.

1.3 Ambiguity, Conflict, or other errors in the RFP

If Offeror discovers any ambiguity, conflict, discrepancy, omission or other error in the RFP, Offeror shall immediately notify the County of such error in writing and request modification or clarification of the document. Modifications will be made by issuing Addenda. Written notice will be given to all parties who have been furnished with the RFP without divulging the source of the request for the same. If the Offeror fails to notify the County prior to the date and time fixed for submission of proposals of an error or ambiguity in the RFP known to Offeror, or an error or ambiguity that reasonably should have been known to Offeror, then Offeror shall not be entitled to compensation or additional time by reason of the error or ambiguity or its later resolution.

The County may also modify the RFP, no later than 48 hours prior to the date and time fixed for submission of proposals, by issuance of an Addendum to all parties who have received the RFP. All addenda will be numbered consecutively, beginning with 1.

1.4 Notification of Most Current Address

Firms in receipt of this RFP shall notify Deborah L. Clark, Jefferson County Purchasing Agent, of any address changes, contact person changes, and/or telephone number changes no later than 48 hours prior to the date and time fixed for submission of proposals.

1.5 Proposal Preparation Cost

Cost for developing proposals is entirely the responsibility of Offerors and shall not be charged to Jefferson County.

1.6 Signature of Proposal

A transmittal letter, which shall be considered an integral part of the proposal, shall be signed by an individual who is authorized to bind the Offeror contractually. If the Offeror is a corporation, the legal name of the corporation shall be provided together with the signature of the officer or officers authorized to sign on behalf of the corporation.

If the Offeror is a partnership, the true name of the firm shall be provided with the signature of the partner or partners authorized to sign.

If the Offeror is an individual, that individual shall sign. If signature is by an agent, other than an officer of a corporation or a member of a partnership, a power of attorney or equivalent document must be submitted to the Jefferson County Purchasing Department prior to the submission of the proposal or with the proposal.

1.7 Economy of Presentation

Proposals shall not contain promotional or display materials, except as they may directly answer in whole or in part questions contained in the RFP. Such exhibits shall be clearly marked with the applicable reference number of the question in the RFP. Proposals must address the technical requirements as specified in the RFP. All questions posed by the RFP must be answered concisely and clearly. Proposals that do not address each criterion may be rejected and not considered.

1.8 Proposal Obligation

The contents of the proposal and any clarification thereof submitted by the selected Offeror shall become part of the contractual obligation and incorporated by reference into the ensuing contract.

1.9 Incorporation by Reference and Precedence

This Agreement is derived from (1) the RFP, written clarifications to the RFP and County's response to questions; (2) the Contractor's Best and Final Offer, and (3) the Contractor's response to the RFP.

In the event of a dispute under this Agreement, applicable documents will be referred to for the purpose of clarification or for additional detail in the following order of precedence: (1) Amendments to the Agreement in reverse chronological order; (2) the Agreement, including the Scope of Work; (3) the Contractor's Best and Final Offer; (4) the RFP, including attachments thereto and written responses to questions and written clarifications; and (5) the Contractors response to the RFP.

1.10 Governing Forms

In the event of any conflict between the terms and provisions of these requirements and the specifications, the specifications shall govern. In the event of any conflict of interpretation of any part of this overall document, Jefferson County's interpretation shall govern.

1.11 Implied Requirements

Products and services not specifically mentioned in the RFP, but which are necessary to provide the functional capabilities described by the Offeror, shall be included in the proposal.

1.12 Compliance with RFP Specifications

It is intended that this RFP describe the requirements and the response format in sufficient detail to secure comparable proposals. Failure to comply with all provisions of the RFP will result in disqualification.

1.13 Vendor Registration: SAM (System for Award Management)

Vendors doing business with Jefferson County are required to be registered with The System for Award Management (SAM), with an "active" status.

The System for Award Management (SAM) is the Official U.S. Government system that consolidated the capabilities of CCR/FedReg, ORCA, and EPLS. There is NO fee to register for this site. Entities may register at no cost directly from the SAM website at: <https://www.sam.gov>

Offerors are strongly encouraged to review their firm's SAM (System for Award Management) status prior to Proposal Submission.

1.14 Awarded Vendor(s): Submission of FORM 1295 (Texas Ethics Commission)

In accordance with House Bill 1295 (passed January 1, 2016), Vendors entering into contracts and professional agreements with Jefferson County will be required to complete a Certificate of Interested Parties (FORM 1295), unless contract is considered exempt as described below.

In 2017, the Texas legislature amended the law to require Form 1295 to include an "unsworn declaration" which includes, among other things, the date of birth and address of the authorized representative signing the form. The unsworn declaration, including the date of birth and address of the signatory, replaces the notary requirement that applied to contracts entered into before January 1, 2018. The TEC filing application does not capture the date of birth or street address of the signatory and it will not appear on forms that are filed using the TEC filing application.

Changes to the law requiring certain businesses to file a Form 1295 are in effect for contracts entered into or amended on or after January 1, 2018. The changes exempt businesses from filing a Form 1295 for certain types of contracts and replace the need for a completed Form 1295 to be notarized. Instead, the person filing a 1295 needs to complete an "unsworn declaration."

FORM 1295 Exemptions: What type of contracts are exempt from the Form 1295 filing requirement under the amended law? The amended law adds to the list of types of contract exempt from the Form 1295 filing requirement. A completed Form 1295 is not required for:

- a sponsored research contract of an institution of higher education
- an interagency contract of a state agency or an institution of higher education
- a contract related to health and human services if: the value of the contract cannot be determined at the time the contract is executed; and o any qualified vendor is eligible for the contract
- a contract with a publicly traded business entity, including a wholly owned subsidiary of the business entity
- a contract with an electric utility, as that term is defined by Section 31.002, Utilities Code
- a contract with a gas utility, as that term is defined by Section 121.001, Utilities Code

Upon entering into a contract or professional agreement, the Jefferson County Purchasing Department will submit a request to the Vendor to both:

1. Submit a FORM 1295 online via the Texas Ethics Commission website link below.

Vendors must enter the required information on Form 1295, and print a copy of the completed form. The form will include a certification of filing that will contain a unique certification number.

2. Submit a FORM 1295 hard copy (completed & signed by an Authorized Agent of the Awarded Vendor), to the Jefferson County Purchasing Department.

1.15 Emergency/Declared Disaster Requirements

In the event of an emergency or if Jefferson County is declared a disaster area, by the County, State, or Federal Government, a contract (executed in response to this Request for Proposal) may be subjected to unusual usage. Contractor shall service the County during such an emergency or declared disaster under the same terms and conditions that apply during non-emergency/disaster conditions. The pricing as specified in the contract shall apply to serving the County's needs regardless of the circumstances. If Contractor is unable to supply the services under the terms of the contract, then Contractor shall provide proof of such disruption and a copy of the invoice from Contractor's supplier(s). Additional profit margin as a result of supplying services during an emergency or declared disaster shall not be permitted. In the event that additional equipment, supplies, and materials are required during the declared disaster, additional shipping, handling and drayage fees may apply.

1.16 Evaluation

Jefferson County reserves the right to use all pertinent information (also learned from sources other than disclosed in the RFP process) that might affect the County's judgment as to the appropriateness of an award to the best evaluated Offeror. This information may be appended to the proposal evaluation process results. Information on a service provider from reliable sources, and not within the service provider's proposal, may also be noted and made part of the evaluation file. Jefferson County shall have sole responsibility for determining a reliable source. Jefferson County reserves the right to conduct written and/or oral discussions/interviews after the proposal opening. The purpose of such discussions/interviews is to provide clarification and/or additional information to make an award in the best interest of Jefferson County.

1.17 Withdrawal of Proposal

The Offeror may withdraw its proposal by submitting a written request over the signature of an authorized individual, as described in paragraph 1.6, to the Purchasing Department any time prior to the submission deadline. The Offeror may thereafter submit a new proposal prior to the deadline. Modification or withdrawal of the proposal in any manner, oral or written, will not be considered if submitted after the deadline.

1.18 Minority-Women Business Enterprise Participation

It is the desire of Jefferson County to increase the participation of Minority (MBE) and women-owned (WBE) businesses in its contracting and procurement programs. While the County does not have any preference or set aside programs in place, it is committed to a policy of equitable participation for these firms.

1.19 Award

Jefferson County reserves the right to award this contract on the basis of the **Best Offer** in accordance with the laws of Texas, to waive any formality or irregularity, to make award to more than one Offeror, and/or to reject any or all proposals. In the event the highest dollar Offeror meeting specifications is not awarded a contract, the Offeror may appear before Commissioners' Court and present evidence concerning his responsibility.

1.20 Ownership of Proposal

All proposals become the property of Jefferson County and will not be returned to Offerors.

1.21 Disqualification of Offeror

Upon signing this proposal document, a contractor offering to sell supplies, materials, services, or equipment to Jefferson County certifies that the Offeror has not violated the antitrust laws of this state codified in Section 15.01, et seq, Business & Commerce Code, or the Federal Antitrust Laws, and has not communicated directly or indirectly the offer made to any competitor or any other person engaged in such line of business. Any or all proposals will be rejected if the County believes that collusion exists among the Offerors.

1.22 **Contractual Development**

The contents of the RFP and the selected proposal will become an integral part of the contract, but may be modified by provisions of the contract as negotiated. Therefore, the Offeror must be amenable to inclusion in a contract of any information provided (in writing) either in response to this RFP or subsequently during the selection process.

1.23 **Assignment**

The selected vendor may not assign, sell, or otherwise transfer this contract without written permission of the Jefferson County Commissioners' Court.

1.24 **Contract Obligation**

Jefferson County Commissioners' Court must award the contract, and the County Judge or other person authorized by Jefferson County Commissioners' Court must sign the contract before it becomes binding on Jefferson County or the Offeror. **Department heads are not authorized to sign agreements for Jefferson County.** Binding agreements shall remain in effect until all products and/or services covered by this proposal have been satisfactorily delivered and accepted.

1.25 **Termination**

Jefferson County reserves the right to terminate the contract for default if the awarded vendor breached any of the terms therein, including warranties of Offeror, or if the Offeror becomes insolvent or commits acts of bankruptcy. Such right of termination is in addition to and not in lieu of any other remedies Jefferson County may have in law or equity. Default may be construed as, but not limited to, failure to deliver the proper goods and/or services within the proper amount of time, and/or to properly perform any and all other requirements to Jefferson County's satisfaction, and/or to meet all other obligations and requirements. Contracts may be terminated without cause upon thirty (30) days' written notice to either party unless otherwise specified.

1.26 **Inspections**

Jefferson County reserves the right to inspect any item(s) or service location(s) for compliance with specifications and requirements and needs of the using department. If a proposal cannot furnish a sample of a proposed item, where applicable, for review, or fails to satisfactorily show an ability to perform, the County can reject the Offeror as inadequate.

1.27 **Testing**

Jefferson County reserves the right to test equipment, supplies, material and goods proposed for quality, compliance with specifications, and ability to meet the needs of the user. Demonstration units must be available for review. Should the goods or services fail to meet requirements and/or be unavailable for evaluation, the offer is subject to rejection.

1.28 **Loss, Damage, or Claim**

The Offeror shall totally indemnify Jefferson County against all claims by its employees, agents, or representatives or personal injury arising from any cause. In addition, the Offeror shall totally indemnify Jefferson County against all claims of loss or damage to the Offeror's and Jefferson County's property, equipment, and/or supplies.

1.29 **Taxes**

The contractor and its subcontractors, agents and employees, as the case may be, will be responsible for the payment of all federal, state and local taxes, and deposits or contributions imposed or required by law.

1.30 Non-Discrimination

The successful offeror will be required to comply with the Americans With Disabilities Act and with all provisions of federal, state, county and local (if any) laws and regulations to ensure that no employee or applicant for employment is discriminated against because of race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap or national origin.

1.31 Conflict of Interest

The agreement entered into pursuant to this RFP will contain the Contractor's warranty that, except for bona-fide employees or selling agents maintained by the Contractor for the purpose of securing business, no person or selling agency has been employed or retained to solicit this contract upon an agreement or understanding for commission, percentage or contingency.

Further, the contractor will warrant that no kickbacks, gratuities, or contingency fees have been paid in connection with this RFP or contract and none has been promised contingent upon the award of contract. And, will still further warrant that to its knowledge and best belief, no one being paid under the agreement between the County and the contractor, is engaged in any activities which would constitute a conflict of interest with respect to the purposes of said agreement.

1.32 Waiver of Subrogation

Offeror and Offeror's insurance carrier waive any and all rights whatsoever with regard to subrogation against Jefferson County as an indirect party to any suit arising out of personal or property damages resulting from the Offeror's performance under this agreement.

1.33 Acknowledgment of Insurance Requirements

By signing its proposal, Offeror acknowledges that it has read and understands the insurance requirements for this proposal. Offeror also understands that evidence of required insurance must be submitted within fifteen (15) working days following notification of acceptance of its offer; otherwise, Jefferson County may rescind its acceptance of the Offeror's proposal. The insurance requirements are part of this package.

1.34 Insurance

The contractor (including any and all subcontractors as defined in Section 1.35.1.3 below) shall, at all times during the term of this contract, maintain insurance coverages with not less than the type and requirements shown below. Such insurance is to be provided at the sole cost of the contractor. These requirements do not establish limits of the contractor's liability.

All policies of insurance shall waive all rights of subrogation against the County, its officers, employees and agents; a copy of the policy wording or endorsement is required.

Contractor shall furnish Jefferson County with Certificate of Insurance naming Jefferson County as additional insured and will provide the actual policy wording or endorsement showing as such.

All insurance must be written by an insurer licensed to conduct business in the State of Texas.

1.35 Workers' Compensation Insurance

- 1.35.1 Definitions:
- 1.35.1.1 **Certificate of coverage ("Certificate")** – A copy of a certificate of insurance, a certificate of authority to self-insure issued by the commission, or a coverage agreement, DWC-81, DWC-82, DWC-83, or DWC-84 showing statutory workers' compensation insurance coverage for the person's or entity's employees providing services on a project, for the duration of the project.
- 1.35.1.2 **Duration of the project** – Includes the time from the beginning of the work on the project until the contractor's/person's work on the project has been completed and accepted by the governmental entity.
- 1.35.1.3 **Persons providing services on the project ("subcontractor") in article 406.096** – Includes all persons or entities performing all or part of the services under the contractor has undertaken to perform on the project, regardless of whether that person contracted directly with the contractor and regardless of whether that person has employees. This includes, without limitation, independent contractors, subcontractor, leasing companies, motor carriers, owner-operators, employees of any such entity, or employees of any entity which furnishes persons to provide services on the project. "Services" includes, without limitation, providing, hauling or delivering equipment or materials, or providing labor, transportation, or other service related to a project. "Services" does not include activities unrelated to the project, such as food/beverage vendors, office supply deliveries, and delivery of portable toilets.
- 1.35.2 The Contractor shall provide coverage, based on proper reporting of classification code and payroll amounts and filing any coverage agreements, which meets the statutory requirements of Texas Labor Code, Section 401.011(44) for all employees of the contractor providing services on the project, for the duration of the project.
- 1.35.3 The Contractor must provide a certificate of coverage to the governmental entity prior to being awarded the contract – refer to Section 1.34 above.
- 1.35.4 If the coverage period shown on the Contractor's current certificate of coverage ends during the duration of the project, the Contractor must, prior to the end of the coverage period, file a new certificate of coverage with the governmental entity showing that coverage has been extended.
- 1.35.5 The Contractor shall obtain from each person providing services on a project, and provide to the governmental entity:
- 1.35.5.1 A certificate of coverage, prior to that person beginning work on the project, so the governmental entity will have on file certificates of coverage showing coverage for all persons providing services on the project; and
- 1.35.5.2 No later than seven (7) days after receipt by the Contractor, a new certificate of coverage showing extension of coverage, if the coverage period shown on the current certificate ends during the duration of the project.
- 1.35.6 The Contractor shall retain all required certificates of coverage for the duration of the project and for one (1) year thereafter.
- 1.35.7 The Contractor shall notify the governmental entity in writing by certified mail or personal delivery, within ten (10) days after the contractor knew or should have known, of any change that materially affects the provision of coverage of any person providing services on the project.
- 1.35.8 The Contractor shall post on each project site a notice, in the text, form and manner prescribed by the Texas Department of Workers' Compensation, informing all persons providing services on the project that they are required to be covered, and stating how a person may verify coverage and report lack of coverage.
- 1.35.9 The Contractor shall contractually require each person with whom it contracts to provide services on a project to:

- 1.35.9.1 Provide coverage, based on reporting of classification codes and payroll amounts and filing of any coverage agreements, which meets the statutory requirements of Texas Labor Code, Section 401.011(44) for all its employees providing services on the project, for the duration of the project.
- 1.35.9.2 Provide to the Contractor, prior to that person beginning work on the project a certificate of coverage showing that coverage is being provided for all employees of the person providing services on the project, for the duration of the project.
- 1.35.9.3 Provide the Contractor, prior to the end of coverage period, a new certificate of coverage showing extension of coverage, if the coverage period shown on the current certificate of coverage ends during the duration of the project.
- 1.35.9.4 Obtain from each person with whom it contracts, and provide to the Contractor:
 - 1.35.9.4.1 A certificate of coverage, prior to the other person beginning work on the project; and
 - 1.35.9.4.2 the coverage period, if the coverage period shown on the current certificate of a new certificate of coverage showing extension of coverage, prior to the end of coverage ends during the duration of the project.
- 1.35.9.5 Retain all required certificates of coverage on file for the duration of the project and for one (1) year thereafter.
- 1.36.9.6 Notify the governmental entity in writing by certified mail or personal delivery, within ten (10) days after the person knew or should have known, of any change that materially affects the provision of coverage of any person providing services on the project; and
- 1.35.9.7 Contractually require each person with whom it contracts to perform as required by paragraphs 1.35.1. – 1.35.7., with the certificates of coverage to be provided to the person for whom they are providing services.
- 1.35.10 By signing this contract or providing or causing to be provided a certificate of coverage, the Contractor is representing to the governmental entity that all employees of the contractor who will provide services of the project will be covered by workers' compensation coverage for the duration of the project, that the coverage will be based on proper reporting of classification codes and payroll amounts, and that all coverage agreements will be filed with the appropriate insurance carrier or, in the case of a self-insured, with the commission's Division of Self-Insurance Regulation. Providing false or misleading information may subject the contractor to administrative penalties, criminal penalties, civil penalties, or other civil actions.
- 1.35.11 The Contractor's failure to comply with any of these provisions is a breach of contract by the Contractor which entitles the governmental entity to declare the contract void if the Contractor does not remedy the breach within ten (10) days after receipt of notice of breach from the governmental entity.

Section 2. Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) MANDATED CONTRACT PROVISIONS

1. REMEDIES

a. **Standard.** Contracts for more than the simplified acquisition threshold, currently set at \$250,000, must address administrative, contractual, or legal remedies in instances where contractors violate or breach contract terms, and provide for such sanctions and penalties as appropriate. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II(A).

b. **Applicability.** This requirement applies to all FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs.

2. TERMINATION FOR CAUSE AND CONVENIENCE

a. **Standard.** All contracts in excess of \$10,000 must address termination for cause and for convenience by the non-Federal entity, including the manner by which it will be affected and the basis for settlement. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II(B).

b. **Applicability.** This requirement applies to all FEMA grant and co-operative agreement programs.

3. EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY

If applicable, exact language below in subsection 3.d is required.

a. Standard. Except as otherwise provided under 41 C.F.R. Part 60, all contracts that meet the definition of "federally assisted construction contract" in 41 C.F.R. § 60-1.3 must include the equal opportunity clause provided under 41 C.F.R. §60- 1.4(b), in accordance with Executive Order 11246, Equal Employment Opportunity (30 Fed. Reg. 12319, 12935, 3 C.F.R. Part, 1964-1965 Comp., p. 339), as amended by Executive Order 11375, Amending Executive Order 11246 Relating to Equal Employment Opportunity, and implementing regulations at 41 C.F.R. Part 60 (Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs, Equal Employment Opportunity, Department of Labor). See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II(C).

b. Key Definitions.

i. Federally Assisted Construction Contract. The regulation at 41 C.F.R. § 60-1.3 defines a "federally assisted construction contract" as any agreement or modification thereof between any applicant and a person for construction work which is paid for in whole or in part with funds obtained from the Government or borrowed on the credit of the Government pursuant to any Federal program involving a grant, contract, loan, insurance, or guarantee, or undertaken pursuant to any Federal program involving such grant, contract, loan, insurance, or guarantee, or any application or modification thereof approved by the Government for a grant, contract, loan, insurance, or guarantee under which the applicant itself participates in the construction work.

ii. Construction Work. The regulation at 41 C.F.R. § 60-1.3 defines "construction work" as the construction, rehabilitation, alteration, conversion, extension, demolition or repair of buildings, highways, or other changes or improvements to real property, including facilities providing utility services. The term also includes the supervision, inspection, and other onsite functions incidental to the actual construction.

c. Applicability. This requirement applies to all FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs.

d. Required Language. The regulation at 41 C.F.R. Part 60-1.4(b) requires the insertion of the following contract clause.

During the performance of this contract, the contractor agrees as follows:

(1) The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. The contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following:

Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided setting forth the provisions of this non-discrimination clause.

(2) The contractor will, in all solicitations or advertisements for employees placed by or on behalf of the contractor, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin.

(3) The contractor will not discharge or in any other manner discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because such employee or applicant has inquired about, discussed, or disclosed the compensation of the employee or applicant or another employee or applicant. This provision shall not apply to instances in which an employee who has access to the compensation information of other employees or applicants as a part of such employee's essential job functions discloses the compensation of such other employees or applicants to individuals who do not otherwise have access to such information, unless such disclosure is in response to a formal complaint or charge, in furtherance of an investigation, proceeding, hearing, or action, including an investigation conducted by the employer, or is consistent with the contractor's legal duty to furnish information.

(4) The contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which he has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided advising the said labor union or workers' representatives

of the contractor's commitments under this section, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.

(5) The contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.

(6) The contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.

(7) In the event of the contractor's non-compliance with the non-discrimination clauses of this contract or with any of the said rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated, or suspended in whole or in part and the contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts or federally assisted construction contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.

(8) The contractor will include the portion of the sentence immediately preceding paragraph (1) and the provisions of paragraphs (1) through (8) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The contractor will take such action with respect to any sub-contract or purchase order as the administering agency may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions, including sanctions for non-compliance:

Provided, however, that in the event a contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction by the administering agency, the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States. The applicant further agrees that it will be bound by the above equal opportunity clause with respect to its own employment practices when it participates in federally assisted construction work: Provided, That if the applicant so participating is a State or local government, the above equal opportunity clause is not applicable to any agency, instrumentality or subdivision of such government which does not participate in work on or under the contract.

The applicant agrees that it will assist and cooperate actively with the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor in obtaining the compliance of contractors and subcontractors with the equal opportunity clause and the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor, that it will furnish the administering agency and the Secretary of Labor such information as they may require for the supervision of such compliance, and that it will otherwise assist the administering agency in the discharge of the agency's primary responsibility for securing compliance.

The applicant further agrees that it will refrain from entering into any contract or contract modification subject to Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, with a contractor debarred from, or who has not demonstrated eligibility for, Government contracts and federally assisted construction contracts pursuant to the Executive Order and will carry out such sanctions and penalties for violation of the equal opportunity clause as may be imposed upon contractors and subcontractors by the administering agency or the Secretary of Labor pursuant to Part II, Subpart D of the Executive Order. In addition, the applicant agrees that if it fails or refuses to comply with these undertakings, the administering agency may take any or all of the following actions: Cancel, terminate, or suspend in whole or in part this grant (contract, loan, insurance, guarantee); refrain from extending any further assistance to the applicant under the program with respect to which the failure or refund occurred until satisfactory assurance of future compliance has been received from such applicant; and refer the case to the Department of Justice for appropriate legal proceedings.

4. DAVIS-BACON ACT

a. **Standard.** All prime construction contracts in excess of \$2,000 awarded by non-Federal entities must include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. §§ 3141-3144 and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 5 (Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction). See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II(D). In accordance with the statute, contractors must be required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor. In addition, contractors must be required to pay wages not less than once a week.

b. Applicability. The Davis-Bacon Act only applies to the Emergency Management Preparedness Grant Program, Homeland Security Grant Program, Non-profit Security Grant Program, Tribal Homeland Security Grant Program, Port Security Grant Program, and Transit Security Grant Program. It DOES NOT apply to other FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs, including the Public Assistance Program.

c. Requirements. If applicable, the non-Federal entity must do the following:

i. The non-Federal entity must place a copy of the current prevailing wage determination issued by the Department of Labor in each solicitation. The decision to award a contract or subcontract must be conditioned upon the acceptance of the wage determination. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to the Federal awarding agency.

ii. Additionally, pursuant 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II(D), contracts subject to the Davis-Bacon Act, must also include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. § 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 3 (Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States). The Copeland Anti-Kickback Act provides that each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to FEMA.

iii. Include a provision for compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. 3141-3144, and 3146-3148) as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 5, "Labor Standards Provisions Applicable to Contracts Covering Federally Financed and Assisted Construction").

COMPLIANCE WITH THE DAVIS-BACON ACT:

a. All transactions regarding this contract shall be done in compliance with the Davis-Bacon Act (40 U.S.C. 3141- 3144, and 3146-3148) and the requirements of 29C.F.R.pt. 5 as may be applicable. The contractor shall comply with 40 U.S.C. 3141-3144, and 3146-3148 and the requirements of 29 C.F.R. pt. 5 as applicable.

b. Contractors are required to pay wages to laborers and mechanics at a rate not less than the prevailing wages specified in a wage determination made by the Secretary of Labor.

c. Additionally, contractors are required to pay wages not less than once a week.

5. COPELAND ANTI-KICKBACK ACT

a. **Standard.** Recipient and subrecipient contracts must include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations (29 CFR Part 3, "Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States").

b. **Applicability.** This requirement applies to all contracts for construction or repair work above \$2,000 in situations where the Davis-Bacon Act also applies. It DOES NOT apply to the FEMA Public Assistance Program.

c. **Requirements.** If applicable, the non-Federal entity must include a provision for compliance with the Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (40 U.S.C. § 3145), as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 3 (Contractors and Subcontractors on Public Building or Public Work Financed in Whole or in Part by Loans or Grants from the United States). Each contractor or subrecipient must be prohibited from inducing, by any means, any person employed in the construction, completion, or repair of public work, to give up any part of the compensation to which he or she is otherwise entitled. The non-Federal entity must report all suspected or reported violations to FEMA. Additionally, in accordance with the regulation, each contractor and subcontractor must furnish each week a statement with respect to the wages paid each of its employees engaged in work covered by the Copeland Anti-Kickback Act and the Davis Bacon Act during the preceding weekly payroll period. The report shall be delivered by the contractor or subcontractor, within seven days after the regular payment date of the payroll period, to a representative of a Federal or State agency in charge at the site of the building or work.

COMPLIANCE WITH THE COPELAND "ANTI-KICKBACK ACT":

a. **Contractor.** The contractor shall comply with 18 U.S.C. § 874, 40 U.S.C. § 3145, and the requirements of 29 C.F.R. pt. 3 as may be applicable, which are incorporated by reference into this contract.

(RFP 22-021/YS), Comprehensive Inmate Technology Services Package for Jefferson County Correctional Facility, Downtown Jail, and Minnie Rogers Juvenile Justice Center

b. Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clause above and such other clauses as FEMA may by appropriate instructions require, and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for the compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with all of these contract clauses.

c. Breach. A breach of the contract clauses above may be grounds for termination of the contract, and for debarment as a contractor and subcontractor as provided in 29 C.F.R. §5.12.”

6. CONTRACT WORK HOURS AND SAFETY STANDARDS ACT

a. Standard. Where applicable (see 40 U.S.C. §§ 3701-3708), all contracts awarded by the non-Federal entity in excess of \$100,000 that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers must include a provision for compliance with 40 U.S.C. §§ 3702 and 3704, as supplemented by Department of Labor regulations at 29 C.F.R. Part 5. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II(E). Under 40 U.S.C. § 3702, each contractor must be required to compute the wages of every mechanic and laborer on the basis of a standard work week of 40 hours. Work in excess of the standard work week is permissible provided that the worker is compensated at a rate of not less than one and a half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of 40 hours in the work week. Further, no laborer or mechanic must be required to work in surroundings or under working conditions which are unsanitary, hazardous, or dangerous.

b. Applicability. This requirement applies to all FEMA contracts awarded by the non-federal entity in excess of \$100,000 under grant and cooperative agreement programs that involve the employment of mechanics or laborers. It is applicable to construction work. These requirements do not apply to the purchase of supplies or materials or articles ordinarily available on the open market, or contracts for transportation or transmission of intelligence.

The regulation at 29 C.F.R. § 5.5(b) provides contract clause language concerning compliance with the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act. FEMA suggests including the following contract clause: Compliance with the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act.

(1) Overtime requirements. No contractor or subcontractor contracting for any Part of the contract work which may require or involve the employment of laborers or mechanics shall require or permit any such laborer or mechanic in any workweek in which he or she is employed on such work to work in excess of forty hours in such workweek unless such laborer or mechanic receives compensation at a rate not less than one and one-half times the basic rate of pay for all hours worked in excess of forty hours in such workweek.

(2) Violation; liability for unpaid wages; liquidated damages. In the event of any violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (b)(1) of this section the contractor and any subcontractor responsible therefor shall be liable for the unpaid wages. In addition, such contractor and subcontractor shall be liable to the United States (in the case of work done under contract for the District of Columbia or a territory, to such District or to such territory), for liquidated damages. Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each individual laborer or mechanic, including watchmen and guards, employed in violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (b)(1) of this section, in the sum of \$27 for each calendar day on which such individual was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of forty hours without payment of the overtime wages required by the clause set forth in paragraph (b)(1) of this section.

(3) Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages. Jefferson County shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld, from any moneys payable on account of work performed by the contractor or subcontractor under any such contract or any other Federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same prime contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages as provided in the clause set forth in paragraph (b)(2) of this section.

(4) Subcontracts. The contractor or subcontractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clauses set forth in paragraph (b)(1) through (4) of this section and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts. The prime contractor shall be responsible for compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with the clauses set forth in paragraphs (b)(1) through (4) of this section.

7. RIGHTS TO INVENTIONS MADE UNDER A CONTRACT OR AGREEMENT

(RFP 22-021/YS), Comprehensive Inmate Technology Services Package for Jefferson County Correctional Facility, Downtown Jail, and Minnie Rogers Juvenile Justice Center

a. Standard. If the FEMA award meets the definition of “funding agreement” under 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) and the non-Federal entity wishes to enter into a contract with a small business firm or non-profit organization regarding the substitution of parties, assignment or performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under that “funding agreement,” the non-Federal entity must comply with the requirements of 37 C.F.R. Part 401 (Rights to Inventions Made by Nonprofit Organizations and Small Business Firms Under Government Grants, Contracts and Cooperative Agreements), and any implementing regulations issued by FEMA. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II(F).

b. Applicability. This requirement applies to “funding agreements,” but it DOES NOT apply to the Public Assistance, Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, Fire Management Assistance Grant Program, Crisis Counseling Assistance and Training Grant Program, Disaster Case Management Grant Program, and Federal Assistance to Individuals and Households – Other Needs Assistance Grant Program, as FEMA awards under these programs do not meet the definition of “funding agreement.”

c. Funding Agreements Definition. The regulation at 37 C.F.R. § 401.2(a) defines “funding agreement” as any contract, grant, or cooperative agreement entered into between any Federal agency, other than the Tennessee Valley Authority, and any contractor for the performance of experimental, developmental, or research work funded in whole or in part by the Federal government. This term also includes any assignment, substitution of parties, or subcontract of any type entered into for the performance of experimental, developmental, or research work under a funding agreement as defined in the first sentence of this paragraph.

8. CLEAN AIR ACT AND THE FEDERAL WATER POLLUTION CONTROL ACT

a. Standard. If applicable, contracts must contain a provision that requires the contractor to agree to comply with all applicable standards, orders, or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act (42 U.S.C. §§ 7401-7671q.) and the Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended (33 U.S.C. §§ 1251-1387). Violations must be reported to FEMA and the Regional Office of the Environmental Protection Agency. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II(G).

b. Applicability. This requirement applies to contracts awarded by a non-Federal entity of amounts in excess of \$150,000 under a federal grant.

CLEAN AIR ACT:

1. The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 U.S.C. § 7401 et seq.
2. The contractor agrees to report each violation to Jefferson County and understands and agrees that the County/Grant Administration Firm Acting on Behalf of the County will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.

3. The contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance provided by FEMA.

FEDERAL WATER POLLUTION CONTROL ACT:

1. The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders, or regulations issued pursuant to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.

2. The contractor agrees to report each violation to Jefferson County agrees that the County/Grant Administration Firm Acting on Behalf of the County will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.

3. The contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance provided by FEMA.

9. DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION

a. Standard. Non-Federal entities and contractors are subject to the debarment and suspension regulations implementing Executive Order 12549, Debarment and Suspension (1986) and Executive Order 12689, Debarment and Suspension (1989) (RFP 22-021/YS), Comprehensive Inmate Technology Services Package for Jefferson County Correctional Facility, Downtown Jail, and Minnie Rogers Juvenile Justice Center

at 2 C.F.R. Part 180 and the Department of Homeland Security's regulations at 2 C.F.R. Part 3000 (Non-procurement Debarment and Suspension).

b. Applicability. This requirement applies to all FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs.

c. Requirements.

i. These regulations restrict awards, subawards, and contracts with certain parties that are debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded from or ineligible for participation in Federal assistance programs and activities. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II(H); and 2 C.F.R. § 200.213. A contract award must not be made to parties listed in the SAM Exclusions. SAM Exclusions is the list maintained by the General Services Administration that contains the names of parties debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded by agencies, as well as parties declared ineligible under statutory or regulatory authority other than Executive Order 12549. SAM exclusions can be accessed at www.sam.gov. See 2 C.F.R. § 180.530.

ii. In general, an "excluded" party cannot receive a Federal grant award or a contract within the meaning of a "covered transaction," to include subawards and subcontracts. This includes parties that receive Federal funding indirectly, such as contractors to recipients and subrecipients. The key to the exclusion is whether there is a "covered transaction," which is any non-procurement transaction (unless excepted) at either a "primary" or "secondary" tier. Although "covered transactions" do not include contracts awarded by the Federal Government for purposes of the non-procurement common rule and DHS's implementing regulations, it does include some contracts awarded by recipients and subrecipients.

iii. Specifically, a covered transaction includes the following contracts for goods or services:

1. The contract is awarded by a recipient or subrecipient in the amount of at least \$25,000.
2. The contract requires the approval of FEMA, regardless of amount.
3. The contract is for federally-required audit services.
4. A subcontract is also a covered transaction if it is awarded by the contractor of a recipient or subrecipient and requires either the approval of FEMA or is in excess of \$25,000.

The following provides a debarment and suspension clause. It incorporates an optional method of verifying that contractors are not excluded or disqualified.

SUSPENSION AND DEBARMENT:

- (1) This contract is a covered transaction for purposes of 2 C.F.R. pt. 180 and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000. As such, the contractor is required to verify that none of the contractor's principals (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.995) or its affiliates (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.905) are excluded (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.940) or disqualified (defined at 2 C.F.R. § 180.935).
- (2) The contractor must comply with 2 C.F.R. pt. 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000, subpart C, and must include a requirement to comply with these regulations in any lower tier covered transaction it enters into.
- (3) This certification is a material representation of fact relied upon by the County. If it is later determined that the contractor did not comply with 2 C.F.R. pt. 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000, subpart C, in addition to remedies available to the County, the Federal Government may pursue available remedies, including but not limited to suspension and/or debarment.
- (4) The bidder or proposer agrees to comply with the requirements of 2 C.F.R. pt. 180, subpart C and 2 C.F.R. pt. 3000, subpart C while this offer is valid and throughout the period of any contract that may arise from this offer. The bidder or proposer further agrees to include a provision requiring such compliance in its lower tier covered transactions.

10. BYRD ANTI-LOBBYING AMENDMENT

a. Standard. Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not used Federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with obtaining any Federal contract, grant or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. § 1352. FEMA's regulation at 44 C.F.R. Part 18 implements the requirements of 31 U.S.C. § 1352 and provides, in Appendix A to Part 18, a copy of the certification that is required to be completed by

each entity as described in 31 U.S.C. § 1352. Each tier must also disclose any lobbying with non-Federal funds that takes place in connection with obtaining any Federal award. Such disclosures are forwarded from tier to tier up to the Federal awarding agency.

b. Applicability. This requirement applies to all FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs. Contractors that apply or bid for a contract of \$100,000 or more under a federal grant must file the required certification. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II(I); 31 U.S.C. § 1352; and 44 C.F.R. Part 18.

Byrd Anti-Lobbying Amendment, 31 U.S.C. § 1352 (as amended) Contractors who apply or bid for an award of \$100,000 or more shall file the required certification. Each tier certifies to the tier above that it will not and has not used Federal appropriated funds to pay any person or organization for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any agency, a Member of Congress, officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with obtaining any Federal contract, grant, or any other award covered by 31 U.S.C. § 1352. c. Required Certification.

If applicable, contractors must sign and submit to the non-Federal entity the **"Certification Regarding Lobbying" Form** included within these bid specifications.

11. PROCUREMENT OF RECOVERED MATERIALS

a. Standard. A non-Federal entity that is a state agency or agency of a political subdivision of a state and its contractors must comply with Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act. See 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II(J); and 2 C.F.R. §200.322.

b. Applicability. This requirement applies to all contracts awarded by a non-Federal entity under FEMA grant and cooperative agreement programs.

c. Requirements. The requirements of Section 6002 include procuring only items designated in guidelines of the EPA at 40 C.F.R. Part 247 that contain the highest percentage of recovered materials practicable, consistent with maintaining a satisfactory level of competition, where the purchase price of the item exceeds \$10,000 or the value of the quantity acquired by the preceding fiscal year exceeded \$10,000; procuring solid waste management services in a manner that maximizes energy and resource recovery; and establishing an affirmative procurement program for procurement of recovered materials identified in the EPA guidelines.

The Contractor also agrees to comply with all other applicable requirements of Section 6002 of the Solid Waste Disposal Act."

The Uniform Rules authorize FEMA to require additional provisions for non-Federal entity contracts. Although FEMA does not currently require additional provisions, FEMA recommends the following:

1. ACCESS TO RECORDS

a. Standard. All recipients, subrecipients, successors, transferees, and assignees must acknowledge and agree to comply with applicable provisions governing DHS access to records, accounts, documents, information, facilities, and staff. Recipients

must give DHS/FEMA access to, and the right to examine and copy, records, accounts, and other documents and sources of information related to the federal financial assistance award and permit access to facilities, personnel, and other individuals and information as may be necessary, as required by

DHS regulations and other applicable laws or program guidance. See DHS Standard Terms and Conditions: Version 8.1 (2018). Additionally, Section 1225 of the Disaster Recovery Reform Act of 2018 prohibits FEMA from providing reimbursement to any state, local, tribal, or territorial government, or private non-profit for activities made pursuant to a contract that purports to prohibit audits or internal reviews by the FEMA administrator or Comptroller General.

ACCESS TO RECORDS:

The following access to records requirements apply to this contract:

- (1) The Contractor agrees to provide the local/state/federal entity providing funding for this project, the FEMA Administrator, the Comptroller General of the United States, or any of their authorized representatives access to any books, documents, papers, and records of the Contractor which are directly pertinent to this contract for the purposes of making audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcriptions.
- (2) The Contractor agrees to permit any of the foregoing parties to reproduce by any means whatsoever or to copy excerpts and transcriptions as reasonably needed.
- (3) The Contractor agrees to provide the FEMA Administrator or their representatives access to construction or other work sites pertaining to the work being completed under the contract.
- (4) In compliance with the Disaster Recovery Act of 2018, the County and the Contractor acknowledge and agree that no language in this contract is intended to prohibit audits or internal reviews by the FEMA Administrator or the Comptroller General of the United States.

2. CHANGES

a. Standard. To be eligible for FEMA assistance under the non-Federal entity's FEMA grant or cooperative agreement, the cost of the change, modification, change order, or constructive change must be allowable, allocable, within the scope of its grant or cooperative agreement, and reasonable for the completion of project scope.

b. Applicability. FEMA recommends, therefore, that a non-Federal entity include a changes clause in its contract that describes how, if at all, changes can be made by either party to alter the method, price, or schedule of the work without breaching the contract. The language of the clause may differ depending on the nature of the contract and the end-item procured.

3. DHS SEAL, LOGO, AND FLAGS

a. Standard. Recipients must obtain permission prior to using the DHS seal(s), logos, crests, or reproductions of flags or likenesses of DHS agency officials. See DHS Standard Terms and Conditions: Version 8.1 (2018).

b. Applicability. FEMA recommends that all non-Federal entities place in their contracts a provision that a contractor shall not use the DHS seal(s), logos, crests, or reproductions of flags or likenesses of DHS agency officials without specific FEMA pre-approval.

b. **Applicability.** FEMA recommends that the non-Federal entity include a provision in its contract that states that the Federal Government is not a party to the contract and is not subject to any obligations or liabilities to the non-Federal entity, contractor, or any other party pertaining to any matter resulting from the contract.

6. PROGRAM FRAUD AND FALSE OR FRAUDULENT STATEMENTS OR RELATED ACTS

a. **Standard.** Recipients must comply with the requirements of The False Claims Act (31 U.S.C. §§ 3729-3733) which prohibits the submission of false or fraudulent claims for payment to the federal government. See DHS Standard Terms and Conditions: Version 8.1 (2018); and 31 U.S.C. §§ 3801-3812, which details the administrative remedies for false claims and statements made. The non-Federal entity must include a provision in its contract that the contractor acknowledges that 31 U.S.C. Chap. 38 (Administrative Remedies for False Claims and Statements) applies to its actions pertaining to the contract.

b. **Applicability.** FEMA recommends that the non-Federal entity include a provision in its contract that the contractor acknowledges that 31 U.S.C. Chap. 38 (Administrative Remedies for False Claims and Statements) applies to its actions pertaining to the contract.

3. Response Format

3.1 Introduction

Each proposal submitted in response to this RFP must be organized to correspond with those numbered sections of this RFP that require a response. Failure to arrange the proposal as requested may result in the disqualification of the proposal. Conciseness and clarity of content are emphasized and encouraged. Vague and general proposals will be considered non-responsive, and will result in disqualification. The response must be complete. Failure to provide the required information may result in the disqualification of the proposal. All pages of the proposal must be numbered and the proposal must contain an organized, paginated table of contents corresponding to the sections and pages of the proposal.

The County requests that proposal submissions NOT be bound by staples or glued spines.

3.2 Organization of Proposal Contents

Each proposal must be organized in the manner described below.

- a. Transmittal Letter
- b. Executive Summary
- c. Table of Contents
- d. Offeror Identifying Information
- e. Offeror Personnel and Organization
- f. Project Requirements
- g. Cost Proposal (Appendix A of RFP)
- h. Other information that may be helpful in the evaluation

3.3 Transmittal Letter

The Offeror must submit a transmittal letter that identifies the entity submitting the proposal, and includes a commitment by that entity to provide the services required by the County. The transmittal letter must state that the proposal is valid for ninety (90) days from the deadline for delivery of proposals to the County. Any proposal containing a term of less than ninety (90) days for acceptance will be rejected as non-responsive.

The transmittal letter must be signed by a person legally authorized to bind the Offeror to the representations in the response. In the case of a joint proposal, each party must sign the transmittal letter. The Offeror also must indicate, in its transmittal letter, why it believes that it is the most qualified Offeror to provide the services described in this RFP.

The transmittal letter must include a statement of acceptance of the terms and conditions of the contract resulting from this RFP. If Offeror takes exception to any of the proposed terms and conditions stated in this RFP, those exceptions must be noted in the transmittal letter.

However, Offeror must realize that failure to accept the terms specified in this proposal may result in disqualification of the proposal.

3.4 Executive Summary

The Offeror must provide an executive summary of its proposal that asserts that the Offeror is providing in its response all of the requirements of this RFP. The executive summary must not exceed three (3) pages, and must represent a full and concise summary of the contents of the proposal. The executive summary must not include any information concerning the cost of the proposal. The Offeror must identify any services that are provided beyond those specifically requested. If the Offeror is providing services that do not meet the specific requirements of this RFP, but in the opinion of the Offeror are equivalent or superior to those specifically requested, any such differences must be noted in the executive summary. However, the Offeror must realize that failure to provide the services specifically required may result in disqualification of the proposal.

3.5 Table of Contents

Each proposal must be submitted with a table of contents that clearly identifies and denotes the location of each title and subtitle of the proposal. Additionally, the table of contents must clearly identify and denote the location of all enclosures of the proposal. The table of contents must follow the RFP's structure as much as is practical.

3.6 Offeror Identifying Information

Offerors must provide the following identifying information:

- a. Name and address of business entity submitting the proposal;
- b. Type of business entity (i.e., corporation, partnership);
- c. Place of incorporation, if applicable;
- d. Name and location of major offices and other facilities that relate to the Offeror's performance under the terms of this RFP;
- e. Name, address, business and fax number of the Offeror's principal contact person regarding all contractual matters relating to this RFP;
- f. The Offeror's Federal Employer Identification Number, Jefferson County Vendor Number and Jefferson County Business License Number, if any;
- g. Full name and address for each member, partner, and employee of the Offeror (and any subcontractors) who will perform service's on this project; and
- h. A statement regarding the financial stability of the Offeror, including the ability of the Offeror to perform the functions required by this RFP and to provide those services represented by the Offeror in its response.

3.7 Conflict of Interest

Each Offeror must disclose any existing or potential conflict of interest relative to the performance of the requirements of this RFP. Examples of potential conflicts may include an existing business or personal relationship between the Offeror, its principal, or any affiliate or subcontractor, with the County or any other entity or person involved in any way in the project that is the subject of this RFP. Similarly, any personal or business relationship between the Offeror, the principals, or any affiliate or subcontractor, with any employee of the County or its suppliers must be disclosed. Any such relationship that might be perceived or represented as a conflict must be disclosed. Failure to disclose any such relationship or reveal personal relationships with state employees may be cause for contract termination. The County will decide if an actual or perceived conflict should result in proposal disqualification.

Each Offeror must reveal any past or existing relationship between the Offeror, its principal, employees, or any affiliate or subcontractor, with any county agency, entity, county employee, or other person in anyway involved in the county's procurement and/or contracting processes. It shall be the sole prerogative of the County to determine if such relationship constitutes a conflict of interest.

By submitting a proposal in response to this RFP, all Offerors affirm that they have not given, nor intend to give, at any time hereafter any economic opportunity, future employment, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, trip, favor, or service to a public servant or any employee or representative of same, in connection with this procurement.

3.8 Confidential/Proprietary Information

If any material in the proposal submission is considered by Offeror to be confidential or proprietary information (including manufacturing and/or design processes exclusive to the Offeror), Offeror must clearly mark the applicable pages of Offeror's proposal submission to indicate each claim of confidentiality. Additionally, Offeror must include a statement on company letterhead identifying all Proposal section(s) and page(s) that have been marked as confidential. Jefferson County will protect from public disclosure such portions of a proposal, unless directed otherwise by legal authority, including existing open records acts. Merely making a blanket claim that the entire proposal submission is protected from disclosure because it contains some proprietary information is not acceptable, and will make the entire proposal submission subject to release under the Texas Public Information Act.

By submitting a proposal, Offeror agrees to reproduction by Jefferson County, without cost or liability, of any copyrighted portions of Offeror's proposal submission or other information submitted by Offeror.

- It is intended that this RFP describe the requirements and the response format in sufficient detail to secure comparable proposals. Failure to comply with all provisions of the RFP **will** result in disqualification.

5. Scope of Services

5.1 Objective

Jefferson County is requesting proposals for a Comprehensive Inmate Technology Services Package composed of an Inmate Telephone System (ITS), Inmate Video Visitation System (VVS), Inmate Electronic Messaging System (EMS) and Inmate Tablet Program for the Jefferson County Correctional Facility (JCSO), Downtown Jail, and the Minnie Rogers Juvenile Justice Center. All three (3) facilities are located in Beaumont, Texas.

To ensure optimal performance and support, the Proposer MUST serve as the prime contractor and be held solely responsible for the delivery, operation and maintenance of ALL Inmate Technology Services proposed throughout the contract term. Proposals composed of Inmate Technology Services that rely on the use of subcontractors, third parties or affiliate vendors will NOT be accepted.

Additionally, to streamline facility operations and reduce facility staff burden, Proposer MUST provide, at no cost to Jefferson County; a secure, single login web-based administrative platform that provides an unlimited number of authorized users with access to ALL administrative controls, reporting and investigative features/tools of the Proposer's ITS, VVS, DPMS, EMS and Inmate Tablet Program. The web-based administrative platform MUST meet the following minimum requirements:

1. Be readily accessible to authorized users via any PC with a modern browser and active Internet without the need to download additional software.
2. Must provide various manual and automated tools to aid in the investigation or discovery of criminal activities by allowing investigators to easily check for any links between inmates and public individuals or other inmates using multi-path and multi-relation analysis.
3. Multi-path/multi-relation analysis must be capable of detecting an indirect relationship between two inmates through a public individual using a combination of phone calls, video visitation visits and electronic messages.

Jefferson County requests each proposer to submit a proposal for these Inmate Technology Services at no cost to Jefferson County. Proposals are to include all internal and external connectivity, hardware, software, on-site training, software upgrades, technical service, cloud-based or hosted server storage, technical support, and maintenance fees.

All equipment installed within Jefferson County Correctional Facility will remain the sole property of the Proposer. Any and all hardware, software, equipment, networking, cabling, etc. must be correctional grade and secure at all times.

All Inmate Technology Services MUST be bilingual (English and Spanish at minimum). Proposer shall list all other languages that are available.

Jefferson County reserves the right to contract with any provider for the purpose of improving or upgrading current technology or utilizing new technologies created after this agreement for the benefit of inmates or this agency.

Facility Details:

The Jefferson County Correctional Facility is responsible for a correctional Average Daily Population (ADP) of approximately 850 inmates. The facility has the capability to house up to 1,268 inmates. The inmate population consists of pre-trial felons and misdemeanants, misdemeanants sentenced for a period not to exceed two years, and those felons sentenced to the County for a period of not to exceed two years. The inmate population is housed in a 1,268-bed direct supervision facility with a current population of approximately 850 inmates. The facility currently utilizes approximately (100) inmate telephones.

The Downtown Jail is a 500 bed maximum security jail with a population of approximately 150 inmates. It is no longer used to house Jefferson County inmates. The facility currently utilizes approximately sixty-three inmate telephones and does not use calling cards.

Minnie Rogers Juvenile Justice Center is responsible for a population of up to forty-eight juveniles. The center provides short term care in secure custody to juveniles who are charged with or adjudicated of an offense or offenses against the laws of the State of Texas or another state. The facility currently utilized approximately six (6) inmate telephones and does not use calling cards.

5.2 Executive Summary:

Proposer shall provide an Executive Summary highlighting the firm's background and experience. The Executive Summary shall include:

1. The number of years in business, which includes the date the company was organized specifically for the purpose of providing the Inmate Technology Services requested.
2. Demonstrate firm's commitment to enhancing correctional facility safety, security and efficiency through the development and launch of innovative technologies and services.
3. Professional qualification resumes for the individual(s) that will be involved in project installation, maintenance and support.

5.3 Specifications/Scope of Work – Inmate Telephone System (ITS):

1. Proposer must provide, at no cost to Jefferson County, an ITS to the inmate population that processes collect, prepaid, pin debit and pre-approved free calls only. The ITS provided shall allow for a ratio of inmates to phones of no less than 20 to 1. The ITS provided must be state- of-the art phones employing, at minimum, voice recognition and PIN number user identification.
2. To streamline facility operations and reduce facility staff burden, Proposer's ITS and all other required Inmate Technology Services must be administered by a single, web-based administrative platform as identified within the "A. Scope of Work Overview" section of this RFP.
3. The Proposed must provide, at no cost to the Jefferson County non-coin, inmate telephone stations composed of durable equipment suitable for jail environments.
4. Proposer must provide, at no cost to the Jefferson County, portable inmate phones to be used for inmates that are high risk and locked down. The portable phones must meet the same restrictions (time limit, blocked calls, etc.) placed on regular housing phones.
5. The ITS shall comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA") requirements including, but not limited to, providing telephones which are accessible to persons in wheelchairs and providing devices that are compatible with Telephone Devices for the Deaf ("TDD") or Video Relay Services.

6. All inmate telephone devices must be FCC registered and the Proposer's current FCC number must be provided as part of the proposal response.
7. The ITS must prevent (call block) to following numbers:
 - a. 911
 - b. All 800 services
 - c. All 900 services
 - d. 411 numbers
 - e. Directory assistance
 - f. Local emergency numbers
8. The ITS must not be capable of receiving incoming calls.
9. The ITS must be capable of identifying to Jefferson County which inmate is placing a call and which device/equipment the inmate is using. Additionally, the ITS shall provide Jefferson County the capability to monitor or record calls from multiple sites including remote locations.
10. The ITS must have an alert system that identifies to Jefferson County whenever a specific number is being called or a particular inmate is utilizing the system. The alert system is to include the capability to text message, email or call specific authorized users at predetermined phone numbers or email addresses.
11. The ITS must have the capability to be programmed to block calls from certain identified inmates and calls to certain identified telephone numbers. Additionally, the ITS must have the capability to be programmed to limit the time an inmate may spend on any one call.
12. The ITS must have the capability to be programmed to allow free calls to identified parties to include, but not limited to: attorneys, public defender's office, Social Security Office, JCSO Investigations Unit, TIPS Hotline, Prison Rape Elimination Hotline; these calls must also be capable of having the preprogrammed time limit for calls removed, and the ability to designate if calls should be recorded or unrecorded.
13. The ITS must have the capability to record and store all calls and inbound voicemail messages for a minimum of 180 days.
14. For security and fraud protection, the ITS must include patented software capable of detecting and prohibiting three-way calls that meets the following minimum requirements:
 - a. Requires no additional software to function;
 - b. Adapts dynamically to each phone call based on complete end-to-end network conditions, geographic regions, specific dialed numbers and exchanges;
 - c. Initially analyzes existing line conditions to use as a baseline for the remainder of the call;
 - d. Utilize full digital signal processing on each port;
 - e. Utilize 18 tunable soft parameters to optimize detection performance;
 - f. Allow authorized facility staff to select one of the following actions to be performed upon detection of a 3-way call:
 - i. Disconnect call;
 - ii. Play a single warning prompt or at random intervals during the call;
 - iii. Take no action;
 - g. Allow authorized facility staff to enable or disable detection to allow for allowable called parties (lawyers, public defenders, etc...) to perform a 3-way call;

- h. Record and store detection details within the Call Detail Record (CDR).
15. The ITS must include voice prompts in English and Spanish. Please identify other language capabilities of the system.
 16. The ITS must have a prompt that identifies to the receiver that the call is from the Jefferson County Correctional Facility to include the inmate's name as previously recorded by the inmate. The prompt must alert both the inmate and called party that the call may be monitored or recorded except for privileged professional/attorney calls.
 17. The ITS must provide positive acceptance by the called party.
 18. The ITS must not allow inmate to listen to the status of the call in-progress for the acceptance and or denial by called party and must not allow inmate to communicate with the called party until the call has been accepted.
 19. The ITS must notify both the caller and the called party of call termination by voice prompting at 1 minute and again at 15 seconds prior to the end of the call's pre-programmed time limit.
 20. The ITS must give Jefferson County the capability of taking an individual telephone, all telephones within a housing area, or the entire system out of service in less than 30 seconds.
 21. The Proposer must have a toll-free Customer Service number for the handling of questions, requests and complaints from the called party. The Proposer's Customer Service agents must be employed/located within the United States.
 22. The ITS must have the capability to allow for local and long- distance free calls, limited to no less than 5 minutes in duration, from inmate phones located in Booking areas. These calls must also be recorded and maintained on the server for no less than 180 days.
 23. The Proposer must provide, at no cost to the Jefferson County, an interface between the ITS and the Jefferson County's Jail Management System (JMS), to support:
 - a. Automatic activation and deactivation of inmate PIN numbers; as inmates are booked and released from custody.
 - b. Determination of inmate's housing location within the facility.
 24. The ITS must be able to restrict calls made by an inmate when the call is not being placed from a phone located within the inmate's current housing location.
 25. The ITS must have the capability to allow authorized facility staff to save, download, or email calls to removable portable devices via USB ports or DVD drives.
 26. The ITS must have the capability to allow users to make electronic notes on each call.
 27. The ITS must have the capability to set daily and weekly schedules for telephone activation and deactivation for "on/off" times.
 28. The ITS must have the capability to run administrative reports from a Jefferson County workstation; these reports include but are not limited to revenue/commission reports, inmate/account reports, and system reports.
 - a. Authorized users must have ability to confirm/validate accuracy of ITS call and commission rates in real-time via a Phone Commission Report. The Phone Commission Report at a minimum must provide the following ITS information for user defined date range:
 - i. Call Type
 - ii. Tariff Type
 - iii. # of Calls
 - iv. # of Minutes
 - v. Gross Revenue

- vi. Commission Rate
 - vii. Commission~~s~~ Earned
- b. To demonstrate functionality, Proposer must provide a sample copy of Phone Commission Report an authorized user is able to generate.
29. The ITS must provide an Inmate Crime Tip Line, a no-charge, speed-dial number that connects to a recorded message system that can be used by inmates to anonymously report criminal activity within the facility or to provide information related to criminal investigations.
30. The Proposer must pay Jefferson County a monthly ITS commission on all call types. Monthly commissions are to be paid no later than the last day of the month following the month in which the commissions were earned. If the commission check fails to reach the County by the above specified date, the awarded vendor will pay the County the going interest rate each month for delinquent commissions owed the County. Commissions are to be paid by three (3) separate checks, one for each of the three locations.
31. The ITS Commission rate shall be based on gross revenue to be defined as revenue on all call types from inmate non-coin phones.

C.2. Specifications/Scope of Work – Inmate Video Visitation System (VVS):

1. To meet the unique safety and security of needs of Jefferson County, Proposer's VVS software must be specifically designed for use in a correctional environment and solely owned by the Proposer. Video meeting/conference software such as Skype, Google Meet or Zoom will not be accepted.
2. To streamline facility operations and reduce facility staff burden, Proposer's VVS and all other required Inmate Technology Services must be administered by a single, web-based administrative platform as identified within the "A. Scope of Work Overview" section of this RFP.
3. To maximize inmate access to VVS services, the Proposer's proprietary VVS must function on both inmate kiosks and tablet devices. Inmate kiosks and tablet devices must be correctional-grade and provided, installed, supported and maintained by the Proposer at no cost to the Jefferson County. A VVS that requires Jefferson County be held financially responsible for any aspect of the inmate kiosk and/or tablet provided whatsoever will not be accepted.
4. To ensure optimal performance, Proposer must serve as the prime contractor and will be solely responsible for the delivery, operation and maintenance of the VVS throughout contract term. A VVS provided by a subcontractor, third party or affiliate vendor will not be accepted.
5. To support easy and quick use, Proposer's VVS must be web browser-based allowing for full functionality within a common web browser (i.e. Chrome, Firefox, Internet Explorer, Safari, etc...). A VVS that requires a public or professional user to download an application to their smart device or computer in order to create a visitor profile, schedule a visit or participate in a video visitation session will not be accepted.
6. VVS must include a user-friendly web-based platform. This platform must meet the following minimum requirements:
 - a. Provide ability for individuals to create a free public or professional user profile:
 - i. Provide authorized facility staff with the ability to configure identity verification requirements based upon user profile type (public or professional):
 1. Upload of user's valid government photo ID;
 2. Upload of a self-shot user profile photo;
 3. Entry of user's full name and current address;
 4. Entry of name and the user's relationship to inmate they are seeking to schedule/participate in a video visitation session with.
 - ii. Proposer must provide screenshots and a description illustrating how a public user is able to create a VVS profile and schedule a visitation with an inmate via a mobile smart device.
 - b. Incorporate automated scheduling and calendar modules that:
 - i. Provide a list of inmates eligible/available to participate in a video visitation session.
 - ii. Automatically send a text message or email notification to public and professional users when a scheduled video visitation system has been cancelled.
7. The Proposer must provide, at no cost to Jefferson County, an interface between the VVS and the JCSO's Jail Management System (JMS) to support video visitation scheduling/inmate availability.
8. To help keep inmates and loved ones connected, Proposer's VVS must support an option that allows inmates to initiate their own, unscheduled remote visitation sessions. The VVS must provide the facility with control over which inmates may initiate video visitation sessions and when such initiations may take place.
9. All remote video visitation sessions must be billed on a per/minute basis. Proposer's VVS that require a minimum time usage limit/fee will not be accepted.
10. To prevent the transmission of undesirable visual content, Proposer's VVS must incorporate facial detection/content filtering software that meets the following minimum requirements:

- a. Ability to immediately and automatically block/black out the inmate and/or user's background environment and body so that only human faces are visible throughout the video visitation session.
 - b. The moment a human face is unable to be detected, the software must:
 - i. Immediately and automatically temporarily suspend the transmission of the inmate and/or public user's video stream in which a human face is unable to be detected.
 - ii. Immediately and automatically display a visual text notice on the inmate and/or public user's monitor to alert user's that a video stream has been suspended due to software's inability to detect a human face. The text notice shall also include details relating to what corrective action must be performed (i.e. face device's camera) to resume transmission of suspended video stream.
 1. To demonstrate the availability and functionality of Proposer's VVS facial detection/content filtering software, Proposer must provide a screenshot of the visual text notice displayed when the software does not detect a human face during a real-life video visitation session. Proposer must also provide at least two facility references with point of contact details (title first and last name, telephone number and email address) in which the proposed VVS facial detection/content filtering software has been deployed on inmate tablet devices for a minimum of two consecutive years.
 - iii. Immediately and automatically resume the transmission of suspended inmate and/or public user's video stream when software detects a human face (corrective action has been performed).
 - c. Be configurable to allow authorized facility staff to enable or disable the software in advanced or in real-time based upon the name of a specific inmate, public user or both. To demonstrate the availability and functionality of this feature, Proposer must provide a screenshot of this control setting as it is displayed to authorized users within the administrative dashboard.
 - d. Be configurable to allow authorized facility staff to enable or disable the software for specific user profile types (inmate, public and/or professional). To demonstrate the availability and functionality of this feature, Proposer must provide a screenshot of this control setting as it is displayed to authorized users within the administrative dashboard.
11. VVS must encrypt all on-site and remote video visitation sessions while in progress as well as recordings at rest.
 12. VVS must be capable of High Definition (HD) video streaming up to 30 frames per second.
 13. VVS must be capable of allowing inmate kiosks installed within housing units to display all pending visits.
 14. VVS must provide notification to public user/visitor and inmate that visitations are subject to monitoring and/or recording in both English and Spanish language.
 15. VVS must have a countdown clock that is a visible on-screen alerting visitors of visit time remaining.
 16. VVS web-based administrative platform as identified within the "A. Scope of Work Overview" section of this RFP, must meet the following requirements:
 - a. Allow authorized users to monitor all visits from both on-site and remote locations in real-time.
 - b. Provide authorized users with the ability to monitor up to 12 VVS video visitation sessions simultaneously.
 - c. VVS Recording and Playback Requirements:
 - i. Video visitation session recordings must be stored as a single file that contains both the inmate and visiting party audio and video feeds as well as other important visitation data such as the video endpoints used, session timer and date/time of the visit. Any messages displayed during the visitation must be recorded in the video call recording file as well.
 - ii. Automatically prevent/disable all professional user profile video visitation sessions from being monitored by authorized facility staff or recorded.
 - iii. Provide the capability to record and store all non-privileged remote video visitations in an encrypted format for a minimum of 180 days.

- iv. Provide the capability for authorized users to add comments to a recorded visit as well as to registered public user/visitor profiles.
 - v. For ease of play back, all VVS video visitation session recordings must be saved in a common .MP4 format.
 - vi. Provide authorized users with ability to transfer video visitation session recordings onto media storage device such as a USB thumb drive, CD or DVD Rom.
- d. Provide the capability for authorized users to authorize and/or establish professional user profiles.
17. VVS system must be capable of producing audit trails for system activity to include:
- a. Staff, inmate, and visitor log in/logoff dates and times.
 - b. Event log that captures visitor name, inmate name, visitation date, visitation start time, visitation end time and visitation duration.
 - c. Visitors that scheduled, modified or cancelled a visit.
 - d. Visitor IP addresses.
18. The Proposer must pay Jefferson County a monthly VVS commission on all revenue generating VVS sessions.
19. VVS commission rate shall be based on gross revenue to be defined as per minute revenue generated for each VVS session. Proposer must not set any minimum VVS system usage requirements that must be met for Jefferson County to be eligible to receive commissions.
20. To demonstrate current client satisfaction, Proposer must provide at least 5 references that are currently utilizing the proposed VVS that meets all mandatory requirements/features. Reference information must include:
- a. Reference Facility Name
 - b. Reference Facility Address, City, State and ZIP Code
 - c. Reference Facility Capacity
 - d. Reference Facility Primary Point of Contact Details
 - i. Title, First and Last Name
 - ii. Phone Number
 - iii. Email Address
 - e. VVS implementation Date

C.3. Specifications/Scope of Work – Inmate Tablet Program:

1. Proposer must provide a turn-key Inmate Tablet Program that offers the following minimum features/applications:
 - a. Phone Call Application:
 - i. Tablet-based calls must be billed at the same rate as calls placed through hardwired/wall mounted telephones.
 - ii. Tablet based calls must be subject to the same call safety, security, monitoring, recording and control functions/applications as hardwired/wall mounted telephones.
 - b. Video Visitation Application:
 - i. Tablet-based VVS sessions must be subject to the same safety, security, monitoring, recording and control features as a kiosk-based system.
 - ii. For flexibility and mobility purposes, tablets must not require a docking station or charging cable to be used to participate in a video visitation session.
 - c. Messaging Application:
 - i. Family and Friends Messaging:
 1. Inmates must be able to exchange messages with family and friends at an affordable rate.
 2. Inmate, Family and Friend messages must be billed on a per message basis. To avoid excessive charges, messaging systems that charge a per minute access fee will not be accepted.
 3. For investigative purposes, all inmate, family and friend message exchanges must:
 - a. automatically be saved in a keyword searchable database.
 - b. provide keyword tracking in inmate digital general request, grievance request and medical request. Must provide system screen captures examples and 3 agency references that have used this technology for over 2 years.
 - c. provide screen capture examples of 3-way communication blocking and agency flagging notification with the electronic messaging system.
 - d. database must be accessible to authorized facility staff by a secure, web-based administrative platform.
 - e. Allow authorized facility to set alerts whenever a message is sent or received by specific inmate or public user.
 - f. Allow authorized facility staff to set alerts whenever a message containing a single or multiple keywords is contained within a message.
 - ii. Attorney Messaging:
 1. Inmate messaging application must include specialized Attorney Messaging feature to allow vetted attorneys to send confidential legal documents and exchange messages with inmates electronically. Proposer must provide 3 agency references where this technology has been in place for over 2 years.
 2. Additional security measures are taken to ensure the privacy of attorney messages and digital legal documents and files. These measures must include:
 - a. Information and correspondence must be exchanged and stored in an encrypted environment that is completely inaccessible to facility staff.
 - b. To retrieve/view legal documents and exchange secure messages with their attorney, an inmate must first log in to a tablet or kiosk device by entering their facility assigned PIN and then enter their secondary private password to access the encrypted environment.

- d. Law Library Application:
 - i. Must be provided to facility at no cost.
 - ii. Inmate access/use must be provided at no cost.
 - e. Education and Reentry Programs:
 - i. Inmate access/use must be provided at no cost.
 - f. Request and Grievances:
 - i. Must be provided to facility at no cost.
 - ii. Inmate access/use must be provided at no cost.
 - g. Entertainment:
 - i. Must offer a wide variety of media choices including movies and many tv series, Internet radio stations and video games.
 - ii. Provide inmates with free access to eBooks.
 - iii. To limit excessive charges and various issues/liabilities associated with ownership and transference of media upon the individual's release from custody, media must:
 - a. Be offered exclusively in a streaming format that is not capable of being stored within the tablet's internal memory. Entertainment/media options that are download or subscription based will not be accepted.
 - b. Be streamed at a low flat fixed rate per minute.
 - c. Provide inmates with free access to eBooks.
 - iv. Must provide authorized facility staff with complete control over what media/content is available to inmates.
 - h. Documents Viewer Application (Inmate Handbooks, Reentry manuals, etc.)
 - i. Inmate access/use must be provided at no cost.
 - i. Video Player Application (Facility Introduction, PREA, etc...)
 - i. Inmate access/use must be provided at no cost.
2. To streamline facility operations and reduce facility staff burden, Proposer's Inmate Tablet Program and all other required Inmate Technology Services must be administered by a single, web-based administrative platform as identified within the "A. Scope of Work Overview" section of this RFP.
 3. To meet unique safety and security needs, Proposer's tablets must be specifically engineered/manufactured for use within a correctional facility. Commercial Off-the-Shelf (COTS) tablets (i.e. Samsung, Levnovo, Kindle, etc...) are not acceptable.
 4. Consumer based tablets with an attached correctional designed case will not be accepted. Tablet body and case must be integrated as one with the tablet. Proposer must specify the make and model of proposed tablet accompanied with pictures.
 5. To provide the best level support and service, Proposer must be original provider of the inmate tablet device and solely own all proprietary rights to the tablet system. Tablets provided by a subcontractor, third party or affiliated company will not be accepted.
 6. To verify durability, Proposer must provide independent tablet durability and drop-test reports.

7. To provide inmates with equal access to tablet devices, Proposer must utilize a shared tablet distribution models in which tablet devices are provided to inmates at no cost. Inmate Tablet Programs where inmates must purchase, lease or rent a tablet device will not be accepted.
 - a. Proposer must state specific minimum inmate to tablet ratio to be provided.
 - b. Proposer must confirm that additional tablet devices will be provided at no cost if inmate tablet usage exceeds 50% of available time in any housing unit.
 - c. Proposer must provide the facility with a pool of spare tablet devices to allow for a damaged or inoperable device to be immediately replaced at no cost.
8. Proposer's Inmate Tablet Program must meet the following technical requirements:
 - a. Inmate tablet devices must be Wi-Fi enabled.
 - b. Inmate tablet devices must be capable of being updated wirelessly in real time. All tablet device software updates must be provided at no cost.
 - c. Inmate Tablet devices must be capable of being charged by a custom, FCC approved, wall mountable charging station that can charge/store a minimum of 10 tablets simultaneously.
 - i. To allow for self-service and prevent charging of unauthorized electronic devices such as cell phones, tablet charging stations must utilize metal to metal contact pins. Tablet charging stations that utilize magnetic induction or cords/cables will not be accepted.
 - d. Inmate Tablet devices must be equipped with an internal speaker as well as equipped with a 3.5mm jack to allow for the connection to a facility approved headphone/headset.
 - e. For accountability purposes, Inmate Tablet devices must:
 - i. Require an inmate to enter credentials and log in to the tablet before being able to access any application.
 - ii. Display terms and conditions to users the first time they login or for subsequent changes to the terms and conditions.
 - iii. Provide capability of restricting inmate usage to the specific housing units to which the inmate is assigned.
9. Inmate Tablet Program must meet the following security requirements:
 - a. Provide the following security measures to harden the firmware on the tablets:
 - i. No option for inmates to change the settings;
 - ii. All NFC, Bluetooth and Cellular wireless radio has been disabled, except for Wi-Fi;
 - iii. Disable inmate's ability to install and/or un-install apps;
 - iv. Push authorized apps to the tablet devices through an app state management process;
 - v. Provide no access to third-party app stores
 - b. To ensure inmates cannot access the Internet, Proposer's Inmate Tablet devices must feature a custom, proprietary operating system that will only allow the device to connect to a secure network.
 - c. Tablet device wireless network traffic must be routed through the Proposer's network system with no exception and provide firewall, transparent proxy, DHCP, DNS and routing services for the tablets.
 - d. Proposer must furnish a recent independent report from a certified vendor of network and program security that notes no vulnerabilities were found.
 - e. Proposer must provide secure Internet Protocol communications by authenticating and encrypting each IP packet of a communication session.

10. Proposer's inmate tablet must interface with JMS and other systems as applicable. All interface services must be provided at no cost.

D. Network Infrastructure Security:

The Proposer will provide information to explain their process of protecting the underlying networking infrastructure by installing preventative measures to deny unauthorized access, modification, deletion, and theft of resources and data.

To minimize Jefferson County liability risk, Proposer must provide a detailed list of any/all security breaches that any of their proposed systems (ITS, VVS, EMS, DPMS, etc...) has been subject to. Details must include incident data, description of type and amount of data compromised and settlements and/or litigation that resulted from the breach.

Additionally, Proposer must furnish a recent independent report from a certified vendor of network and program security that notes no vulnerabilities were found.

E. Maintenance, Service and Support:

The successful Proposer shall be responsible for maintenance support twenty-four (24) hours per day, seven (7) days per week.

Proposer must provide a detailed description of the company's service and maintenance programs.

All costs for maintenance, support, repair of all software and equipment, and internal background investigations for Proposer's employees, will be borne by the successful Proposer and will not be deducted from any commissions.

During the term of any contract awarded from this RFP, the successful proposer agrees to provide maintenance, diagnose problems, determine proper solutions, and provide the following:

1. Implement any required solutions, changes, modifications, updates, or other services that are necessary to allow the software, hardware and any other telephone equipment to perform in accordance with the specifications as set forth in the RFP;
2. Upgrade the software and/or hardware to its required performance standards as required in the RFP;
3. Respond to telephone requests for maintenance within two (2) hours after the initial notification;
4. Provide a system administrative technician on an as needed basis at no cost to Jefferson County.

F. Training Requirements:

The Proposer must provide end-user training for the Comprehensive Inmate Technology Services Package proposed. End-user training is to be provided on-site and at no cost to Jefferson County. Proposer must provide a high-level overview describing the end-user training program to be provided.

G. Implementation Plan/Timeline:

Proposers must provide a high-level project implementation plan/timeline overview. This overview must include a time frame required for installation, utility coordination, training, cut over and testing. The proposed Comprehensive Inmate Technology Services Package must be installed in a manner and under a time frame designed to minimize disruption of the normal functioning of the facilities.

H. Cost Proposal/Financial Offer:

Proposer must provide a detailed breakdown and descriptions of all rates, fees, surcharges and commissions for the Comprehensive Inmate Technology Services Package composed of an Inmate Telephone System (ITS), Inmate Video Visitation System (VVS), Inmate Electronic Messaging System (EMS) and Inmate Tablet Program; or if applicable, any other fees charged to the public aside from the normal taxes, including any potential additional fees or charges to the remote visitor for optional features that the facility might choose from the Proposer. Any fees charged not disclosed in this response will be grounds for contract termination. ITS call rates shall not exceed FCC or state mandated per-minute rate caps.

6. Project Requirements

6.1 Objective

Each proposal must include a detailed work plan that addresses how work for Jefferson County would be performed. It shall include detailed personnel assignments. A detailed description of major deliverables to be provided must also be included.

The proposal must include a sample timeline for the completion of each major task included in the proposal to the extent practicable, as well as projected completion dates for each major activity required. All proposals submitted in response to this RFP become the property of Jefferson County.

6.2 Offeror Experience

The successful Offeror must demonstrate extensive experience in and understanding of the nature of research and analysis required in order to carry out the intent of this project.

The proposal must identify all key personnel who are to be part of the proposed consultant team and detail their experience. Jefferson County Commissioners' Court reserves the right to approve each member of the team and to request substitutions.

The Offeror must describe in detail the current and historical experience the Offeror and its subcontractors have that would be relevant to completing the project. The Offeror must provide descriptions and references for all engagements of comparable complexity and sensitivity to the requirements of this RFP that have been conducted within the past five (5) years. References must contain the name of key contacts and a telephone number.

The description of experience must be detailed and cover all relevant contracts that the Offeror and its subcontractors, as applicable, have had and all experience similar to this contract that qualifies the Offeror to meet the requirements of this contract. Included must be the names, titles, addresses, and current telephone numbers of organizations that may be contacted to verify qualifying experience. The Offeror must indicate whether the organizations so listed are included for the purpose of verifying the Offeror's qualifying experience, or the qualifying experience of its subcontractors. Each experience statement also must include the name and types of services directly provided by the Offeror under the contract, and whether the Offeror was the contractor or subcontractor.

The Offeror must briefly state why it believes its proposed services best meet the County's needs and RFP requirements, and the Offeror also must concisely describe any additional features, aspects, or advantages of its services in any relevant area not covered elsewhere in its proposal.

6.3 Offeror Personnel and Organization

The Offeror must provide resumes of all key personnel that will be involved in performing the project, and must provide for each person:

- a. Full name (including full middle name);
- b. An employment history;
- c. A specific description of relevant experience and skills that person has in connection with the conduct of financial advisory services that is the subject of this RFP (limit one page);
- d. A specific indication of what role the individual will have in this project; and

- e. Any additional helpful information to indicate the individual's ability to aid the Offeror in successfully performing the work involved in this RFP (limit to one page).

The resumes must present the required personnel in sufficient detail as to provide the County an indication that the personnel involved can perform the work specified in this RFP. All proposed personnel will be subject to the County approval.

Jefferson County is committed to using the selected Performance Review Company according to reasonable and well-planned timeframes, to the extent possible. Jefferson County is committed to making available its personnel in a similar manner to enable the Performance Review team able to perform its duties in a timely basis. Each Offeror is required to make a statement as to the availability of key personnel to Jefferson County when required.

The key personnel who are to work on this project, identified in the proposal as such, are considered to be essential to the services to be provided. No substitutions of key personnel following contract award will be made without the prior written consent of Jefferson County Commissioners' Court. All requested substitutes must be submitted to the Jefferson County Commissioners' Court, or, together with their resumes, for approval.

Each of the successful Offeror's personnel is subject to removal from this project by Jefferson County Commissioners' Court. In addition, if the person removed is among the project's key personnel, the replacement must be approved by Jefferson County Commissioners' Court. All replacements of key personnel will be paid at the same rate as the person who was replaced, unless the rate normally charged by the replacement is lower, in which case the lower rate will be paid. All replacements of key personnel must be of equal or superior experience as the person replaced.

If applicable, each Offeror must provide a detailed statement setting forth the proposed hourly billing rate for all key personnel, and for each additional staff member to be assigned to the project. The hours each of the key personnel and other staff members are projected to work on the project.

Each Offeror must provide any equipment, software, or data communication lines required by the successful Offeror's personnel to complete the work specified in this document. Each Offeror also must identify any personnel related through blood or marriage to the County or to any current employee of the County.

Each Offeror must provide an organizational chart covering the services offered in its proposal, indicating lines of authority, names, titles, and functions of individuals assigned. The Offeror must assign a contact person to the project.

7. Proposal Evaluation and Selection Process

7.1 Introduction

The proposal evaluation and selection process is detailed in this section, as are other factors, and the format in which the cost response of each proposal must be submitted.

7.2 Cost Proposal

The Offeror must include the Cost Proposal Form (page 45) in its submission of a cost proposal in response to this RFP. The Cost Proposal Form must be included in each copy of the proposal. Cost/Fee Proposals may be submitted in any form, but must fully meet the requirements of 5.H. (page 40).

7.3 Proposal Evaluation and Selection

Because of the diversity of the departments and activities of the County, the Purchasing Agent will appoint the Evaluation Committee for this Request for Proposals. The Purchasing Agent may appoint a chairperson and no less than two (2) other members for the committee. Typically, the committee will consist of at least one professional in the task required, a person knowledgeable about procurement practices, and either a representative of the department requesting the project, or the department executing the project. However, this structure is not binding and subject to change at the discretion of the Purchasing Agent. Other members may be appointed to the Evaluation Committee as necessary and appropriate, but the total number of persons committee shall not exceed five (5) persons. Committee appointments shall be in writing and shall briefly describe the scope of the project and, if necessary, the primary disciplines required to accomplish the project in order to assist the committee in developing a list of firms that might best accomplish the work required. Committee membership and project requirements will vary from project to project. Therefore, a firm rated number one for one project could be considered not qualified or ranked lower on another project. **Any contact by any bidder to any member of the Evaluation Committee prior to award of the contract will disqualify their bid.**

7.4 Evaluation Criteria:

- a. **Relevant Experience – 20%**
- b. **Adherence to Specifications/Statement of Work – 45%**
- c. **Cost Proposal/Financial Offer – 20%**
- d. **References/Interviews/Presentations (optional) – 15%**

The Evaluation Committee may elect to require an oral presentation from each qualified Offeror of the information contained in their proposal. Any invitation for an oral presentation will be solely for the purpose of clarifying proposals received from each qualifying Offeror, and will not represent any decision on the part of the evaluation committee as to the selection of a successful Offeror.

Upon completion of their review and any oral presentations, the Evaluation Committee will convene one or more times to discuss the proposals as a group. Each Evaluation Committee member will individually score each proposal independently. Jefferson County Purchasing Department will collect all scores and aggregate the scores of all Committee members. The Purchasing Department will then prepare a report identifying the proposal that scored the highest in the selection process according to the evaluation criteria described in this RFP and make a recommendation to the Commissioners' Court.

Upon the selection of an apparent successful Offeror, the Court shall appoint the Purchasing Agent to proceed with contract negotiations and attempt to finalize a written contract with the apparent successful Offeror. If a contract cannot be successfully negotiated within a reasonable period of time, negotiations will be terminated,

and negotiations with the next highest-ranking Offeror may commence. This process may continue until a contract is signed or the RFP is withdrawn. However, the County may, in its sole judgment and at any time upon failure of negotiations, choose to reissue or withdraw the RFP rather than continue with negotiations. A notice of award will be sent to all Offerors immediately following execution of a written contract.

Key staff of the County will be available to the successful Offeror on a reasonable basis, but may not be available on holidays or weekends.

7.5. Evaluation Process:

RFP Submittals that do not conform to the instructions or which do not address all the services as specified within this RFP specifications packet may be eliminated from consideration. However, Jefferson County reserves the right to accept such a submittal if it is determined to be in the best interest of the County.

While Jefferson County appreciates a brief, straight-forward, and concise reply; proposer must fully understand that the evaluation is based on the information provided. Accuracy and completeness are essential. Omissions, ambiguous, and equivocal statements may be construed against the proposer. The proposal document may be incorporated into any contract which results from this RFP, and vendor(s) are cautioned not to make claims or statements it is not prepared to commit to contractually. Failure of the vendor to meet such claims will result in a requirement that the vendor provide resources necessary to meet submitted claims.

The Jefferson County Purchasing Department may initiate discussions with selected vendors; however, discussions may not be initiated by vendors.

The Jefferson County Purchasing Department expects to conduct discussions with vendor's representatives authorized to contractually obligate the vendor with an offer. **Vendors shall not contact any Jefferson County personnel during the RFP process without the express permission from the Jefferson County Purchasing Agent. The Purchasing Agent may disqualify any vendor who has made site visits, contacted Jefferson County personnel, or distributed any literature without authorization from the Jefferson County Purchasing Department.**

All correspondence relating to this RFP, from advertisement to award shall be sent to the Jefferson County Purchasing Department. All presentations and/or meetings between Jefferson County and the vendor relating to this RFP shall be coordinated by the Jefferson County Purchasing Department.

Selected vendors may be expected to make a presentation/product demonstration to an Evaluation Committee and Commissioners' Court. Proposals, vendor presentations, and product/service evaluations may develop into negotiating sessions with the vendor(s) as selected by the Evaluation Committee. Jefferson County expects to conduct negotiations with vendor representatives authorized to contractually obligate the vendor with an offer. If vendor is unable to agree to contract terms and conditions, Jefferson County reserves the right to terminate contract negotiations with that vendor and initiate negotiations with another vendor. In addition to a presentation, visits by the Evaluation Committee to representative vendor client sites may be conducted where the proposed solution can be demonstrated in a production environment.

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F. Project Requirements

5. Scope of Services

5.1 Objective/Scope of Work Overview

To ensure optimal performance and support, the Proposer MUST serve as the prime contractor and be held solely responsible for the delivery, operation and maintenance of ALL Inmate Technology Services proposed throughout the contract term. Proposals composed of Inmate Technology Services that rely on the use of subcontractors, third parties or affiliate vendors will NOT be accepted.

Additionally, to streamline facility operations and reduce facility staff burden, Proposer MUST provide, at no cost to Jefferson County; a secure, single login web-based administrative platform that provides an unlimited number of authorized users with access to ALL administrative controls, reporting and investigative features/tools of the Proposer's ITS, VVS, DPMS, EMS and Inmate Tablet Program. The web-based administrative platform MUST meet the following minimum requirements:

1. Be readily accessible to authorized users via any PC with a modern browser and active Internet without the need to download additional software.
2. Must provide various manual and automated tools to aid in the investigation or discovery of criminal activities by allowing investigators to easily check for any links between inmates and public individuals or other inmates using multi-path and multi-relation analysis.
3. Multi-path/multi-relation analysis must be capable of detecting an indirect relationship between two inmates through a public individual using a combination of phone calls, video visitation visits and electronic messages.

All Inmate Technology Services MUST be bilingual (English and Spanish at minimum). Proposer shall list all other languages that are available.

RESPONSE: Our SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard is a secure, web-based platform that will provide authorized facility staff with the ability to administer all inmate communication technologies (ITS, VVS, kiosks, tablets, messaging, requests, law library, postal mail, messaging and entertainment) all from a single location. Creating an ecosystem of inmate communication data, intelligence, control, and automation to streamline operations and alleviate staff burden



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
The SmartEcosystem™ is delivered with our SmartLink™ Investigator which provides various manual and automated tools to aid in the investigation or discovery of criminal activity at **no cost**. By using SmartLink™ tools, investigators can easily check for any links between inmates and public individuals or other inmates using multi-path and multi-relation analysis.



SmartLink™ Investigator also incorporates the POLE data model and advanced graphing technology to permit manual or automated analysis of related events and people. Our system incorporates data from all aspects of our broad network of information, including inmate communications through phone calls, messaging, visitation, financial transactions, connected friends and family, incarceration and release dates, housing assignments and other elements to facilitate the discovery of related events and individuals, and predict possible future activities using advance AI techniques.

Additionally, SmartLink™ Investigator works in conjunction with our live monitoring systems to permit automated background checking of suspicious activities that may occur over extended periods of time. Detecting activities based on time and patterns can alert an investigator when a sequence of events takes place, possibly providing time to apprehend an individual and prevent them from completing an undesired action.

Using SmartLink™, an investigator can uncover paths of communication through multiple platforms that are not possible to see by looking at one set of data. The example below shows an indirect relationship between two inmates through a public individual using a combination of phone calls placed through SmartEvo™ ITS and messages sent through SmartInmate™ Electronic Messaging system.



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5.3 Specifications/Scope of Work – Inmate Telephone System (ITS):

1. Proposer must provide, at no cost to Jefferson County, an ITS to the inmate population that processes collect, prepaid, pin debit and pre-approved free calls only. The ITS provided shall allow for a ratio of inmates to phones of no less than 20 to 1. The ITS provided must be state- of-the art phones employing, at minimum, voice recognition and PIN number user identification.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications will be responsible for the provision of all equipment, software, network infrastructure and related services necessary to operate the SmartEvo™ ITS at **no cost** to the County.

Smart Communications' SmartEvo™ ITS provides collect, prepaid and pin debit call capabilities for inmates to stay in touch with their family and friends. The SmartEvo™ ITS processes all calls in the same manner regardless of call type or payment method. All calls originating at the facility are processed with an automated operator with no need for any assistance from a third-party. All calls are subject to the same restrictions and functions, including monitoring, recording and on-site reporting.



During installation, the SmartEvo™ ITS will be configured to support free calls based on the preferences of the County. For identification and investigative purposes, we recommend inmates be required to enter their PIN to place a free call.

The use of Voice Biometrics and PINs is an integral part of the SmartEvo™ ITS. Inmate PINs are uploaded to the SmartEvo™ ITS through an interface with the JMS. To make a call, the inmate must enter their PIN and then provide a voice sample which is matched against their pre-recorded voice sample. The SmartEvo™ ITS two-factor authentication process ensures a proper match of the inmate and their corresponding PIN account and has proven far more accurate than voice identification alone. The SmartEvo™ ITS Voice Biometrics system is highly-effective in establishing the identity of inmates and preventing fraudulent use of PINs.

2. To streamline facility operations and reduce facility staff burden, Proposer's ITS and all other required Inmate Technology Services must be administered by a single, web-based administrative platform as identified within the "A. Scope of Work Overview" section of this RFP.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications' systems are managed through our secure, password protected, web-based SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard. The SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard can be accessed by authorized County personnel from a single or multiple dedicated monitoring terminals or through a secured internet connection from a desktop, laptop or remote means.

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3. The Proposed must provide, at no cost to the Jefferson County non-coin, inmate telephone stations composed of durable equipment suitable for jail environments.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications will provide inmate telephone stations specifically designed to meet the unique security, safety and durability needs of correctional facilities.

All inmate telephone station ringers are disconnected and will not allow incoming calls. These inmate telephone stations are manufactured of high-strength, tamper-proof heavy gauge steel that is coated in a graffiti/scratch resistant finish. The telephone handsets are constructed of heavy-duty polycarbonate molded plastic and feature no removable parts. These handsets attach to the base station via a steel armored, stretch/break/pull resistant cable. The length of the cable can be customized to meet facility-specific requirements.


Inmate telephone station dial pads are constructed of heavy-duty metal and sealed to prevent moisture and allow for use in inclement weather conditions. In addition to these security and durability features, all SmartEvo™ ITS hardware used by inmates are line powered and have no parts that can be removed without use of a specialized tool. These prevent damage and inhibit inmates from using telephone parts to manufacture weapons.

Smart Communications will also supply "hands-free" telephones for inmate use where suicide threat is present.

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4. Proposer must provide, at no cost to the Jefferson County, portable inmate phones to be used for inmates that are high risk and locked down. The portable phones must meet the same restrictions (time limit, blocked calls, etc.) placed on regular housing phones.

RESPONSE: For portable communication applications, Smart Communications will provide portable inmate telephone stations securely mounted on a rolling base constructed of heavy-duty 14-gauge steel and featuring four 4.0" lockable wheels.

5. The ITS shall comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA") requirements including, but not limited to, providing telephones which are accessible to persons in wheelchairs and providing devices that are compatible with Telephone Devices for the Deaf ("TDD") or Video Relay Services.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications provides the equipment necessary to ensure your facility's telephone service and hardware is compliant with all requirements set forth in the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). This includes providing telephones that are accessible to persons in wheelchairs and systems that are compatible with Telephone Devices for the Deaf (TDD).



6. All inmate telephone devices must be FCC registered and the Proposer's current FCC number must be provided as part of the proposal response.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications' FCC Registration Number (FRN) is 00281684666.

7. The ITS must prevent (call block) to following numbers:

- a. 911
- b. All 800 services
- c. All 900 services
- d. 411 numbers
- e. Directory assistance
- f. Local emergency numbers

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The proposed SmartEvo™ ITS provides complete control over all calls placed through the system and disallows 800/900/information/operator call options. In the early stages of placing a call, the ITS validates dialing patterns and specifically restricts certain prefixes such as 900, 800, 888, 700, 976, 411, 911, and

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common patterns such as "N11", "10XXX", "0" and "00". Additionally, the ITS allows for very specific blocking based on wild card patterns such as any "NPA" or "NPA-NXX" combinations. There are no limits to the number of wild card patterns that can be added to the system.


8. The ITS must not be capable of receiving incoming calls.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartEvo™ ITS only allows outgoing calls. It is impossible to receive an incoming call through the SmartEvo™ ITS because IPVPN circuits are used to connect the facility to the data center so there is no interface/connection to a Plain Old Telephone System (POTS). Furthermore, the inmate telephones do not feature a call ringer or other way to indicate an incoming call.

9. The ITS must be capable of identifying to Jefferson County which inmate is placing a call and which device/equipment the inmate is using. Additionally, the ITS shall provide Jefferson County the capability to monitor or record calls from multiple sites including remote locations.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. All SmartEvo™ ITS calls that are not protected by attorney/client privilege can be monitored by authorized County or investigative staff in real-time via the SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard. The SmartEvo™ ITS also automatically records all non-privileged calls. Authorized staff can access all monitoring features and call recordings via the web-based SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard on-site or remotely from any Internet-enabled PC; no additional hardware or software is required.

10. The ITS must have an alert system that identifies to Jefferson County whenever a specific number is being called or a particular inmate is utilizing the system. The alert system is to include the capability to text message, email or call specific authorized users at predetermined phone numbers or email addresses.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartEvo™ ITS allows authorized staff to set up call watches on as many called numbers, inmates or inmate phones as necessary. The call watches can use one or more of the criteria to make complex watch conditions. Watches can also contain lists of numbers such as staff, known gang members, accomplices or other high interest groups. When the SmartEvo™ ITS detects a call that matches one of the watch conditions, it will take one of the preset actions, including providing an audible notification, sending a text or email, or call a phone number and allow the user to listen to the call audio remotely. When listening remotely, the user enters a PIN and can elect to listen to the call live, rewind or pause the call audio. The user can also disconnect the call in progress.

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11. The ITS must have the capability to be programmed to block calls from certain identified inmates and calls to certain identified telephone numbers. Additionally, the ITS must have the capability to be programmed to limit the time an inmate may spend on any one call.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartEvo™ ITS provides full control of blocked number lists whether the number is blocked by inmate PIN, specific phones or system wide. Numbers can be blocked by the called party, a Smart Communications Customer Care Center representative or by authorized County staff. Before the called party accepts a call, they have an option to block further calls from the facility by dialing "7." Authorized staff can manage blocked numbers via the SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard "Restrict/Allow" page.

The SmartEvo™ ITS also provides the County with complete control over inmate call limits and configurations. Inmate calls can be limited by configurable minute increments, call duration, location, inmate account/PIN, telephone station and more. These configurations are established during installation and can be adjusted at any time by authorized staff via the web-based SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard.

12. The ITS must have the capability to be programmed to allow free calls to identified parties to include, but not limited to: attorneys, public defender's office, Social Security Office, JCSO Investigations Unit, TIPS Hotline, Prison Rape Elimination Hotline; these calls must also be capable of having the preprogrammed time limit for calls removed, and the ability to designate if calls should be recorded or unrecorded.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. During installation, the SmartEvo™ ITS will be configured to support free calls based on the preferences of the County. For identification and investigative purposes, Smart Communications recommends that an inmate be required to enter his/her inmate PIN to place a free call. All free calls will be recorded in the same manner as billable call types. The SmartEvo™ ITS can be configured to disable call monitoring and recording on attorney phone numbers to preserve attorney/client privilege.

13. The ITS must have the capability to record and store all calls and inbound voicemail messages for a minimum of 180 days.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. All call detail records, recordings and account information will be stored online and available to authorized users through the web-based SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard for at least 90 days or the retention period defined by the County.

14. For security and fraud protection, the ITS must include patented software capable of detecting and prohibiting three-way calls that meets the following minimum requirements:

- a. Requires no additional software to function;
- b. Adapts dynamically to each phone call based on complete end-to-end network conditions, geographic regions, specific dialed numbers and exchanges;
- c. Initially analyzes existing line conditions to use as a baseline for the remainder of the call;
- d. Utilize full digital signal processing on each port;
- e. Utilize 18 tunable soft parameters to optimize detection performance;

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- f. Allow authorized facility staff to select one of the following actions to be performed upon detection of a 3-way call:**
- i. Disconnect call;**
 - ii. Play a single warning prompt or at random intervals during the call;**
 - iii. Take no action;**
- g. Allow authorized facility staff to enable or disable detection to allow for allowable called parties (lawyers, public defenders, etc...) to perform a 3-way call.;**
- h. Record and store detection details within the Call Detail Record (CDR).**

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications' patented 3-Way Call Detection System is a highly-effective fraud deterrent. The system is integrated in the SmartEvo™ ITS without requiring additional hardware or software. Our 3-Way Call Detection System is unique in its ability to dynamically adapt to each phone call based on the complete end-to-end network conditions. This is a substantial improvement over traditional simple threshold silence detection techniques.

Highly Accurate 3-Way Call Detection:

The patented detection algorithms are completely developed and maintained by in-house digital signal processing engineers. As 3-way calling does not utilize a dedicated network signaling protocol, any detection system is forced to make the decision to act based on the information which can be observed on the live call. The algorithms in the SmartEvo™ ITS are tuned to perform to the level of aggressiveness desired to provide a good balance between detecting true 3-way calls versus false-detecting other call activities.

A common problem with all 3-Way Call Detection Systems, especially simple silence detection system, is falsely identifying legitimate calls as 3-way attempts due to common occurrences, such as placing a phone down on the table or covering the mouthpiece. Smart Communications' 3-Way Detection algorithm is specifically designed to avoid these problems by dynamically adapting at the start of each call, and during the ongoing call, by analyzing the characteristics of the telephone circuit in use. By adapting on the fly, our system can learn the difference between a true "on-hold" event versus a simple quiet conversation period. Our system can further adapt its performance based on geographic destinations or even specific called numbers and exchanges.

Operation:

The 3-Way Call Detection feature initially analyzes the existing line conditions to use as a baseline for the remainder of the call. The system then monitors the call for conditions that indicate the called party activated a 3-way call or placed the call on hold. When a possible 3-way call attempt has been detected, the system performs the action as programmed by the administrator and a record of the event is stored in the call detail record. After the call is complete, the 3-Way Call Detection System resets and waits for the next call to begin.

Fully Digital Signal Processing (DSP):

The SmartEvo™ ITS uses an all-digital processing system to analyze the characteristics and performance of each telephone call. Each port in the system provides a dedicated Digital Signal Processing (DSP) resource.

Dynamic Calibration, Remote Configuration and Adjustment:

At the start of each call, the system adapts the 3-way call process parameters based on the actual line and call conditions. Internally, the system has over 18 soft parameters that provide a fine level of precision to the call detection system. Most installations can use the factory settings, which are the result of extensive field trials and analysis. If necessary, these the parameters can be remotely adjusted to obtain optimum system performance.

Multiple Detection Options:

Upon detection of a 3-way call attempt, the system performs the action as programmed by the administrator:

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- Disconnect the call
- Play a single prompt or begin playing a prompt at random intervals during the call
- Take no external action

Enable or Disable Detection:

Each call processed by the SmartEvo™ ITS can be classified and tagged to enable or disable 3-way call detection. This feature makes it possible to disable 3-way detection for calls to valid individuals, such as lawyers or public defenders, and enable it for calls to other numbers.

Record and Store Detection Details for Each Call:

The SmartEvo™ ITS creates a Call Detail Record (CDR) for each call. This record includes a field that indicates detection of a 3-way call attempt. Authorized users can retrieve information about 3-way call attempts through the call detail reporting feature.

15. The ITS must include voice prompts in English and Spanish. Please identify other language capabilities of the system.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartEvo™ ITS offers clear and concise voice prompts in English and Spanish. English is the default and inmates can select the desired language via prompts. Voice prompts are given in short sentences with meaningful operating instructions. The propriety voice engine of the SmartEvo™ ITS provides the ability for prompts to be spoken in up to 99 different languages, including but not limited to:

Languages in addition to English and Spanish may be added at any time at **no cost** to the County.

16. The ITS must have a prompt that identifies to the receiver that the call is from the Jefferson County Correctional Facility to include the inmate's name as previously recorded by the inmate. The prompt must alert both the inmate and called party that the call may be monitored or recorded except for privileged professional/attorney calls.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. During the call setup process, the SmartEvo™ ITS plays a pre-recorded announcement to the inmate and called party that can be customized to suit the specific needs of the County. An example pre-recorded announcement informing the called party of a collect call is as follows:

"You have a collect call from {prerecorded inmate name}, an inmate at the [Customer's Detention Center Name]. If you accept this call, any attempt to use 3-way or call waiting will automatically disconnect the call. This call is also subject to being recorded or monitored, except for privileged communications between attorney and client. The cost for this call will be {x} cents for the first minute and {x} cents for each additional minute."

Smart Communications' Network Operations Center (NOC) will work with the County to make changes to the prerecorded announcement messages, including adjusting the duration of the call or excluding the pre-recorded announcements from the cost of a call.

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17. The ITS must provide positive acceptance by the called party.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartEvo™ ITS will not allow communication with the called party until the call has been actively/positively accepted. Called parties must physically press “1” on their telephone keypad to confirm acceptance of a call before any communication with an inmate can take place.

18. The ITS must not allow inmate to listen to the status of the call in-progress for the acceptance and or denial by called party and must not allow inmate to communicate with the called party until the call has been accepted.

RESPONSE: Confirmed.

19. The ITS must notify both the caller and the called party of call termination by voice prompting at 1 minute and again at 15 seconds prior to the end of the call's pre-programmed time limit.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartEvo™ ITS will play a notification message to both the inmate and called party one-minute prior to the call duration time limit being reached. When the call duration time limit is reached, the call will automatically be terminated. The time at which notification messages are played during a call and the call duration time limit can be adjusted at any time via the secure, web-based SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard.

20. The ITS must give Jefferson County the capability of taking an individual telephone, all telephones within a housing area, or the entire system out of service in less than 30 seconds.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartEvo™ ITS can be manually turned on/off (shut down) in real time by authorized staff via the web-based SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard or by manual switches installed at County-designated locations. Manual on/off controls can be configured by individual telephone, telephone group or the entire telephone system.

21. The Proposer must have a toll-free Customer Service number for the handling of questions, requests and complaints from the called party. The Proposer's Customer Service agents must be employed/located within the United States.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Friends and family of inmates who need assistance with the services we provide can contact our Customer Care Center 24/7/365 by calling our toll-free line at 888-843-1972. All calls are answered by a live, U.S.-based representative.

22. The ITS must have the capability to allow for local and long- distance free calls, limited to no less than 5 minutes in duration, from inmate phones located in Booking areas. These calls must also be recorded and maintained on the server for no less than 180 days.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. During installation, the SmartEvo™ ITS will be configured to support free calls based on the preferences of the County. All free calls will be recorded in the same manner as billable call types. For identification and investigative purposes, Smart Communications recommends that an inmate be required to enter his/her inmate PIN to place a free call.

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23. The Proposer must provide, at no cost to the Jefferson County, an interface between the ITS and the Jefferson County's Jail Management System (JMS), to support:

- a. Automatic activation and deactivation of inmate PIN numbers; as inmates are booked and released from custody.
- b. Determination of inmate's housing location within the facility.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard provides a flexible suite to facilitate interfacing with third party systems such as JMS, OMS and inmate trust applications. The system can be interfaced at multiple points in your daily workflow and allow automatic updates of the following:

- Automatic PIN account creation during the booking process
- PIN Enable and Disable for release to court or other temporary inmate transfers
- Automatic housing relocation tracking
- Instant PIN account deposits and credits

24. The ITS must be able to restrict calls made by an inmate when the call is not being placed from a phone located within the inmate's current housing location.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Authorized users can set restrictions for PIN location assignments in the SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard.

25. The ITS must have the capability to allow authorized facility staff to save, download, or email calls to removable portable devices via USB ports or DVD drives.

RESPONSE: Call recordings are immediately accessible to authorized users online via the SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard. The SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard provides simple point and click access to download recordings and copy to alternative media for portable storage such as CD/DVD/USB storage device, etc. System users may download one or a group of recordings and retain all pertinent call detail information with the recordings for ease of use at alternate locations. By using the Investigate platform, County staff no longer need to download and burn call recordings or other information such as images of tattoos to CD-Rs. Once published to a case in the SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard, this information can easily be shared with external users. The Investigate platform allows the County to choose what types of assets each user can access and download.

Recordings are downloadable in a compressed .mp3 format or SmartEvo™ ITS proprietary file format. If recording integrity must be proven, the recording can be saved in the proprietary file format. This file format can be played using a SmartEvo™ ITS file player. A digital signature in the file ensures that the file data has not been altered after it has been retrieved from the system.

26. The ITS must have the capability to allow users to make electronic notes on each call.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard allows authorized facility users to tag locations within recordings and add corresponding notes for future reference. All tags, notes and CDRs are saved with the call recording if the record is downloaded.

29. The ITS must provide an Inmate Crime Tip Line, a no-charge, speed-dial number that connects to a recorded message system that can be used by inmates to anonymously report criminal activity within the facility or to provide information related to criminal investigations.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartEvo™ ITS can be configured to allow access to specified speed dials for services such as PREA, Crime Tips (covert communications), requests (general, medical and grievances), Public Defenders and more. Calls can be routed to the internal, secure SmartEvo™ ITS Voicemail Exchange (VMX™) or to approved, designated external numbers. Smart Communications will configure such numbers/voicemails during installation at **no cost** to the County. Administrators can also utilize this feature to communicate important messages to a single inmate, specific group of inmates or all inmates simultaneously.

30. The Proposer must pay Jefferson County a monthly ITS commission on all call types. Monthly commissions are to be paid no later than the last day of the month following the month in which the commissions were earned. If the commission check fails to reach the County by the above specified date, the awarded vendor will pay the County the going interest rate each month for delinquent commissions owed the County. Commissions are to be paid by three (3) separate checks, one for each of the three locations.

RESPONSE: Acknowledged and agreed.

31. The ITS Commission rate shall be based on gross revenue to be defined as revenue on all call types from inmate non-coin phones.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Unlike other ITS providers, Smart Communications pays commission based on “true” ITS Gross Call Revenue, including interstate. This means every revenue-generating call from inmates would be commissioned. There are no deductions, withholdings or “creative accounting” practices employed that reduce County commission revenue.

C.2. Specifications/Scope of Work – Inmate Video Visitation System (VVS):

1. To meet the unique safety and security of needs of Jefferson County, Proposer’s VVS software must be specifically designed for use in a correctional environment and solely owned by the Proposer. Video meeting/conference software such as Skype, Google Meet or Zoom will not be accepted.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications is a true technology company driven by a passion for innovation. For over a decade we have been delivering technologies and services that improve communications, enhance

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safety and streamline facility operations. All Smart Communications' operating system and application software is custom designed and purpose-built for exclusive use within a corrections environment.

Wholly developed and owned by Smart Communications, our SmartVisit™ VVS was introduced in 2015 and remains the most intelligent video visitation platform in corrections. SmartVisit™ utilizes industry-exclusive facial detection software and a robust web-based scheduling application to streamline and automate the visitation process and provide a true "self-service" video visitation experience with zero staff involvement.

2. To streamline facility operations and reduce facility staff burden, Proposer's VVS and all other required Inmate Technology Services must be administered by a single, web-based administrative platform as identified within the "A. Scope of Work Overview" section of this RFP.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications' systems are managed through our secure, password protected, web-based SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard. The SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard can be accessed by authorized County personnel from a single or multiple dedicated monitoring terminals or through a secured internet connection from a desktop, laptop or remote means.

3. To maximize inmate access to VVS services, the Proposer's proprietary VVS must function on both inmate kiosks and tablet devices. Inmate kiosks and tablet devices must be correctional-grade and provided, installed, supported and maintained by the Proposer at no cost to the Jefferson County. A VVS that requires Jefferson County be held financially responsible for any aspect of the inmate kiosk and/or tablet provided whatsoever will not be accepted.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications will provide detention grade SmartKiosk™ and/or SmartTablet™ devices for inmate access to the proposed systems at *no cost* to the County. Our SmartKiosk™ and SmartTablet™ devices are engineered to withstand inmate abuse and meet the unique safety and security requirements of correctional facilities, and are compatible with our SmartVisit™ VVS.

Each SmartKiosk™ device connects via Cat5e or Cat6 Ethernet cable to a dedicated port on an Ethernet switch that is connected to a dedicated Local Area Network (LAN). available, allowing inmates to hack and gain access to the Internet. The SmartTablet™ device's 7.0" touch screen LCD display is constructed of 3X thick Gorilla Glass and pass durability/drop, chemical stain and other quality control tests at our production facility.

Our SmartTablet™ devices are delivered with customized, FCC compliant charging stations featuring contact charge technology. This technology is far superior to magnetic induction charging systems offered by other vendors, which can be used by inmates to charge contraband cell phones. As there are no exposed charging ports, cables or clunky charging carts to manage, our charging stations offer a self-service system by allowing inmates to check-out, check-in and charge SmartTablet™ devices with zero staff involvement. Each station charges up to ten SmartTablet™ devices simultaneously.



4. To ensure optimal performance, Proposer must serve as the prime contractor and will be solely responsible for the delivery, operation and maintenance of the VVS throughout contract term. A VVS provided by a subcontractor, third party or affiliate vendor will not be accepted.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications is the single source provider with end-to-end responsibility, including hardware, software, installation, licensing, maintenance and training. 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b. Incorporate automated scheduling and calendar modules that:

- i. Provide a list of inmates eligible/available to participate in a video visitation session.
- ii. Automatically send a text message or email notification to public and professional users when a scheduled video visitation system has been cancelled.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Public users can search for an inmate and send a "connection request" using the inmate locator on SmartInmate.com. After an inmate approves the "connection request," they are considered "connected" and the individual is now allowed to schedule video visitation sessions with the inmate. 



ii. Attorney Messaging:

1. Inmate messaging application must include specialized Attorney Messaging feature to allow vetted attorneys to send confidential legal documents and exchange messages with inmates electronically. Proposer must provide 3 agency references where this technology has been in place for over 2 years.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The specialized attorney messaging feature of the SmartInmate™ Electronic Messaging system allows vetted attorneys to send legal documents and exchange an unlimited number of messages with inmates electronically at *no cost*. To ensure confidentiality, the content of all attorney related messages and files are stored in a separate highly secured, encrypted environment inaccessible to facility staff.

During their incarceration, inmates are provided with unlimited free access to all SmartInmate™ correspondence, including photographs and legal documents. After release, inmates can access and download this information for up to 12 months by using their inmate ID and password to log in to our secure, public website at www.smartinmate.com free of charge.

2. Additional security measures are taken to ensure the privacy of attorney messages and digital legal documents and files. These measures must include:

a. Information and correspondence must be exchanged and stored in an encrypted environment that is completely inaccessible to facility staff.

RESPONSE: Confirmed.

b. To retrieve/view legal documents and exchange secure messages with their attorney, an inmate must first log in to a tablet or kiosk device by entering their facility assigned PIN and then enter their secondary private password to access the encrypted environment.

RESPONSE: Confirmed.

d. Law Library Application:


- i. Must be provided to facility at no cost.
- ii. Inmate access/use must be provided at no cost.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartKiosk™ and SmartTablet™ devices can be configured to provide inmates with self-service access to a digital Law Library at no cost to the County or inmates. This value-added benefit reduces staff burden by eliminating the need to escort inmates through the facility to access legal resources. The Law Library is kept current with real-time updates, meeting the legal needs of inmates; it provides access to Federal and State statutes and case law, a legal dictionary, a practice manual and other legal aides to assist with research pertinent to their case. The time inmates spend accessing the Law Library is logged and retained in our system to create an audit trail, providing proof of access to help reduce and counter legal disputes.

e. Education and Reentry Programs:

i. Inmate access/use must be provided at no cost.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications will provision unlimited access to our SmartEd™ and SmartReentry™ tablet-based inmate education platforms at **no cost** to inmates or the County. SmartEd™ is composed of 20,000 instructional videos and 7,000 practices exercises relating to core educational subjects. SmartReentry™ includes Beyond Prison, Probation and Parole (BPPP), a 10-part interactive reentry video series that helps change the way incarcerated individuals view their path to rehabilitation. The series features inspiring stories and advice from formerly-incarcerated men and women who have overcome the challenges, obstacles and fears associated with transitioning from prison back to society, family and community. This video series empowers instructors and support groups to help participants make the most out of the powerful, inspiring and motivational messages/strategies in each BPPP video.



Smart Communications' SmartEd™ is a highly customizable and expandable platform that can be configured to support more advanced educational, reentry, life skills, self-improvement and recovery courses such as: iPathways, North American Learning Institute (NALI), American Community Corrections Institute (ACCI), Vant4age and the Breaking Free Group.

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

f. Request and Grievances:

- i. **Must be provided to facility at no cost.**
- ii. **Inmate access/use must be provided at no cost.**

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartTablet™ devices include Smart Communications' SmartRequest™, the world's first digital inmate request/grievance/medical form platform in corrections. SmartRequest™ is the most user-friendly, most customizable and detailed electronic form submission platform available. SmartRequest™ automates the inmate form process and helps eliminate paperwork.



Electronic forms are centrally tracked and managed, putting an end to shuffling paper forms around the facility, saving time. Requests are responded to electronically, allowing inmates to get answers quickly; the system can provide automated standard responses and status updates to all involved. The workflow in SmartRequest™ is custom-tailored to County policies and is easy to customize without vendor assistance. Limitations, timers, forwarding, notes, reassignment, escalating, appeals, Jail Management System (JMS) integration, automated reporting (including keyword tracking) and more are all standard features provided at **no cost** to the County or inmates.

g. Entertainment:

- i. **Must offer a wide variety of media choices including movies and many tv series, Internet radio stations and video games.**
- ii. **Provide inmates with free access to eBooks.**
- iii. **To limit excessive charges and various issues/liabilities associated with ownership and transference of media upon the individual's release from custody, media must:**
 - a. **Be offered exclusively in a streaming format that is not capable of being stored within the tablet's internal memory. Entertainment/media options that are download or subscription based will not be accepted.**
 - b. **Be streamed at a low flat fixed rate per minute.**
 - c. **Provide inmates with free access to eBooks.**
- iv. **Must provide authorized facility staff with complete control over what media/content is available to inmates.**

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartTablet™ devices include our SmartEntertainment™ platform. This platform contains a virtually endless supply of streaming media choices that are regularly updated with new content. Inmates can stream the latest music, tv series, movies, self-help and educational videos, news and entertainment websites, play video games, read books and much more. Inmates are provided with free access to basic SmartEntertainment™ content and premium content can be streamed at a flat rate as low as \$0.01/minute.



Our SmartEntertainment™ Streaming Media application provides inmates with **free access** to over 1,000 popular classical eBook titles from the Project Gutenberg Library on the SmartTablet™ devices. This library provides access to the world's greatest literature, including such titles as "Pride and Prejudice," "The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes," "War and Peace," "The Call of the Wild," and more.



In comparison to the traditional "pay to download" pricing model employed by other vendors, the SmartEntertainment™ "pay to stream" model provides many advantages for both inmates and the facility. For

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example, with the “pay to download” pricing model, an inmate can pay up to \$20.00 to download a single hour-long movie. With our “pay to stream” model, an inmate could watch the same movie for only \$0.60 and use their remaining funds to stream an additional 32-hours of other content. Another commonly overlooked issue with the “pay to download” model is when inmates pay to download media files, they expect to have access to the files indefinitely – which makes it extremely difficult for a facility to easily switch to a different tablet provider at any point in the future. To avoid inmate complaints and even legal actions, the facility must transfer the media files inmates had paid to download to the new tablets. If it is not feasible or possible to transfer the media files, the facility may be responsible for having to financially compensate inmates for their loss. With the SmartEntertainment™ platform’s “pay to stream” model, a facility isn’t exposed to these problems or risks.

Authorized staff are provided with total control as to what content/applications are accessible to inmates via the web-based SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard. Access restrictions can be imposed on a specific inmate or group for any amount of time. The device and application access restriction can be configured to end automatically on a specified date/time or be removed manually.

h. Documents Viewer Application (Inmate Handbooks, Reentry manuals, etc.)

i. Inmate access/use must be provided at no cost.

RESPONSE: Smart Communications will digitize compliance training materials such as the inmate handbook and PREA policy and make them continuously available on the SmartTablet™ devices provided. This service will be provided at **no cost** to the County. Inmate access to SmartTablet™ devices requires a login controlled via Smart Communications’ SmartRequest™ Digital Request/Grievance/Medical Form platform. SmartRequest™ can be configured to require an inmate to verify their understanding of the inmate handbook and PREA policy to successfully log in and use a SmartTablet™ device.

Additionally, authorized users have the ability to upload ad hoc PDF documents at any time via the SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard without the need to submit a request through Smart Communications.

Authorized users navigate to the "Documents" section to upload PDF files, and as required, they can opt to:

- Set a specific date range to display documents
- Target documents to the entire facility or to specific housing areas
- Specify acknowledgement is required

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i. Video Player Application (Facility Introduction, PREA, etc...)

i. Inmate access/use must be provided at no cost.

RESPONSE: Confirmed.

2. To streamline facility operations and reduce facility staff burden, Proposer’s Inmate Tablet Program and all other required Inmate Technology Services must be administered by a single, web-based administrative platform as identified within the “A. Scope of Work Overview” section of this RFP.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications’ systems are managed through our secure, password protected, web-based SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard. The SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard can be accessed by authorized County personnel from a single or multiple dedicated monitoring terminals or through a secured internet connection from a desktop, laptop or remote means.

3. To meet unique safety and security needs, Proposer’s tablets must be specifically engineered/manufactured for use within a correctional facility. Commercial Off-the-Shelf (COTS) tablets (i.e. Samsung, Levново, Kindle, etc...) are not acceptable.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications’ custom, wireless and ruggedized SmartTablet™ devices are correctional-grade, designed to withstand inmate abuse and meet the unique safety and network security requirements of correctional facilities. Every aspect of our SmartTablet™, including the device’s body, battery, camera and wireless charging stations, is engineered from the ground up in partnership with our private manufacturer. This makes the SmartTablet™ different from our competitor’s tablets that are nothing more than an off-the-shelf, consumer grade tablet housed in a rugged case. SmartTablet™ devices run on our custom, proprietary operating system that will only allow the device to connect to our secure network and run pre-approved applications, making them hack-proof. Consumer grade tablets (i.e., Samsung) run on non-proprietary operating systems with hacking code publicly available, allowing inmates to gain access to the Internet.

SmartTablet™ devices are programmed at the operating system level to only connect to our secure networks and will never connect to open networks or other secure networks that may be present. The wireless network feeds back to a central router and firewall which provides for network services (DHCP, DNS, NTP, etc.) as well as a deny-by-default ruleset which denies all outgoing traffic by default. Network access is only opened on specific ports and remote IP addresses as needed to support our services; all other network access would be denied.

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4. Consumer based tablets with an attached correctional designed case will not be accepted. Tablet body and case must be integrated as one with the tablet. Proposer must specify the make and model of proposed tablet accompanied with pictures.

RESPONSE: The proposed SmartTablet™ (model #SC-7-TAB) to be provided was designed specifically by Smart Communications for the corrections environment. It is not a repurposed commercial brand tablet housed in a rugged case that is prone to breakage or tampering. The entire design of the SmartTablet™ device was built for inmate use, from the Gorilla® Glass screen, to the wireless, cable-free charging system, to the custom-molded tablet body with reinforcements built inside the device to withstand extreme impacts.



5. To provide the best level support and service, Proposer must be original provider of the inmate tablet device and solely own all proprietary rights to the tablet system. Tablets provided by a subcontractor, third party or affiliated company will not be accepted.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. As detailed in our response to item #3 above, Smart Communications is the OEM provider of SmartTablet™ devices and solely owns all proprietary rights.

6. To verify durability, Proposer must provide independent tablet durability and drop-test reports.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications' proposed SmartTablet™ devices are subjected to and must pass durability/drop, chemical stain and other quality control tests at our production facility. For additional details, please refer to "*Exhibit B: Confidential SmartTablet™ Independent Laboratory Durability Testing Reports.*"

7. To provide inmates with equal access to tablet devices, Proposer must utilize a shared tablet distribution models in which tablet devices are provided to inmates at no cost. Inmate Tablet Programs where inmates must purchase, lease or rent a tablet device will not be accepted.

- a. Proposer must state specific minimum inmate to tablet ratio to be provided.
- b. Proposer must confirm that additional tablet devices will be provided at no cost if inmate tablet usage exceeds 50% of available time in any housing unit.
- c. Proposer must provide the facility with a pool of spare tablet devices to allow for a damaged or inoperable device to be immediately replaced at no cost.

RESPONSE: Smart Communications knows many vendors offer tablet distribution models in which inmates are required to purchase, lease or rent their devices. These models drive up vendor profits at the expense of inmates, and their friends and families. These models also prevent inmates with less fortunate economic situations from accessing the several rehabilitative services and benefits tablets provide.

To ensure all inmates are provided with fair and equal access to tablets, Smart Communications utilizes a free shared tablet distribution model that has proven to be a success. With our distribution model, Smart Communications provides our partner facilities with SmartTablet™ devices at a predetermined tablet-to-inmate ratio at *no cost*. This ratio is determined by RFP requirements and/or historical inmate tablet device usage data.

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If a facility is implementing a tablet program for the first time, Smart Communications typically provides SmartTablet™ devices on 1:5 ratio to establish a usage baseline.

After installation and throughout deployment, Smart Communications' Network Operations Center (NOC) continuously monitors inmate tablet device/network usage. Our goal is for the shared tablets to be available on average at least 60% of the time. If inmate tablet usage in any housing unit exceeds 40%, Smart Communications will provide additional tablets sufficient to bring usage time below 40%, which in turn increases the tablet-to-inmate ratio. Smart Communications will honor a 1:1 tablet-to-inmate device ratio should usage warrant it.

Smart Communications will also provide the facility with a pool of spare SmartTablet™ devices to allow for a damaged or inoperable device to be immediately replaced. We also provide pre-printed shipping labels and boxes to return damaged/inoperable devices. Upon receipt, Smart Communications will send a replacement to replenish the spare device pool. 8. Proposer's Inmate Tablet Program must meet the following technical requirements:

a. Inmate tablet devices must be Wi-Fi enabled.


RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications' correctional grade SmartTablet™ devices are Wi-Fi enabled.

b. Inmate tablet devices must be capable of being updated wirelessly in real time. All tablet device software updates must be provided at no cost.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. All software enhancements and patches for all Smart Communications' components are developed and tested by our in-house software engineering and quality assurance teams. Dedicated and authorized service personnel are permitted remote access to the servers and video endpoints through firewall permissions which only permit access from our corporate network. Software updates are applied and tested. Each update has processes in place to back out and restore a previous version, if necessary. SmartTablet™ devices can be updated over the air (OTA) under the control of our management system. SmartTablet™ device updates are systematically managed and metered which prevents too many devices being updated simultaneously, ensuring devices are always available for use during an update cycle. All software is version-controlled and devices report currently running versions back to a central management system.

c. Inmate Tablet devices must be capable of being charged by a custom, FCC approved, wall mountable charging station that can charge/store a minimum of 10 tablets simultaneously.

RESPONSE: Smart Communications' SmartTablet™ devices are delivered with customized, FCC compliant charging stations featuring contact charge technology. This technology is far superior to magnetic induction charging systems offered by other vendors, which can be used by inmates to charge contraband cell phones. As there are no exposed charging ports, cables or clunky charging carts to manage, our charging stations offer a self-service system, allowing inmates to check-out, check-in and charge SmartTablet™ devices with zero staff involvement. Each station charges up to ten SmartTablet™ devices simultaneously.



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i. To allow for self-service and prevent charging of unauthorized electronic devices such as cell phones, tablet charging stations must utilize metal to metal contact pins. Tablet charging stations that utilize magnetic induction or cords/cables will not be accepted.

RESPONSE: Acknowledged and agreed.

d. Inmate Tablet devices must be equipped with an internal speaker as well as equipped with a 3.5mm jack to allow for the connection to a facility approved headphone/headset.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartTablet™ has an internal speaker and a microphone on the front of the device. The SmartTablet™ is also equipped with a 3.5mm jack for connecting to County-approved headphones or headsets.

e. For accountability purposes, Inmate Tablet devices must:

i. Require an inmate to enter credentials and log in to the tablet before being able to access any application.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Inmate access to SmartTablet™ devices will require a log in before accessing any services.

ii. Display terms and conditions to users the first time they login or for subsequent changes to the terms and conditions.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. The SmartTablet™ devices can also be configured to display terms and conditions or require acknowledgement of facility notices before the inmate can log in and use the device. These notices can be displayed the first time the inmate logs in and any time the notices have been updated.

iii. Provide capability of restricting inmate usage to the specific housing units to which the inmate is assigned.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Authorized users can set restrictions for PIN location assignments in the SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard.

9. Inmate Tablet Program must meet the following security requirements:

a. Provide the following security measures to harden the firmware on the tablets:

- i. No option for inmates to change the settings;**
- ii. All NFC, Bluetooth and Cellular wireless radio has been disabled, except for Wi-Fi;**
- iii. Disable inmate's ability to install and/or un-install apps;**
- iv. Push authorized apps to the tablet devices through an app state management process;**
- v. Provide no access to third-party app stores**

RESPONSE: Smart Communications' SmartTablet™ device operating system and application software are custom designed and purpose-built for exclusive use within a corrections environment. All operating system configurations, customizations and modifications are performed in-house by our engineering team. The following firmware hardening measures are employed to maximize device security and control:

- Customized version of Android OS version 6 does not feature the browser, contacts, native phone or messaging clients found on consumer-grade tablets
- Inmates have no access to any settings
- Cellular wireless radio is disabled at the system operating level
- Custom bootloader is locked down to prevent unauthorized program installation
- Authorized apps and system updates are pushed over the air (OTA) under the control of our secure management system

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- Inmates have no access to third-party app stores


Our SmartTablet™ devices are equipped with our proprietary operating system that will only allow the devices to connect to our dedicated and secure wireless network within the facility. Smart Communications utilizes the latest and best network security practices to prevent unauthorized access by individuals, applications and devices. Each access point is configured with an SSID and security key, and uses WPA-PSK encryption to secure access to the network and encrypt traffic while it is in the air. Our network security measures also include firewalls for local DHCP service and DNS resolution as advanced Local Area Network (LAN), Wide Area Network (WAN) and Floating Rulesets.

b. To ensure inmates cannot access the Internet, Proposer’s Inmate Tablet devices must feature a custom, proprietary operating system that will only allow the device to connect to a secure network.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. All Smart Communications' operating system and application software is custom designed and purpose-built for exclusive use within a corrections environment. Our SmartTablet™ and SmartKiosk™ devices are equipped with our custom operating systems that will only allow the devices to connect to our secure network within the facility and run pre-approved applications. Authorized staff are provided with total control as to which applications are accessible to inmates on a SmartTablet™ or SmartKiosk™ device.

c. Tablet device wireless network traffic must be routed through the Proposer’s network system with no exception and provide firewall, transparent proxy, DHCP, DNS and routing services for the tablets.

RESPONSE: Proposed SmartTablet™ Device diagram.



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d. Proposer must furnish a recent independent report from a certified vendor of network and program security that notes no vulnerabilities were found.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Please refer to *“Exhibit C: Confidential ASV Network Scan Report”* prepared by Clone Systems, Inc. on July 14, 2022.

e. Proposer must provide secure Internet Protocol communications by authenticating and encrypting each IP packet of a communication session.

RESPONSE: Confirmed.

10. Proposer’s inmate tablet must interface with JMS and other systems as applicable. All interface services must be provided at no cost.

RESPONSE: Smart Communications’ Engineering group will work with the County’s JMS and Commissary providers to determine the best way to interface with the proposed systems. They will ensure the systems are interfaced appropriately and provide any customization required to support the project at *no cost*.

Smart Communications has successfully interfaced our systems with JMS and Commissary providers throughout the USA. Smart Communications’ platforms provide one of the most flexible suites to facilitate interfacing with third party systems. Our established process links applications within multiple organizations together to simplify and automate the process to the greatest extent possible while avoiding changes to the existing applications or data structures.

D. Network Infrastructure Security:

The Proposer will provide information to explain their process of protecting the underlying networking infrastructure by installing preventative measures to deny unauthorized access, modification, deletion, and theft of resources and data.

RESPONSE: Confirmed. Smart Communications employs a multi-pronged approach to ensure proper security protocol is observed to protect data integrity:

- **Data encryption** – systems data is encrypted and backed-up on redundant Storage Area Networks (SAN) located in our data centers in Philadelphia, PA, Tampa, FL and Vancouver, WA. Access to the system is further protected with a firewall and firewall rules to block unauthorized access attempts.
- **Deny-by-Default policy on all traffic** – nothing can traverse the network unless specifically allowed and enabled.
- **Tiered-role privileges** – our secure, web-based SmartEcosystem™ Dashboard allows the addition/removal of users and the assignment of different user security levels. Each function in the system can be assigned to a specific permission level or specific user for different levels of security clearance.
- **Audit logs** – all user activity, such as page views and database modifications, are logged in detail.
- **Vendor access** – Smart Communications limits access to the system and servers and only provides access to staff who must have access to provide the proposed services.
- **End user security** – to utilize a device, an inmate must log in by entering their PIN. Family and friends of inmates must also log in to their SmartInmate.com account to utilize the communication services.



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To minimize Jefferson County liability risk, Proposer must provide a detailed list of any/all security breaches that any of their proposed systems (ITS, VVS, EMS, DPMS, etc...) has been subject to. Details must include incident data, description of type and amount of data compromised and settlements and/or litigation that resulted from the breach.

RESPONSE: Not applicable. As a responsible correctional technology provider, Smart Communications routinely employs independent third-party technology firms to conduct extensive security/vulnerability assessments of our networks. These assessments are necessary to keep our partner's facility staff and inmate information safe and out of the hands of nefarious hackers. Additionally, Proposer must furnish a recent independent report from a certified vendor of network and program security that notes no vulnerabilities were found.

E. Maintenance, Service and Support:

All costs for maintenance, support, repair of all software and equipment, and internal background investigations for Proposer's employees, will be borne by the successful Proposer and will not be deducted from any commissions.

RESPONSE: Acknowledged and agreed.

During the term of any contract awarded from this RFP, the successful proposer agrees to provide maintenance, diagnose problems, determine proper solutions, and provide the following:

- 1. Implement any required solutions, changes, modifications, updates, or other services that are necessary to allow the software, hardware and any other telephone equipment to perform in accordance with the specifications as set forth in the RFP;**
- 2. Upgrade the software and/or hardware to its required performance standards as required in the RFP;**
- 3. Respond to telephone requests for maintenance within two (2) hours after the initial notification;**
- 4. Provide a system administrative technician on an as needed basis at no cost to Jefferson County.**

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F. Training Requirements:

The Proposer must provide end-user training for the Comprehensive Inmate Technology Services Package proposed. End-user training is to be provided on-site and at no cost to Jefferson County. Proposer must provide a high-level overview describing the end-user training program to be provided.

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Project Management and Implementation Strategy |

Smart Communications has extensive experience installing and maintaining inmate communication systems throughout the country. We have developed standard installation, cut-over and turn-up procedures that minimize disruptions and allow the new systems to come online quickly with minimal facility staff involvement.

We utilize a five-phase approach to project planning and implementation that is recognized by the Project Management Institute (PMI). Under this approach, projects are managed and implemented in five distinct phases: 1) Initiation, 2) Planning, 3) Execution, 4) Monitor and Control and 5) Project Close.

By coupling this phased approach to project management/implementation with our experience, Smart Communications anticipates all proposed systems will be installed and fully operational within 55 days of contract execution.

The primary purpose of this call is to schedule an on-site pre-installation survey and project planning meeting, and to obtain the names and point of contact details for the primary project stakeholders, including IT department manager, facility escorts, materials receiver and any other project liaisons, as well as request facility floorplans and site access/security/background check forms.

The Initiation phase concludes after the on-site site survey and project planning meeting has been scheduled and the County’s record in our internal project management system is updated with all relevant information discussed and obtained during this phase.

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Planning (2.0): During the planning phase, an on-site pre-installation site survey will be conducted by Smart Communications' project manager and installation team staff who thoroughly examine and inspect the facility's architecture, existing inmate communication systems infrastructure and jail system interfaces.

The project manager records various pieces of critical information to allow for a formal project/implementation plan schedule to be drafted and presented to the County for approval. The formal project plan will contain detailed information, including but not limited to:

The formal project plan will be submitted to the County's project lead five days after the pre-installation site survey has been completed.

Network broadband circuit delivery is subject to long delivery lead times. To expedite this process, the Network Operations Center (NOC) orders these circuits and services from Internet Service Provider(s) that will be used to support the systems to be installed immediately after the pre-installation site-survey.

Shortly after the pre-installation site survey has been conducted and the formal project plan has been submitted, the on-site project planning meeting with the County's designated staff will take place. During this meeting, unique facility needs will be discussed, stakeholder questions and concerns are addressed and the formal project plan/implementation plan schedule is reviewed and approved.

The Planning phase concludes with the scheduling of on-site installation and training of facility staff.

Execution (3.0): This phase includes several tasks and subtasks involving:

- Requisition of hardware from inventory and preparation
- Design and development of JMS, Commissary and other applicable jail system interfaces
- Acquisition, conversion and loading of inmate data feeds
- Configuration of QA testing of provisioned service applications
- Post installation hardware/system application QA testing
- Shipping of hardware to site location

- QA testing of JMS, Commissary and other applicable jail system interfaces



allowed by law from the date it is due until paid.

6. **Damages.** Any damage to existing airport property, including but not limited to roads, pavement, fixtures, and road signs, as a result of lessee's business operation will be the responsibility of the lessee to correct.

7. **Taxes.** Lessee agrees to pay any taxes or special assessments that may be levied against the leased premises, or against the leasehold interest, or against the Airport because of this lease, by any taxing unit or entity, whether levied against Lessor or Lessee, and Lessee further agrees to hold Lessor harmless from any claims or liens in connection with any such tax or special assessment.

8. **Prohibited Uses.** The purpose of the lease is exclusively to provide ingress and egress of adjacent property.

9. **Utilities.** Lessee shall be responsible for any and all deposits, fees, and monthly charges from the utility providers, including but not limited to electricity, water, sewer, and telephone, for the use of all utilities. The Lessee shall furnish, at its sole cost and expense, utilities as required to the leased space.

10. **Lessee's Responsibilities.** Lessee shall, at its own expense and risk, maintain the premises and keep it free from waste and nuisance, and shall deliver up the premises in a clean and sanitary condition at the termination of this lease in good repair and condition, reasonable wear and tear and damage by fire, tornado or other casualty accepted. In the event Lessee should neglect to reasonably maintain the premises, Lessor shall have the right, but not the obligation, after written notice and a reasonable opportunity to correct the alleged condition, to cause repairs or corrections to be made, and any reasonable costs, shall be payable by Lessee to Lessor as additional rental on the next rental installment date.

The leased premises are a small part of an existing grazing pasture. Lessee will be required to erect and maintain fencing, prior to any construction, around, at a minimum, the interior sides of the leased premises, adequate to keep existing and future livestock within the existing grazing pasture.

11. **Alterations.** Lessee shall make no additions or alterations to the improvements of the leased premises without the written permission of the Airport Manager. Both parties recognize the leased premises is intended to have a driveway installed and said driveway does not require further notice.

12. **Condition and Surrender.** By execution of this lease agreement, Lessee acknowledges that it has inspected the leased premises, and accepts the same in an "as is" condition. Lessee shall, throughout the lease term, maintain the exclusive space as stated in Section 1 and keep it free from waste and nuisance, and shall deliver up the premises in a clean and sanitary condition at the termination of this lease in good repair and condition; reasonable wear and tear and damage by fire, tornado or other casualty excepted. In the event Lessee should neglect to reasonably maintain the exclusive space, Lessor shall have the right, but not the obligation, to cause repairs or corrections to be made, and any reasonable costs, therefore, shall be payable by Lessee to Lessor as additional rental on the next rental installment date.

13. **Hold Harmless Covenant.** Lessee covenants and agrees to hold Lessor free and harmless from loss from each and every claim and demand of whatever nature, made on behalf of or by any third person or

persons, for any wrongful act or omission on the part of Lessee, his agents, servants, officers, directors, and employees, and from all loss and damages to any third person or persons by reason of such acts or omissions.

Lessor shall stand indemnified by Lessee as herein provided. Lessee is and shall be deemed to be an independent contractor and operator responsible to all parties for its respective acts or omissions, and Lessor shall in no way be responsible therefor. In the use of the premises, in the erection of construction of any improvements thereon, and in the exercise or enjoyment of the privileges herein granted, Lessee shall indemnify and save harmless Lessor from any and all losses that may proximately result to any third person because of any negligence on the part of Lessee.

14. **Insurance.** The Lessee shall, at all times during the term of this lease, maintain insurance coverage with not less than the type and requirements shown below. Such insurance is to be provided at the sole cost of the Lessee. These requirements do not establish limits of the Lessee's liability. All policies of insurance shall waive all rights of subrogation against the Airport and Jefferson County, its officers, employees and agents and the Airport and Jefferson County shall be named "additional insured" on workers' compensation policy and liability coverage.

A. Prior to execution of this agreement, certified copies of original insurance policies shall be furnished to the Airport. The Airport reserves the right to require additional insurance should it deem necessary.

B. Lessee shall have and maintain complete and adequate Worker's Compensation Insurance (with waiver of subrogation to the Airport and Jefferson County), as required.

C. Lessee shall have and maintain complete and adequate Commercial General Liability insurance of One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) each occurrence; and in addition shall provide property damage liability insurance in a minimum sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00) for property damage growing out of any accident or other cause.

D. Lessee shall have and maintain complete and adequate Automobile Liability Insurance, with Combined Single Limit of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000.00), for any vehicles operated by Lessee on the airfield.

E. The amounts of minimum coverage herein specified may be modified from time to time in compliance with Jefferson County standard requirements and Lessee shall maintain the insurance with insurance underwriters authorized to do business in the State of Texas. Each policy or certificate shall contain a provision that written notice of cancellation or any material change in the policy by the insurer shall be delivered to Lessor, thirty (30) days in advance of the effective date thereof.

15. **Relationship of Parties.** This relationship between Lessor and Lessee is not a bailment and in no way is to be construed to be a bailment. Lessor shall not be liable for any acts or omissions of Lessee or an independent contractor. Nor shall the Lessor be liable for any loss of or damage to any personal property, fixtures, or equipment of Lessee installed or stored on the airport.

16. **Events of Default.** If Lessee shall allow the rent to be in arrears more than ten (10) days after written notice of such delinquency, or shall remain in default under any other condition of this lease for a period of ten (10) days after written notice from Lessor, or should any other person than Lessee secure possession of the premises or any part thereof, by reason of any receivership, bankruptcy proceedings, or other operation of law in any manner whatsoever, any such event shall be deemed to be an event of default by Lessee under this lease.

17. **Remedies.** Upon the occurrence of any event of default specified in Section 16 hereof, Lessor shall have the option to pursue any one or more of the following remedies without any notice or demand whatsoever:

- (a) Terminate this lease in which event Lessee shall immediately surrender the premises to Lessor, and if Lessee fails to do so, Lessor may, without prejudice to any other remedy which it may have for possession or arrearages in rent, enter upon and take possession and expel or remove Lessee and any other person who may be occupying said premises or any part thereof, by force if necessary, without being liable for prosecution or any claim of damages therefore; and Lessee agrees to pay to Lessor on demand the amount of all loss and damage which Lessor may suffer by reason of such termination.
- (b) Enter upon the premises by force if necessary, without being liable for prosecution or any claim for damages therefore, and do whatever Lessee is obligated to do under the terms of this lease; and Lessee agrees to reimburse Lessor on demand for any expenses which Lessor may incur in thus effecting compliance with Lessee's obligations under this lease, and Lessee further agrees that Lessor shall not be liable for any damages resulting to Lessee from such action.

No reentry or taking possession of the premises by Lessor shall be construed as an election on its part to terminate this lease, unless a written notice of such intention be given to Lessee. Notwithstanding any such re-letting or reentry or taking possession, Lessor may at any time thereafter elect to terminate this lease for a previous default. Pursuit of any of the foregoing remedies shall not preclude pursuit of any of the other remedies herein provided or any other remedies provided by law, nor shall pursuit of any remedy herein provided constitute a forfeiture or waiver of any rent due to Lessor hereunder or of damages occurring to Lessor by reason of the violation of any of the terms, provisions, and covenants herein contained. Lessor's acceptance of rent following an event of default hereunder shall not be construed as Lessor's waiver of such event of default. No waiver by Lessor of any violation or breach of any of the terms, provisions, and covenants herein contained shall be deemed or construed to constitute a waiver of any violation or breach of any of the terms, provisions, and covenants herein contained. Forbearance by Lessor to enforce one or more of the remedies herein provided upon an event of default shall not be deemed or construed to constitute a waiver of such default. The loss or damage that Lessor may suffer by reason of termination of this lease as provided for above shall include the expense of repossession and any repairs or remodeling undertaken by Lessor following possession. Should Lessor at any time terminate this lease for any default, in addition to any other remedy Lessor may have, Lessor may recover from Lessee all damages Lessor may incur by reason of such default, including cost of recovering the premises and the worth at the time of such termination of the excess, if any, of

the amount of rent and charges equivalent to rent reserved in this lease for the remainder of the stated term over the reasonable rental value of the premises for the remainder of the said term, all of which amounts shall be immediately payable from Lessee to Lessor.

18. **Cancellation.** After the expiration of the initial term and not before, Lessee and Lessor shall have the right to cancel this lease in its entirety, to be effective at the end of any specified month, provided it gives not less than thirty (30) days written notice of its interest to cancel this lease to the other party. Upon the effective date of such cancellation this lease shall be considered null and void as to any subsequent obligations by and between the parties. Lessee shall vacate the premises before the effective date of such cancellation. After the effective date of cancellation, if Lessee has not vacated the premises, he shall be construed to be a tenant at the will of Lessor.

The airport reserves the right to cancel this lease in its entirety if the airport requires the leased premises back for airport purposes, preservation of aviation safety, and or economic reasons.

19. **Assignment or Sublease.** Lessee agrees not to assign the premises leased, any part thereof, or any right or privilege connected therewith, or to allow any other person, except Lessee's agents and employees, to occupy the premises or any part thereof, without first obtaining the Lessor's written consent which shall not be unreasonably withheld. Lessee's interest in this lease is not assignable by operation of law, nor is any assignment of his interest herein, without Lessor's written consent, and Lessor's consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. Lessee shall have no right to sublease any part of this lease or of the lease premises.

20. Right of Entry. Lessor reserves the right to enter upon the premises at any reasonable time for the purpose of making any inspection it may deem expedient to the proper enforcement of any of the covenants or conditions of this agreement. *Lessee acknowledges said driveway intended to be installed upon the premises limits Lessor's ability to install other driveways on adjacent property due to Texas Department of Transportation's restrictions along a state highway. Furthermore, Lessee will allow future development to use and tie-into driveway if necessary. If future development necessitates the use and tie-in of Lessee's driveway, Lessor and Lessee will negotiate a new lease equitable to all parties, including any potential future developer of adjacent property.*

21. **Compliance.** Lessee covenants and agrees to comply with all rules and regulations of the Federal Aviation Administration, including FAA approved Certification Manual, and all Federal, State and Local laws and ordinances now in effect or hereafter promulgated, and the same are made a part of this agreement by reference as though they were set forth herein.

22. **Airport Regulations.** The Lessee covenants and agrees to observe and obey the rules and regulations of the Airport, as promulgated by governmental authority, in the conduct of its operations at the demised premises.

23. **Air Operations Area Security.** Lessee shall provide for the security of the Air Operations Area (AOA) to prevent ground entry or movement of unauthorized persons from or through the leased premises in accordance with any regulations imposed upon Lessor by the Federal Aviation Administration. Lessee will indemnify and

hold harmless Lessor, its officers and employees, from any charges, fines, or penalties that may be levied by any agency of the United States or the State of Texas by reason of Lessee's failure to comply with this requirement.

24. **Airport Hazard**. The Lessee and its successors and assigns, will not make or permit any use of the property which would interfere with landing or taking-off of aircraft at the Airport, or otherwise constitute an airport hazard, including such items as electrical and electronic interference with communications, electrical or electronic equipment, creation of dust or glaring or misleading lights.

25. **Affirmative Action**. The Lessee assures that it will undertake an affirmative action program as required by 14 CFR Part 152, Subpart E, to insure that no person shall on the grounds of race, creed, color, national origin, or sex be excluded from participating in any employment activities covered in 14 CFR Part 152, Subpart E. The Lessee assures that no person shall be excluded on these grounds from participating in or receiving the services or benefits of any program or activity covered by this subpart. The Lessee assures that it will require that its covered sub-organizations provide assurances to the Lessee that they similarly will undertake affirmative action programs and that they will require assurances from their sub-organizations, as required by 14 CFR Part 152, Subpart E, to the same effect.
