JEFFERSON COUNTY FAST FACTS

10/12/1886

Date of hurricane which Year John J. French, destroyed all but 2 of 77 homes in Sabine Pass and killed 86 people, including entire families. The storm swept homes off their foundations and carried people and animals as far as 25 miles away.

1845

merchant and tanner, built his home and store with a tannery nearby. Early settlers came to "French Town" to trade tallow, hides, corn, and beef for shoes, harnesses, salt, coffee, tea, and other items.

1923

Year Temple Emmanuel built under was leadership of Rabbi Samuel Rosinger. The first recorded Jewish services in Beaumont were held on Yom Kippur in September 1887.

This well known historical organization, Texas State Historical Association (TSHA), began in 1897, and its mission is to "foster the appreciation, understanding, and teaching of the rich an unique history of Texas and, by example and through programs and activities, encourage and promote research, preservation, and publi-

cation of historical material affecting the state of Texas."

Publications of TSHA include the <u>Southwestern Historical Quarterly</u>, the Texas Almanac, and the <u>Handbook of Texas Online</u>.

TSHA hosts the Texas Talks - Webinar Series, an educational program for members designed to allow engagement with Texas history scholars and experts. In addition to current scheduled presentations members can view archived programs in their digital library. The next webinar in the series is scheduled for July 10th, at 6:00 p.m., <u>WWI and the Texas Doughboys</u>.

TEXAS HISTORICAL COMMISSION NEWS

- The Texas Historical Commission's Main Street Program was recognized by The National Main Street Center as the winner of its "Innovation on Main Street" awards for the Celebrate Main Street campaign which uses innovative social media tools to highlight the 89 cities in the program.
- THC's Texas Main Street Program <u>announced the launch</u> of a new web application, <u>DowntownTX.org</u>, an online building inventory for Texas downtowns which is designed to connect potential investors to historic properties, and, if successful, will bring much needed reinvestment dollars to downtowns across the state while helping to preserve historic buildings.
- <u>A 1936 Texas Centennial Marker</u> in Llano County commemorating a battle between American Indians and settlers in 1873, was damaged by vandals and covered with graffiti. Conservator Robert Marshall, working with THC, was able to repair the damage and restore the marker.
- <u>The Friends of the Texas Historical Commission</u> is working to help finance the costs of replacement or restoration of the Texas Centennial Markers.




